Shaved heads were the "in" thing.



# Veterans at Detroit Autobody School, 1940's

By Henry Lee Somerville

Every now and then, some politician asks that the Red River Ordnance at Texarkana be closed down to save money. Because of this, I think what happened in 1948 at Detroit should be made a written record. That was when I took 3 or 4 veterans to the Ordnance and came back with jobs for more than 100 veterans due to the good show by these Detroit area

I do not remember every one of those vets' names now, almost 48 years later and need the survivors to write the Detroit Weekly telling what happened then.

In the 1940's, after a long, long war, veterans came home to Detroit area to no jobs, but home, home, home. We were all homesick. I came back as principal, Detroit High School. Then I took the job as Director, Detroit Autobody School. It was a veterans school owned by Col. Chewning of Paris, along with other businesses in Detroit. The only reason some veterans went to these type schools was they were paid to attend and there were no jobs here. Veterans were homesick and wanted to stay home for

Some veterans, last name Vickers and from the Bagwell area, came to me and said the Ordnance needed autobody repairmen, but had a five years experience requirement for jobs there.

With Col. Chewning's permis- on the street outside Col. sion, I called the Ordnance and made an appintment for conference. On a Friday morning early I left Detroit with three or four veterans who were students at the school. At the Ordnance, the veterans were taken to the shops, away from me, and put to tests at work. Presently, staff workers came to us with glowing reports, saying the veterans were excellent workers and just what they needed at the Ordnacne. Calls were made to Civil Service Hq. asking for a waiver of the five years experience requirement for the jobs.

I was taken on a tour of the Ordnance, introduced to the Foreman of Trishops as Major Somerville from Detroit. He was delighted, saying "Ah, Detroit, Detroit! Chesus Christ, I vish I was back in Detroit!" Somebody told him it was Detroit, Texas, not Michigan and after that he would not speak to me.

Calls to Civil Service headquarters continued, and I was put on the phone a couple of times. But it was a long afternoon and about five o'clock when the National Headquarters gave temporary consent to waive the five year experience requirement for an autobody repair job at Red River came in as Director of the School, Ordnance. They asked me for 100 veterans or more.

We came back to Detroit at about dark, and veterans were still

Chewning's office, waiting for us, eager for news. On Saturday, we processed about 30 to leave Monday for work.

I went to Col. Chewning, "I've ruined your school."

"What did you do?" "I got jobs!"


He smiled, even though this would mean no more income from the school. "That's the purpose of the school. That's our mission!" When he said that, you could tell he was an airplane pilot, a veteran of World War I and World War II.

On Monday morning, when I came to Detroit Audobody School, I could not find a palce to park. Had to park a block away. Veterans were everywhere. Some from Clarksville, some from Paris, some from Oklahoma. They had called friends, word got around...jobs, jobs.

And people said veterans were not interested in work? They really wanted to stay home because they were homesick.

But we sent more than 100 veterans to the Ordnance. I need those survivors of 1948 to write the DetroitWeekly with their memories of this. I left Detroit soon after that and Fred Fisher still sending veterans to the Ordnanc. I went to Paris and from there got recalled involuntarily to Korea in the Air Force.

#### Largest crackdown ever takes aim at unbelted teens 20 who died in passenger vehicle

This Memorial Day weekend during Operation ABC Mobilization, a nationwide law enforcement effort to protect teens and young adults from the leading risk they face, traffic crashes, will be held. With more than 50,000 seat belt check points, saturation patrols and special enforcement activities, the Mobilization is proven

According to the new data from HTSA's Fatal Analysis Reportg Systems, 4,437 teens, ages 16-19 died and thousands more were injured in traffic crashes in 2000. Patality rates for teens are twice that of older drivers and the risk of crashes for teens are four times that of older drivers. This year, approximately 8,000 Americans, adults and children, will die in crashes because they failed to buckle their seat belts.

