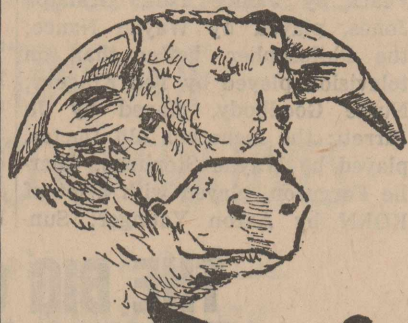
Mrs. Davis Is Winner In Quilt Design Contest

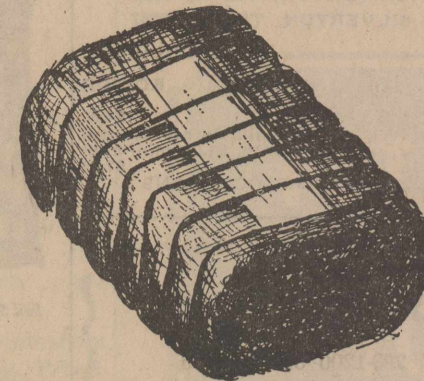
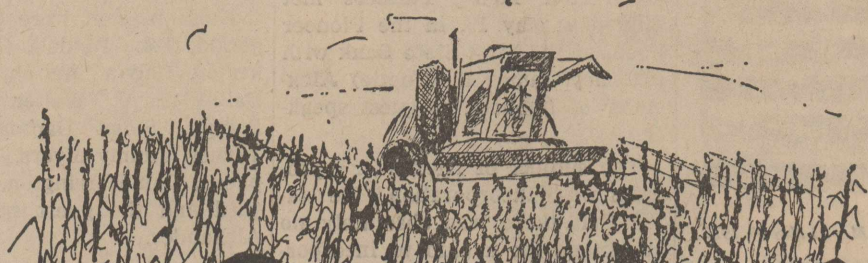

Self Selected West Texas Track MVP

Senior weightman Marvin Self received the Tommy Bryant Memorial Award, symbolic of being West Texas State's outstanding trackman, Tuesday night at the squad's annual get-together in the Palo Duro Canyon.

"Self has shown the type of leadership and ability to make him our most valuable trackman," WTSU track coach Bob Kitchens said in making the announcement. "Self worked extremely hard to better himself, and has inspired the rest of the team to work harder."

Self is the defending Missouri Valley discus champion.

"The award will be known as the Tommy Bryant Memorial Award from now on," Kitchens explained. "Charles Haddad won the first award last year." Haddad was also a weightman, and was graduated last spring.

Bryant is a former West Texas sports information director and Globe-News sportswriter who died in his sleep August 18, 1975.

Self was an outstanding athlete in Silverton High School, making three trips to the State Track Meet in addition to winning honors in football and captaining both the football and basketball teams. In 1970, as a sophomore, he placed second in the Regional Shot Put and fourth in the Discus. In 1971, he won the State Class A Discus championship with a throw of 172', bettering his previous best distance. He also placed third in the State Shot Put with 55'6 1/2".

Just four years ago this month, Self won the double State titles, in both the shot and discus. He ignored a rainstorm and the muggy weather in Austin to win the State Discus Championship by again bettering his best with a throw of 176'9". The next day,

he swept the State Class A Shot Put with 58'3 1/2".

The State Class A Discus record of 186' eluded the athlete, as he threw over 185' four times in warmup but had to settle for the 176'9" in the rain.

He set meet records almost everywhere he threw his senior year, sometimes breaking a meet record that he had set the year before.

He was elected to the Texas Sportswriters All-State Track team both his junior and senior years. He put Silverton on the map in the world of track, and approximately 30 schools offered him track scholarships when he graduated from SHS.

Not only is Self an outstanding athlete, he has shown his willingness to work with younger athletes as they progress along the road he once chose. He received his degree at WTSU a few days ago, and is qualified to teach physical education and English. He will be an asset to the school that hires him.

Self is married to the former Reba Chappell, and they are presently making their home here and awaiting the arrival of their first child.

