Three hundred and sixty million dollars! Wow, that sounds like a lot of money. It is, actually, a lot of money. But, it isn't nearly as much as you might think

As most of my readers know, I'm devoted to the cause of volunteer fire departments.

As such, I found myself recently staying up until midnight working on a FEMA grant application.

After September 11, three hundred sixty million dollars was released to help fire departments obtain better fire fighting equipment, vehicles, emergency medical services, or fire prevention programs.

I think I knew the money was going to be pitifully short when it took six or seven hours just getting through on the internet to FEMA!

Now, the procedure isn't through yet. No one knows whether they are getting any grant money or not.

But, here's how things stack

Requests for this three hundred sixty million totalled Two point two BILLION dollars! That's right, there were

19,500 requests for funds for a total of \$2.2 BILLION.

I can't count high enough, or even begin to grasp the concept of that much money.

Fifty eight percent of the grant money requested was for fire operations and firefighter safety...that means things like protective clothing (bunker gear) radios, boots, jaws of life,

Fire fighting vehicles (usu-

ally the most expensive item a volunteer fire department has) made up 37% of the applications, and emergency medical services and fire prevention made up the rest of the applications.

In addition, volunteer departments must compete with paid and combination volunteer/paid departments, located in urban, suburban and rural communities.

300 fire service personnel are currently going over these applications to determine who gets what. I don't envy them their job.

What does all this mean? It means that, as always, small town volunteer fire departments must have the support and help of the people they serve.

Because getting grants isn't a reliable way to obtain funds for things such as gear to keep a volunteer from being burned, or medical equipment to save a life.

Whenever grants are open, volunteer departments MUST apply for them. Otherwise it gives the appearance that they aren't trying. But, in reality, the chances of getting much help through the process are very, very slim.



The family cat may not be the only thing threatening your Tweety bird.

Your home may actually have hidden dangers that can prove fatal for pet birds, and from an unlikely source - harmful fumes. Nonstick cookware is just one of the many commonly used products that may threaten your bird's

According to Dr. James Johnson, a veterinarian in the College of Veterinary Medicine, Zoological Medicine Section, at Texas A&M University, birds have extremely efficient respiratory systems capable of absorbing oxygen from the air much more effectively than humans. Unfortunately, this also makes them far more susceptible to contaminants, even if humans are unaffected by those contaminants.

"When heated to very high temperatures, the nonstick coating on cookware, irons, bread makers and other appliances emits fumes that are fatal to birds," said Johnson.

"These fumes are odorless and harmless to humans but can cause a bird's lungs to hemorrhage within minutes. Bird owners are advised to avoid using nonstick cookware to avoid harming their

If you do use nonstick cookware, be careful not to allow the pans to scorch. If they do overheat, quickly remove the bird from the house and ventilate the house thoroughly before returning your bird indoors, Johnson advises. The same is true for other harmful

Smoke, paint, household cleaners, pesticides and any other solvents can be dangerous to birds. Pet owners should remove their birds from any areas where these products are being used or even remove the birds from the house altogether until the fumes have dissipated, Johnson adds.

"Since birds are affected so quickly by household fumes, it is important to watch closely for symptoms such as wheezing, gasping for breath, open-beak breathing and sneezing," said Johnson"The effects of household damage in birds is permanent. Card of Thanks

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Grasshopper outlook turned around

aged a large hatch of grasshoppers in Central Texas, but recent rains should help keep the pest from becoming a severe problem for the next few weeks in East

Dr. James Robinson and other entomologists with Texas Cooperative Extension are reluctant to predict what will happen during the next few months. Much depends on summer rainfall and the availability of natural food sources for the grasshoppers.

If the rains are adequate, many of the grasshoppers will feed on weeds and other foods and they will stay away from crops. Along with adequate rain comes better forage production, allowing grazing by livestock and hay to be produced. An added benefit of adequate rain, is it will keep the hoppers in their natural habitat and away from gardens and home landscapes.

Grasshoppers are not currently a problem in East Texas except for isolated areas. A couple of weeks ago, it was a different story. There were reports of Central Texas farmers finding the ground under their feet squirming with grasshopper nymphs. Reports of grasshopper infestations were also coming in from the Athens and Canton areas.

Farmers were concerned about the infestations because with soil moisture already below normal in many parts of the state, hay and forage could be at a premium during the months ahead.

Though the grasshoppers are small, many farmers elected to treat early. It was an expensive enterprise, but one which was probably wise, considering the on pastures.

A dry, mild winter has encour- which attacks their overwintering eggs in the soil. During a dry winter, the fungus does not flourish and more grasshopper eggs hatch to become nymphs.

Producers are usually advised that it becomes economical to treat when they can count 25 grasshoppers per square yard. Twentyfive grasshoppers may not sound like a big number, but over an acre, this count could equal 120,000 grasshoppers, At this concentration, the grasshoppers can eat as much forage as a mature cow

Chemical controls for grasshoppers in improved pastures are relatively cheap when products are used at their lowest rates. Sevin XLR and Malathion 57 EC have proven effective on grasshopper nymphs in bermudagrass pastures at their lowest rates. Cost of these products will range from nearly \$5 to as much as \$7 per

Which insecticide used depends upon more factors than cost, however, Malathion has no grazing or harvest restrictions. Seven has a 14-day grazing restriction.

The highly toxic insecticide methyl parathion is also labeled for grasshopper control. Because of its toxicity level, Robinson recommended that it be applied either aerially or by a commercial applicator using an enclosed cab machine.

I do not recommend that methyl parathion be applied by farmers with an open air tractor cab and spray rig. It's just too danger-

Methyl parathion has a 15-day waiting period for hay harvesting and grazing.

Robinson emphasized that insecticide products are complicated and allowed usage will vary among formulations of the same chemical. Applicators should read the label carefully before mixing or applying. For example, producers should note that the restrictions listed above are for beef cattle only. Restrictions for use on dairy pastures vary consider-

Sevin, a commonly used insecticide, has another restriction. I can only be used twice in a calendar year. In addition to controlling grasshoppers, it is also effective with another scourge of East Texas pastures, the fall armyworm, which has been a problem in recent years.

You might consider using one of the other products for grasshoppers now and holding Sevin in reserve in case they have a problem with armyworms this fall.

Homeowners shouldn't worry about grasshoppers damaging lawns. Vegetable gardens and ornamental landscape plants can be a target, however. For safecontrol in vegetable gardens, use Sevin or malathion.

For home owners, insecticides containing bifenthrin and lambdacyhalothrin provide the fastest knockdown and longest residual control. Products containing permethrin cyfluthrin, and esfenvalerate should also provide good control. Be sure to read label instructions carefully before using a product on home vegetable gardens.

Robinson has put together a fact sheet on the various grasshopper control products and their formulations and distributed it to county agents throughout East Texas. Producers needing more specific information are advised to contact their local county Extension office.

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
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