The weeklong enforcement

wave, which runs from May 20-27, will be supported by more than \$8 million in federal funding for advertising to ensure the buckle up message reaches those least likely to obey the law and use seat belt including teens and young adults. 



Living Conditions-In the area of the city I stayed, most people lived in small blocked homes with hard tiled floors and little (if any) furniture. The houses had electricity that would occasionally go out each day. They did have running water and indoor plumbing, but not like ours (I'll go no further). No toilet paper or towels were used. The raw sewage ran into ditches between the house and the street. Animals were every where; dogs, cows, water buffalo. The animals ate the waste and the garbage thrown out on the streets. Some people sleep on the road sides, as well as the cattle, goats and other animals.

In the countryside areas that I visited most people lived in banana leaf huts. These huts had no electricity, no running water, no indoor or outdoor toilet facilities. But, the government did pay for each village to have one T.V. The T.V. was in its own special hut large enough to protect it from the elements and the people sat on the dirt under the stars to watch TV.

In the city most men wore dhotis (a long dress, usually down to the feet), or American (western) clothing. The women wore beautiful dresses and other garments off silks and other nice materials. Most wore sandals and kicked them off before going into any building.

In the country, dress varied. The men typically wore a dhoti. Some wore not much more than a loin cloth. The women dressed often modestly, but in poorer materials than their city sisters. Others were topless. Many lived on about the equivalent of 25 of our cents per day in the country (in the city the middle class might live on 5 US dollars per day). Those in the country often did not own shoes or

Life Span/Appearance-Their life span is very short. I am told that most die in their 50's.

At as 14, most youth look about 9 or 10 years of age. At 20, most look about 14 or 15 years of age. But, by the time they are 40 or 45 they look very old and weathered.

Many looked very Asian. Others looked very African or perhaps like the Australian Aborignes.

I am considered above average height in India. (Editor's note: For those who do not know him, Bro. Bryan is probably 5'6 or 5'7). The women in the family I stayed with were about four feet tall, the man was bout 5'5.

Transportation-Transportation was interesting at times. We traveled by every conceivable means. We traveled by steam train, taxis with seven men in the back seat of one taxi. We traveled in caravans of mopeds and small motorcycles with three or four men on each at one time. I saw people travel by elephant. We traveled by ox-cart. At one point, one man asked me, "What type of animals do you use in America to get around on?"

One man that was baptized had just one leg. He owned a small bicycle repair shop. He made his own bicycle which he could pedal

with his hands to get around. The only time I really feared anything while there was when traveling in traffic on the streets. At times the cars seemed to be within one handsbreadth of another. Lanes mean nothing. One way streets mean nothing. Passing is treacherous. More than once I thought we would have a headone collision. The space they use to pass in is much, much smaller than what we are used to. It definitely makes central American traffic look mild. But I am still in one piece. Cows and goats sometimes laid in the middle of the busy streets. The air pollution is the thickest I've ever seen in the big cities. Los Angeles has no air pollution problems when compared to there. People are everywhere and busy as ants.

Crops/Food-Their major cash crops were: coconuts, sugar cane, bananas, rice, teakwood, tea, dates, figs and pineapples. Their hot tea was extremely good to the taste.

people could come into my room any time one by one or two by tow to ask questions. This was strange. Once I woke up from a nap to find two people standing outside my room to come visit with me about something they wanted to know

Religiously-India is by far the most populous country for Hindus in the world. They worship perhaps 300 million gods. Deceased ancestors can become gods a local community. The ancestor's favorite pet might well be sacrifices to the various temple sites to be offered. There are temples everywhere. One for fertility; another to go to if you want to be blessed with a job; another to protect against evil spirits-bring your gift and you can be blessed.

India is also either the 2nd or 3rd largest Muslim community in the world (depending on which list you look at). Indonesia is first, some put Pakistan second by numbers and then India. The Muslim community is a very small part percentage-wise of India.