Funeral services for 85-year-old Joe Jackson were conducted Monday at the Westside Church of Christ in Lockney. Mr. Jackson died about 11:20 a.m. Saturday.

Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, officiated. Assisting was the Rev. Tom Meers of the Calvary Baptist Church in Plainview. Burial was in Lockney Cemetery under the direction of Carter Funeral Home.

Mr. Jackson married the former Bessie Kyle on November 26, 1922 in Brady, Oklahoma. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Survivors include his wife of the home; two sons, Kenneth Jackson of Silverton and David Jackson of Lockney; a sister, Mrs. Mae Spears, Bakersfield, California; five grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

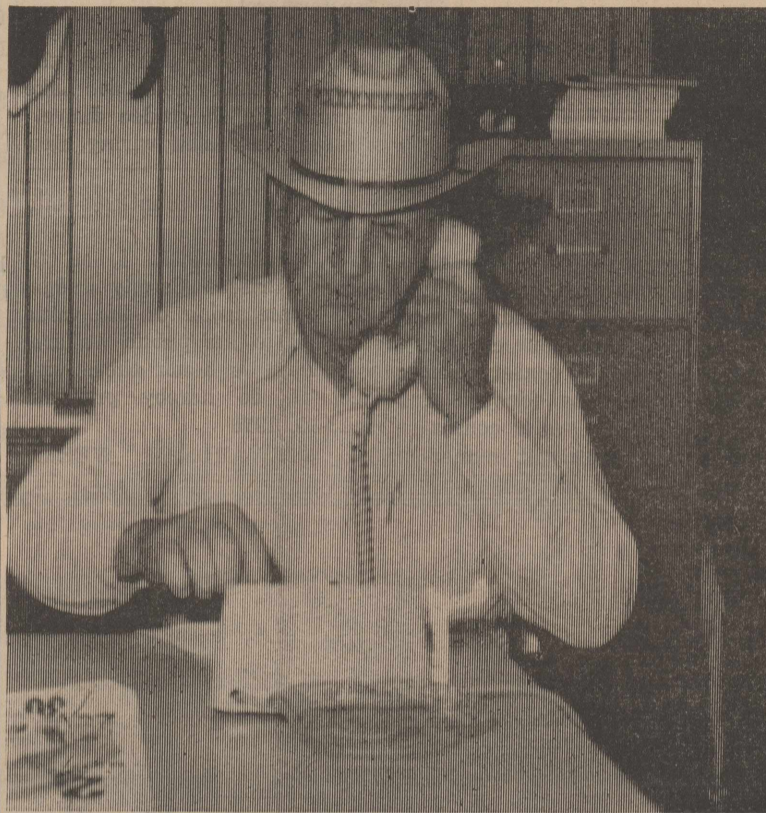

Joe Mercer returned home from Palo Duro Hospital in Canyon Tuesday and is continuing to recuperate from a back injury at home.

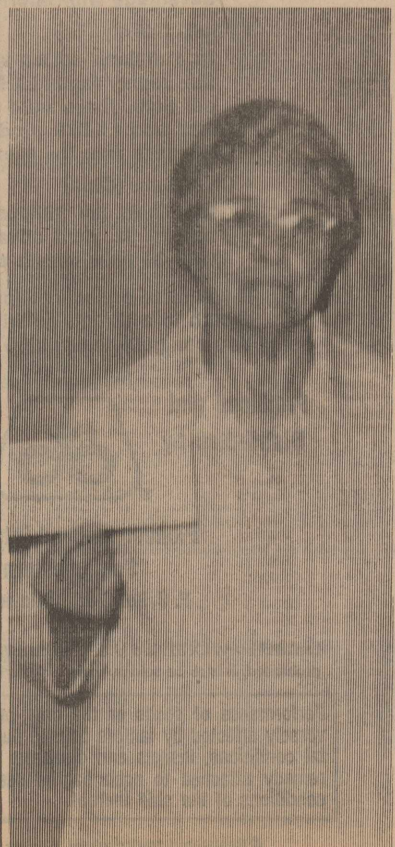

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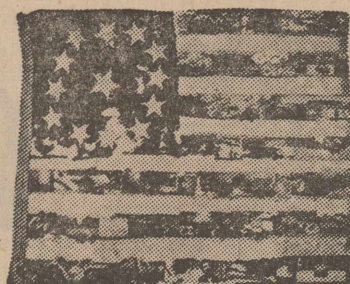

It wasn't always so.

