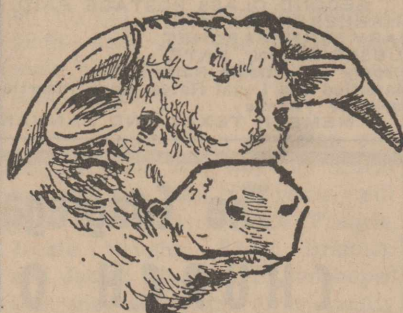
Pearson Services Held At Tulia

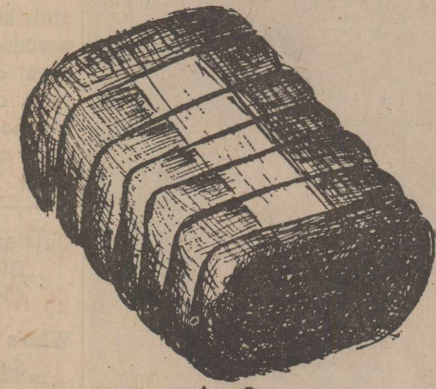
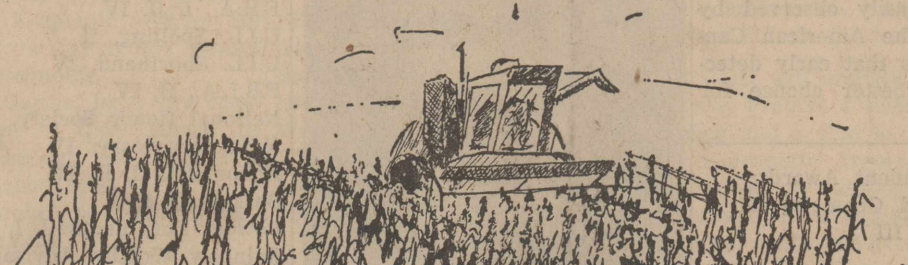
Mr. Pearson died Sunday. He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Roy Mayfield of Silverton.

Seventeen Seniors To Receive Diplomas Here Friday Night

Self Repeats As MVC Discus Champion

Marvin Self, West Texas State University's only senior member of the track team, repeated as the Missouri Valley Conference Discus Champion in the meet held in Canyon last Friday and Saturday.

He also won third in the MVC Shot Put.

"This is the one I'll remember the most," the senior from Silverton said of his second Valley discus championship. "This win will stick in my mind the rest of my life. It's good to go out on a winning note and help the team."

Self had one throw of 161 feet in addition to the winning toss of 162-6½. He completed both throws in the preliminaries, then fouled twice and had a lesser throw in the finals. However, his preliminary throws stood up and only New Mexico State's Dennis Diaz threatened (161-2).

"Dennis had beaten me three times in a row this year," said Self, who had only the fourth-best Valley throw before this meet.

The WT weightman is returning to farming this week. He said he began preparing for his MVC title defense a week after he won it last year with an extensive weight program.

Self's points added to WTSU's total assisted the Buffaloes in finishing in third place in the MVC.

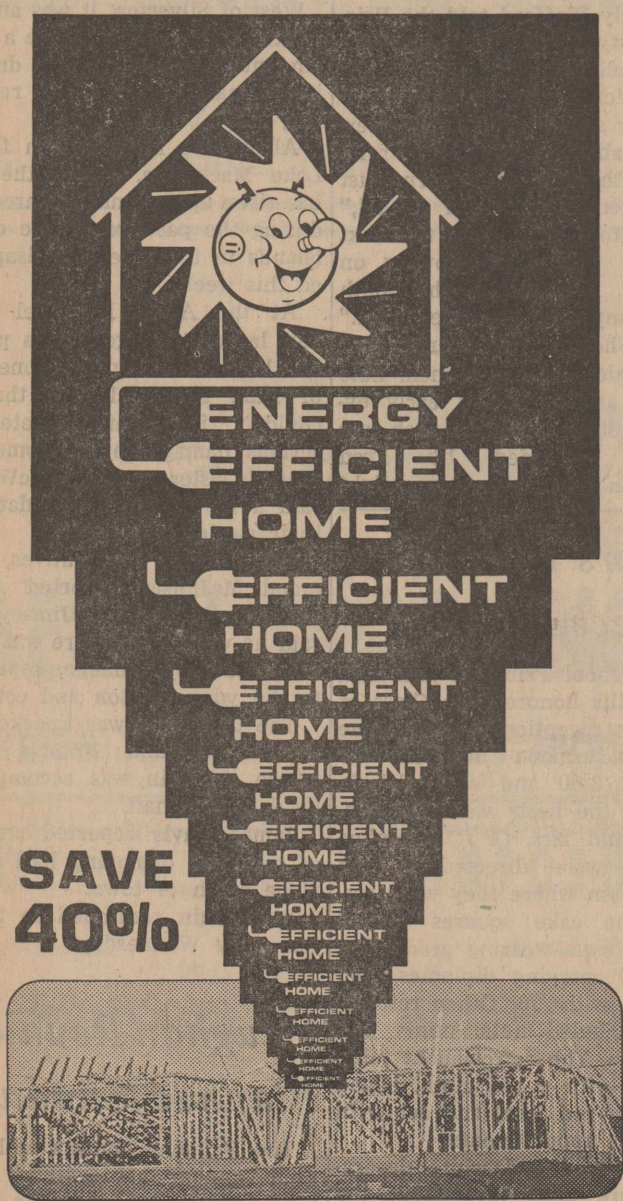
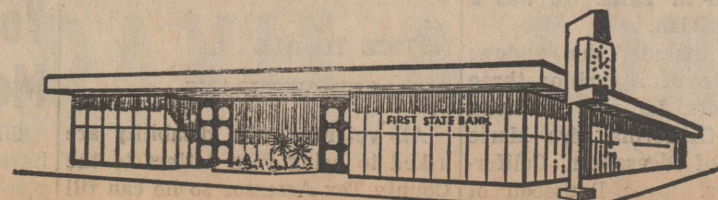

Virtually every bank account (savings or checking) in the United States is insured against loss up to \$40,000 for each account by an agency of the federal government. The agency is called the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or FDIC.

Funds paid into the insurance pool to protect depositor's accounts do not come from taxpayers' pockets, however. The FDIC pool is financed by the banks themselves, who each year pay a certain percentage of funds into the FDIC.

The idea of banks pooling a portion of their funds is not new in this country. In 1819 the Suffolk Bank of Boston began redeeming the notes of other banks, so long as the bank issuing the notes had paid into a redemption fund (like the FDIC pool) established by the Suffolk bank.

The FDIC, which was created after the bank holiday in the early 1930s, also serves as a part of the bank regulatory process, along with the Federal Reserve System, the Comptroller of the Currency and State Banking Agencies.

PARTY SWITCH BANNED

Secretary of State Mark White warned voters Tuesday against switching parties when they vote in the June 5 party runoff primary elections.

His warning came one day before the opening of absentee voting for the run-offs.

If a voter cast his ballot in the May 1 primary of one party, he cannot vote in the runoff of another party, White said. Such switching is a criminal offense under Texas law, he said.

But "voters who did not vote in any primary election on May 1 are eligible to vote in the June 5 runoff elections of any party," said White, who is the chief elections officer of Texas.

He advised voters who might be in doubt to check with county clerks, the secretary of state's office or with election judges at polling places.