My Lessions-68 of my lessons were presented during the day to member of the church, mainly, but not exclusively to men. These lessons were on: study of Titus; the qualifications of shepherd and deacons; the work of and relationship of shepherds, deacons, preachers and members; personal evangelism; church discipline; current issues there in the church (they gave to me); and a Question and Answer session. Many took the entire period off from their work to attend these leadership classes. Many traveled great distances to be there. 60 men and women completed all the leadership classes, all these received a graduation certificate. The church at Erode, after prayer and fasting, appointed two elders and six deacons. One of the leaders is retiring from his job early so that he can shepherd full time. Other churches in the area were also selecting and appointing men.

I was scheduled to have 12 "open air meetings". I envisioned speaking to hundreds or perhaps thousands each night. What actually took place was somewhat different than expectations. They took me each night to some small banana-leaf hut village, I spoke to a tribal group of perhaps 15 or 20 or 30 souls each night. I went to a different village each night. I sometime spoke under the stars while they sat on the ground. At other times I would sit on a chair in a one room house; they would sit on the ground from my feet and out the door. These lessons were

aimed at winning souls to Christ. The results: (1) There were 66 baptisms (63 of the 66 were Hindus, 3 were denominational people tired of denominationalism, they simply wanted to be New Testament Christians, nothing more or

less); of these, 39 were men and 27 women. The ages broke down this way; 3 were in their sixties; 1 was in his fifties; 7 were in their forties; 13 were in their thirties; 24 were in their twenties and 18 were in their teens. (2) One new church was established. One of the men from Erode has agreed to work with this newly planted church and help them mature. (3) A building up on the brethren's faith in the power of the Word. To God be the glory! The Gospel will change people when preached (by the way, if you are wondering the percentage of Christians there that remain faithful is much higher there than here! I understand that the retention there is between 70 and 80%. The retention rate here is between 40 and 50%. People take their decision very serious there, to obey the Gospel means being shunned from family and sometimes persecution).

The Blunders-Blunder one: I backed very hard into a policeman so hard in fact, that I knocked his billy club out of his hand! He had a machine gun in the other hand!! But no difficulty occurred. He just smiled and let me go. Blunder real flight time (forget the time . two: I shook hands with the ladies.

Only their husbands are to touch itself is almost entirely provided them in such a way. You are to bow to greet them. Before it was over the husbands told them it was they had a special service to install okay to shake hands with me. No difficulty, what a relief.

The Sad-Many sad things occur in India. Many of these things 5 1/2 hours before lunch! No comconcern the women. It is illegal, but it still happens that when a husband dies the wife is sometimes drugged and placed on the funeral pyre to die with his cremation. Another sad practice, though also illegal, is also concerning women. A dowry is to be given away when a girl marries, and it is to be given by her parents. If a family has many daughters, and since the dowry could equal as much as five years wages, the murder of daughters sometimes occurs. The government has had to make sonograms illegal because so many were using this to selectively abort if the unborn be female. Also, some place cow urine and dung upon themselves to receive blessings from the gods (they worship the female cow).

They are a superstitious people that believes that earthquakes are caused by their god holding up the world, getting tired and having to shift hands. They believe if an elephant's snout touches the head of a person, that person is blessed. They worship the elephant.

The Barber Shop-The barber shop was interesting. They cut everyone's hair with the same scissors without sanitizing them between cuts. They shaved every face and every man's underarms (that's right--underarms!) with the same razor blade, then wiped the blade off and went on to the next customer. They did shave me with a new blade however.

While I am speaking of the barber ship, a young Hindu was in the middle of a hair cut, when he saw me come in. He got up and wanted me to go first because I was an American and a guest in his country. But, I insisted that he finish.