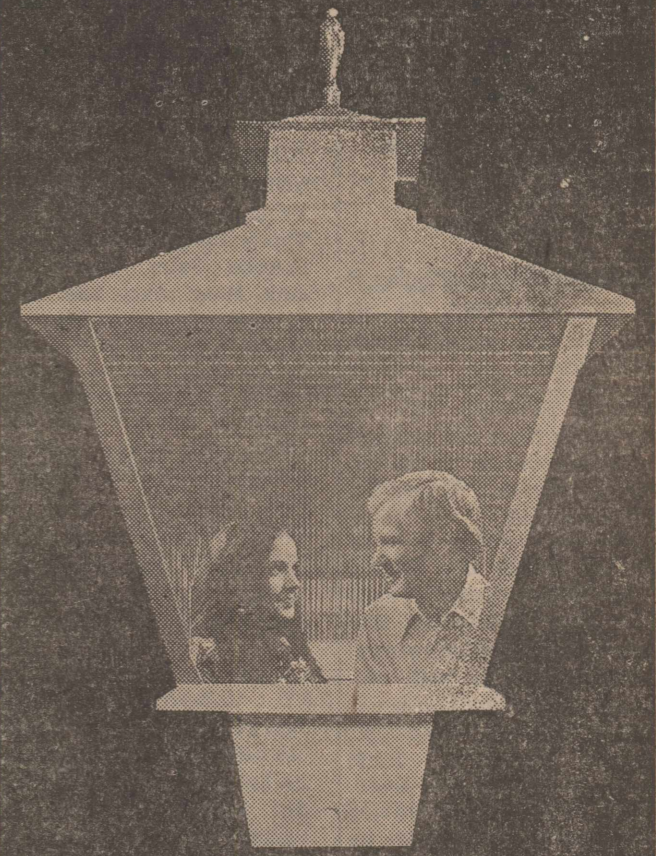
In the early days of the Republic, gold and silver coins (which have since passed from the American scene) were referred to as "specie," the most acceptable form of payment.

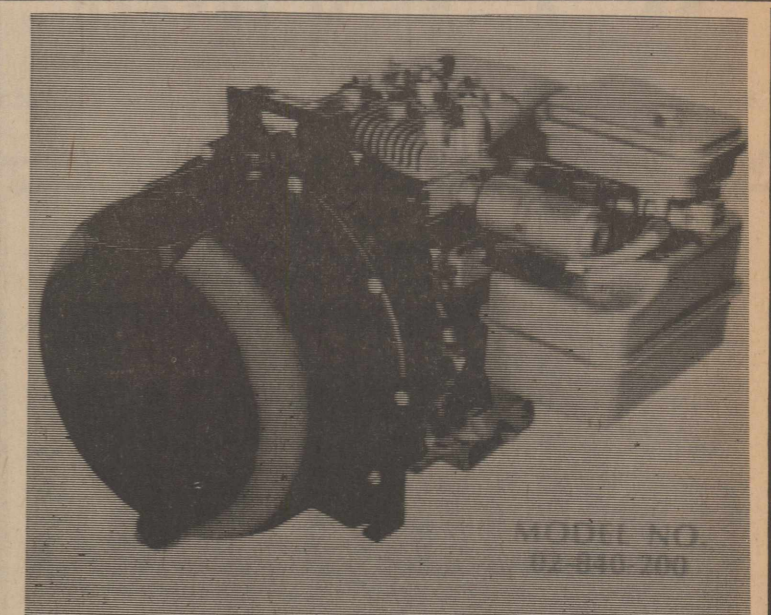
