

Louisiana Pot Roast Buy a rump roast the right size for your family. With a sharp knife, make slits all over the top of the roast. Thinly slice a clove or two of garlic and push one slice into each slit. Salt and pepper to taste and place a number of pats of butter or margarine over the top of the meat. Brown in a 350 oven for about an hour. Add a cup or two of water to the broth, reduce heat to 275, cover and continue cooking until tender.

Chicken Breasts Parmesan 1 - 8 oz. can tomato sauce 1 tsp. Italian seasoning

1/4 tsp. garlic salt 1 c. corn flake crumbs 1/4 c. grated Parmesan cheese

1 tsp. dried parsley flakes 2 large boneless chicken breastssplit and skin

1 beaten egg 1/2 c. shredded mozzarella cheese

Mix tomato sauce, Italian seasoning and garlic salt in a 2 cup measure. Cover with waxed paper. Microwave on high 2 minutes. Stir. Reduce power to medium. Microwave 5 minutes, stirring once. Set sauce aside. (I usually thin this down with about 1/2 cup of chicken broth to make more sauce.) Mix corn flake crumbs, 1/4 c. Parmesan cheese and parsley flakes. Dip chicken breasts in beaten egg, then in crumb mixture. Place in large baking dish. Cover with lid or waxed paper. Microwave on medium-high until chicken is tender, 9 - 14 minutes. Pour sauce over chicken. Sprinkle mozzarella over chicken breasts. Sprinkle with as much more Parmesan cheese as you like. Microwave at mediumhigh until cheeses melt and sauce is hot, 2 - 5 1/2 minutes. Serve with

Sift together: tsp. soda 3 tbsp. baking powder

3 tbsp. sugar 1 pkg. yeast 1/2 c. warm water 3/4 cup oil 2 cups buttermilk

Dissolve yeast and water and mix in oil and buttermilk. Mix oil and buttermilk with dissolved yeast. Combine with dry ingredients. Mix well. Put in covered bowl and keep in refrigerator. When ready to bake, take out desired portion of dough, roll on floured board and cut out. Do not let rise. Bake 12-15 minutes at 450. Dough will keep one week. NOTE: I usually half this recipe when I'm making it just for the two of us. We think the biscuits are better if the dough is made up the night before you plan to use it.

I am writing this letter in regards to county road 1305 and

Due to the recent rains that we have experienced there have been numerous times that we have been unable to leave our home, or return home due to high waters on 1305 by Wendell Reeder ranch.

This could have been avoided if County Road 1300 was drivable to people without a 4 x 4. The road (1300) is full of long, deep ruts that will cause a regular vehicle to bog down and risk being damaged by being pulled out among the trees that are lying in the sides of the roads and across the road.

There is another means of travel from and to our home. There is a beautiful bridge across Line Branch Creek that will take you out to Fm 909. Unfortunately, the bridge is not completed yet, and the concrete is approximately 12-18 inches higher than the road. This is a factor that has not detered others from using materials left behind by the state/county workers to get across the bridge. The barricades warning that the bridge is out has been a favorite of travelers to use as a ramp. (I was informed that this is not a concern of Red River County.)

The solution? It appears to be simple, maintain county roads 1300 and 1305 until the bridge is completed. (I have been told the bridge will be completed when the others on Fm 909 are complete first.) However, this simple solution is not being taken into consideration even in weather that is favorable for working outside on the roads.

I realize that I have made phone calls to those in charge and made personal visits, but I am not the only one on our road that feels our roads are neglected. When our roads are undrivable my son misses school, my daughter misses college and my husband and I both miss day (s) from our jobs at Rivercrest ISD.

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2002 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.







A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1 (and used it as a primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled-or if you're 65 years old or older-you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2001, you won't need to reapply for 2002 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 2002. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you become disabled during 2001, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

When and where should I file?