When one gets his hair cut, he must thoroughly bath with water and change clothes before entering any home of a Hindu. The hair clippings, to them represent evil spirits. They think if such clippings get into their home that bad

things will happen to that home. Interesting Notes-While on the plane returning to London, an Indian man now living in the US asked me what we believed. I told him. He said I need to find out said they simply referred to themselves as Christians, but all others call them Syrian Christians. Supposedly, they fled Syria in the first century A.D. due to the persecutions. They traveled by ship down the Persian Gulf and ended up in Western India, in what is now Cochin. He said that they seem to worship and practice as we do, though there are not very many of them. He said their history goes back to the first century A.D. and that they have continued to wor-

ship there ever since. Another tidbit, did you know that there is good evidence that the Apostle Thomas took the Gospel into Persia (Iran), Parthia (corresponds to Iran and Turkmenistan) and India? In fact, there is a monument erected for him in Madras. India. The Thompson chain-reference Bible says, "Tradition says he labored in Parthia, Persia and India suffering martyrdom near

Madras at Mt. St. Thomas.' Honor and Persecution-Each state is different and city to city the treatment of Christians is dif ferent as well. I heard of people being evicted from their homes and yes, an occasional death due to Hindu persecution in some areas. The persecution does not come from the Indian government but from the people themselves. It is illegal in India for a foreigner to baptize an Indian. I did not find that out until I had baptized many. After finding out, I usually let an

Indian do the baptizing. But I was never treated harsh In fact, I was honored as a special guest at their harvest festival (the equivalent of our county fair). I was given the equivalent of the city keys, due to the influence of my host. Moreover, I signed autographs for the people on that occasion. They even provided special entertainment just for me. I think they really wanted to please American. You see, they need help with Pakistani terrorism. They re-

ally wanted to treat me with honor. Sunday-Their typical Sunday service starts at 10:00 a.m. From 10 to 11 they sing; from 11 to 1 preaching occurs; from 1 to 1:30 someone speaks on the meaning of the Lord's Supper; from 1:30-1:40 the Lord's Supper is taken; from 1:40 to 1:55 a member gives a lesson on giving; from 1:55 to

2:00 the collection it taken up. Then, usually, all eat together. Transportation to services (by bus), lunch and even the building

The last Sunday I was there elders and deacons before we ate lunch. This lasted from 2 pm to 3:30 pm. So services that day were plaints. The people couldn't get enough. Attendance is usually 30-35, but this last Sunday attendance soared to 172. Inside the building and maybe 30-40 outside listen-

Names-One man that was converted was named Nagarajan. His name honored a Hindu god; the King Cobra. He asked about changing his name. I told him of men in the Bible that did not change

their pagan names; Epaphras; Epaphroditus-both show honor to Venus or Aphrodite. He was told that instead of changing his name it was more important that he wear the name "Christian". He still insisted and changed his name to

In another case, a young mother asked me to give her newly born daughter a Bible name. I selected the name Priscilla. She was

Illness/Living as they do-I was the first American to go work with these people in some time. They were well pleased. They said that many Americans want to stay in American hotels, eat American food, only preach at the church buildings, and then return to the hotel. But, I lived as they did. Such pleased them. Paul said, " I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some". I've even heard stories of Americans showing up and seeing the conditions and leaving immediately. Such is a shame. These souls are precious and hungry for the truth.

Living conditions were interesting at times. The day they picked me up they brought me bottled water to spare me from drinking their polluted water. I took a sip. The next man grabbed the bottle and sipped. They passed it around and then back to me to drink again. They thought they were doing me a favor.

I did drink much unsanitary water in people's homes. I ate things that, I didn't know what it was. The mosquitos were very thick. One of my host contracted malaria while I was there. They did erect a mosquito net for me. But I tell you all this to say I don't know what I contracted. It could be a result of bad water and unclean conditions. They also are having an epidemic of malaria, yellow fever and typhoid. I thought maybe I had malaria, I guess I didn't. I am almost back to nor-

Hospitality-I found the people to be overly hospitable, way beyond their duty. When I showed up at the airport, my plane was 4 hours late due to engine trouble and a change of plane, those men that picked me up, had waited all that extra time outside in the rain, 970 12th SE in the dark, with no shelter, waiting for me. When they took me to the airport to fly back home, twelve members of the church took off

work and escorted me the eight hour trip by train to see me off. The day that I was to leave from the airport they rented a bus and took me around sight-seeing. I don't think that a day went by without their placing a rose lei around my neck. They brought me flowers of different kinds. They put a sandalwood lei around my neck and brought me more food than I could have ever eaten. They were always smiling and very gra-

cious. One of the men I baptized spun and wove a blanket for me with my name on it.

