Thomas and I moved hay last weekend. As we drove over the backroads in our pickups I didn't have much else to do except make sure that the trailer loaded with round bales was still back there. I began to look at the houses I was passing for want of anything better. And, since I was going past these same houses twice an hour, pretty soon I began to really SEE them, not just glance at them.

I was struck by just how individualistic we are here in East Texas. Indeed, we are that way all over this nation. In other countries the houses are frequently built one after another exactly alike. The individuality usually occurs in the back yard, where the family sits out.

But, flamboyant as we are, here we put our differences out front as well as back!

The houses themselves were all different. Ranging from simple frames to mobile homes, elaborate bricks or combination of brick and frame, they were from one story to two.

There were old fashioned farm homes, huge Tudor style houses, and every imaginable type in-between.

Yard care speaks a lot about those who live within the house, too. Some yards must be groomed two or three times a week, they are so perfect, while others are kept "Mowed but not much

else". A few (very few) are unkempt, with Dallis grass growing around the foundaion and weeds sprouting everywhere.

Even though the blooming season for flowers is nearly gone, new plantings of fall mums abound. Trim bushes, hanging baskets of breathtaking ferns, and flowers brighten yards.

And those yard ornaments! From the classic maiden pouring water from an urn into a fountain to the silhouettes of cowboys leaning on fences and elves delving in the dirt, they express the individuality of the homeowner.

Banners fly, depicting flowers, suns, cats and cows.

Children's playground equipment and toys prove that kids in this part of the world can play outside in the front of their homes, and pets race up and down fences barking at my rattling trailer.

I was struck once more by the things that make this nation special, our fierce independence and desire to express ourselves in every way....and our homes are one of the most visible!







Web based tool available to landowners from FSA

launched the "Base and Yield 903-784-6679 or visit the national Update Option Analyzer", an in- FSA web site at http:// teractive web based tool for land- www.fsa.usda.gov. owners and operators to use in evaluating and calculating base and yield options for direct and counter cyclical payments. The web-based calculator can be found at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/ pas/farm bill/tools.asp.

The 2002 Farm Bill affords producers the opportunity to update bases and yields allowing them to take advantage of yield improvements due to improved technology resulting in government payments that are more in line with actual production.

Base and yield data currently on file at USDA service centers has been frozen since 1985.

The new tool is based on software developed by Texas A&M University's Agriculture Food and Police Center. The analysis program helps producers evaluate the economic consequences of selecting different base and yield options on a case by case basis for each of their respective operations. When using the analyzer program, producers will need to provide information including planted acres, yields an types of crops grown.

Without the web based tool, producers would be confronted with an impossible task. FSA recognizes that there are

numerous on line base and yield calculators available to producers, but the Texas A&M model is the only program that has been certified and adopted by FSA an is therefore the only version that FSA supports with confidence.

Landowners interested in receiving direct and counter cyclical payments may begin to sign up for the 2002 and 2003 crop years on October 1, 2002 and have until April 1, 2003 to make base and yield elections for the new farm program. If no election is made by the April 1, 2003 deadline, the farms' bases will default to the 2002 base, plus oilseeds if applicable. This is especially important for those farms that did not participate in the 1996 farm program and whose records currently show no base acres.

Although the decision to change existing base and yield data is ultimately that of the landowner and FSA or its employees cannot make those decision for a producer, they will be more than willing to assist producers. They also encourage produces to work with and seed assistance from their local County Extension



Breast Cancer is preventable. Actually, there is no known way to prevent breast cancer. Early detection followed by prompt treatment offers the best chance to treat it

Only women get breast cancer. Estimated annually figures show that about 1,600 men a year get breast cancer and about 400 die from it. But it's mainly a women's disease... About 178,000 women are diagnosed each year, and about 43,000 die from

Only women with known risk factors get breast cancer. Over 70% of women with breast cancer have no identifiable risk factors other than being women.

A lump in your breast means you have breast cancer. Over 80% of lumps are benign. They are very common, but any unusual lump should be evaluated by a physician. Breast self-examination is enough to detect breast cancer.

BSE is just one part of the early detection program and should be combined with

regular professional breast exams and regular mammograms for women over 40. A monthly self breast exam for women ages 20 to 29, and a clinical breast exam by a health care professional is recommended every 3 years.

Mammograms have no benefit for women under 50. More than 20% of breast cancers are diagnosed in women under 50.

* Women age 40 or over should have a mammogram every year

*Between the ages of 35 and 39, it is recommended that you have a baseline mammogram if you are considered at high risk.

Dear Governor Ratliff: I would like to register my concern that the 2002 State Water Plan, adopted in January by the Texas Water Development Board, relies too much on billion dollar projects like the Marvin Nichols dam and too little on conservation. If reasonable water conservation measures were implemented in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area, where 80 percent of the water from the proposed project would go, the Marvin Nichols dam would be unnecessary.

Letter to the Editor

A letter from the Sulphur River Basin Authority (SRBA) member shows exactly why our regional water planning group has found it necessary to amend our regions water plan. They need to restrain the SRBA from developing the Marvin Nichols I Reservoir. The SRBA misses the big picture and ignores plain facts.

The member states that the SRBA would bean no cost in building the lake, choosing to ignore the fact that a minium 235,000 acres would be taken form our county and school district rolls. Our schools are already running on a shoestring. Our school districts would be forced to raise taxes on people's property that was not taken for the reservoir. We would in effect, be forced to pay a type of water welfare to Dallas-Ft. Worth for their access to our water. There is no free lunch for

Another reason that our regions water planning group has been forced to reign in the SRBA is their lack of understanding of mitigation. They have misinformed people by saying that there would be development all around the Marvin Nichols I Reservoir. I strongly urge you to work with other lawmakers to ensure state funding and state permits for water development be granted only to those applicants who can demonstrate that water needs cannot be met through conservation. At a time when money is scarce and rivers are being depleted, Texas can't afford wasteful projects like Marvin Nichols.