Conclusion-Would I do again? In a heart beat. If one truly loves souls and believes the Gospel, how could he do otherwise They have invited me to return in 1 1/2 years from now. They want me to bring 3 or 4 other preachers with me at the time. I do have plans for other possible future trips to Jamaica, Ghana Africa and Russia.

## Car Seat Check-up is June 5

A car seat check-up will be Hi sheld June 5 from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the Paris Wal-Mart parking lot. The event is being sponsored by the Paris EMS

The Car Seat Check-up Program was developed by the Department of Transportation and the Department of Health due to e growing number of injuries and deaths of infants and toddlers. National studies have discovered that infants and toddlers were restrained improperly in car seats.

Those same national studies reflected that at least 8 out of 10 car seats are incorrectly used. The studies revealed that correctly installed car seats are 71% effective in reducing deaths for infants. 54% effective in reducing toddler deaths, and reduced the need for hospitalization by 69%.





\*\*Unless illuminated at night, flags displayed outdoors should only be flown from sunrise to sunset.

\*\*The flag should not be flown on days when the weather is inclement, expect when an all weather flag is

\*\*The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff should be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right

\*\*When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flat's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the flag should be displayed in the same

\*\*When used on a speaker's platform, the flag, if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker.

\*\*The flag, when flown at halfstaff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the Day.

## Are you ready for a tornado?

Here's what you can do to prepare for such an emergency.

Prepare a home tornado plan: Pick a place where family members could gather if a tornado is headed your way. It could be your basement or, If there is no basement, a center hallway, bathroom or closet on the lowest floor. Keep this place uncluttered.

Assemble a disaster supplies kit containing first aid kit and essential medications; canned food and can opener; at least three gallons of water per person; battery powered radio, flashlight and extra batteries; protective clothing, bedding or sleeping bags; special items for infant, elderly or disabled family members.

Conduct periodic tornado drills so everyone remembers what to do when a tornado is approach-


Stay tuned for storm wanrings. Listen to your local radio and TV stations for updated storm information. Know what a tornado WATCH and WARNING mean.

When a tornado WATCH is issued, listen to local radio and TV stations for further updates. Be alert to changing weather conditions. Blowing debris or the sound of an approaching tornado may alert you. Many people say it sounds like a freight train



When a tornado WARNING is issued, if you are inside, go to the safe place you picked to protect yourself from glass and other flying objects. ## PET TALK

If it seems your horse has a frog in its throat, the culprit may be Streptococcus equi, or "strangles." This contagious bacterial infection affects young horses with cases ranging from only mild swelling to severe respiratory dis-

Strangles is a contagious and very common disease in horses aged one to three years," said Dr. Peggy Marsh, a veterinarian in the ollege of Veterinary Medicine at cas A&M University.

Streptococcus equi is in the same family of bacteria as the organism that causes strep throat in humans. In horses, it creates abscesses in the throat, swelling of the lymph nodes and nasal discharge.

Strangles is spread through direct contact with sick horses, or through contact with infected equipment, such as water buckets, brushes or blankets. Traveling stock are particularly at risk, as they are most likely to mingle with horses from other herds.

Marsh says prevention is the st way to keep strangles out of erd. Be sure to quarantine new horses away from the established herd for three to four weeks. In addition, she says you may opt for vaccines, which can be administered by injection or delivered through the nasal passages.

However, Marsh cautions that no vaccine is one 100 percent effective. Young foals are usually less susceptible to strangles since they are protected by the mare's immunity gleaned through nurs-

If strangles does make its way into your herd, it is important to consult your veterinarian when symptoms surface. Marsh says a horse's appetite is not a good indicator of the presence or absence of strangles, as a horse may eat well in spite of minor pain and swelling, noted Marsh.

Most cases are not considered emergencies, but some cases can quickly escalate into respiratory distress. Your veterinarian will be able to prescribe a treatment appropriate for your horse's condition, which may include antibiotics and local, surgical drainage of any abscesses.

In very rare cases, strangles may cause one or more complications. These horses may develop pneumonia, myopathy (muscle swell-

ing), purpura hemmhoragica (generalized swelling caused by the body's own immune response), and / or abscesses in various other places, such as the abdomen. Most cases of strangles are curable, with only rare exceptions in which the bacteria "hides" in the guttural pouches, resulting in chronic shedding of the bacteria.

The most important part of avoiding and treating strangles in your herd is to isolate sick horses and contaminated equipment from the rest of the herd," said Marsh. When traveling, carefully monitor your horses' exposure to unfamiliar trailers and equipment. And, if symptoms do appear, it's best to seek the advice of your veterinarian.'

At one of the newest architectural jewels in Austin, the Bob Bullock Texas State History Museum, an expansive exhibit Sunrise in His Pocket: The Life, Legend and Legacy of Davy Crockett, is open through August 18, 2002.

Fess Parker, who was featured in the role of Davy Crockett on television's Disneyland in 1955, was recently on hand at the museum exhibit opening celebration. Parker, a Texas icon now in his California. Parker grew up in San to Hollywood in the early 1950's Davy. to seek stardom.

Parker and Disney made three Crockett television features which led to the first full-blown fad for the generation that would come to be known as the "baby boomers". Bill Hayes, who for years has starred on the daytime drama, Days of Our Lives, recorded The Ballad of Davy Crockett in connection with Disney series. The record sold over two million copies in six months. In the 1950's, that was unheard of. Can't you just hear it, "Davy, Davy Crockett, king of the wild frontier ....

The museum exhibit is a mixture of Hollywood and actual his-

white television booming out the Disney series and then into a typical kid's room overflowing with a Davy collector's merchandise bonanza. You will remember the coonskin caps, old Betsy rifles, bedspreads, lunch boxes, cups, posters, games and puzzles, records and books. Disney's Davy was clearly the fledgling forerunner of the merchandising craze we see today with Star Wars at the McDonald's and Burger Kings. You will be amazed at all the stuff they were able to put "Davy" onto.

You will find one of Crockett's first rifles, antler knives, flintlock muskets and other personal items such as a snuff box, a crockery whiskey jug and a bench from his home. Actual Crockett historical books and letters (including literary nuggets such as the Crockett motto: "Be sure you are right, then go ahead!") are exciting to view.

The legend and myth of the early Crockett years is explored through a large, stuffed bear and features about his famed hunting skills. In fact, other famous "hunter heroes" have items in the exhibit. In display cases, there are 512-936-8746. buckskins and guns from General

The Alamo fell on March 6, tory. As you enter the exhibit, you George Custer, Annie Oakley, Buffalo Bill and Teddy Roosevelt.

Yet, some of the most fascinating items in the exhibit come from the time of David Crockett as a Congressman. For example, on hand is the actual election tally sheet showing his defeat for a fourth term in the U.S. Congress. He lost by 252 votes of approximately 9,000 votes cast. Following his loss, he gave his famous and rousing farewell speech, "I told the voters if they would elect me I would serve them to the best of my ability; but if they did not, they might go to hell and I would

go to Texas. I am on my way." So it was in 1835 at 49 years of age, David Crockett of Tennessee resolved himself to a new start. Historical maps record that his trip to Texas on his way to a hero's death at the Alamo took him on a trail right through this region of amar and Red River Counties. At the exhibit in Austin, throughout this summer, you now have the opportunity to view Davy Crockett historical artifacts, and additionally, visit the museum's Texas spirit Theater where a storytelling presentation featuring a one-man

show of Davy is alive.
