Participates In Hereford Field Day

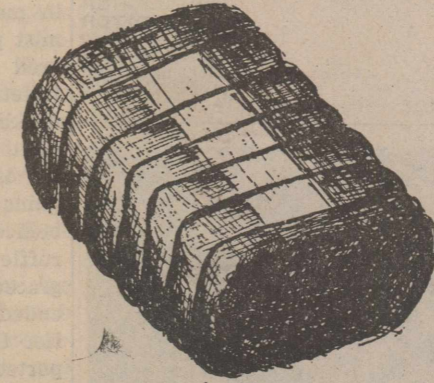
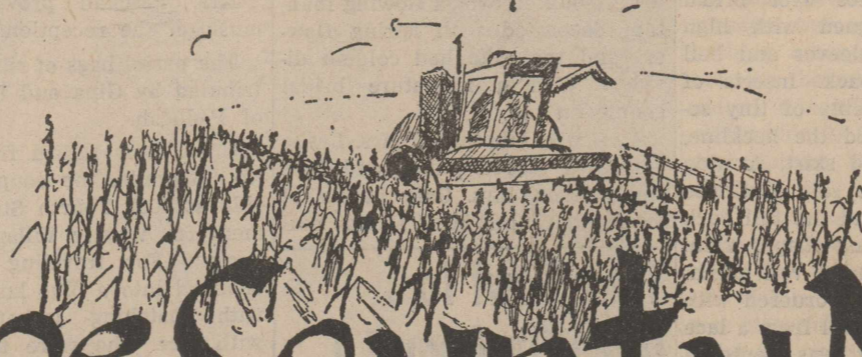

The other team members were from Lamb County 4-H.

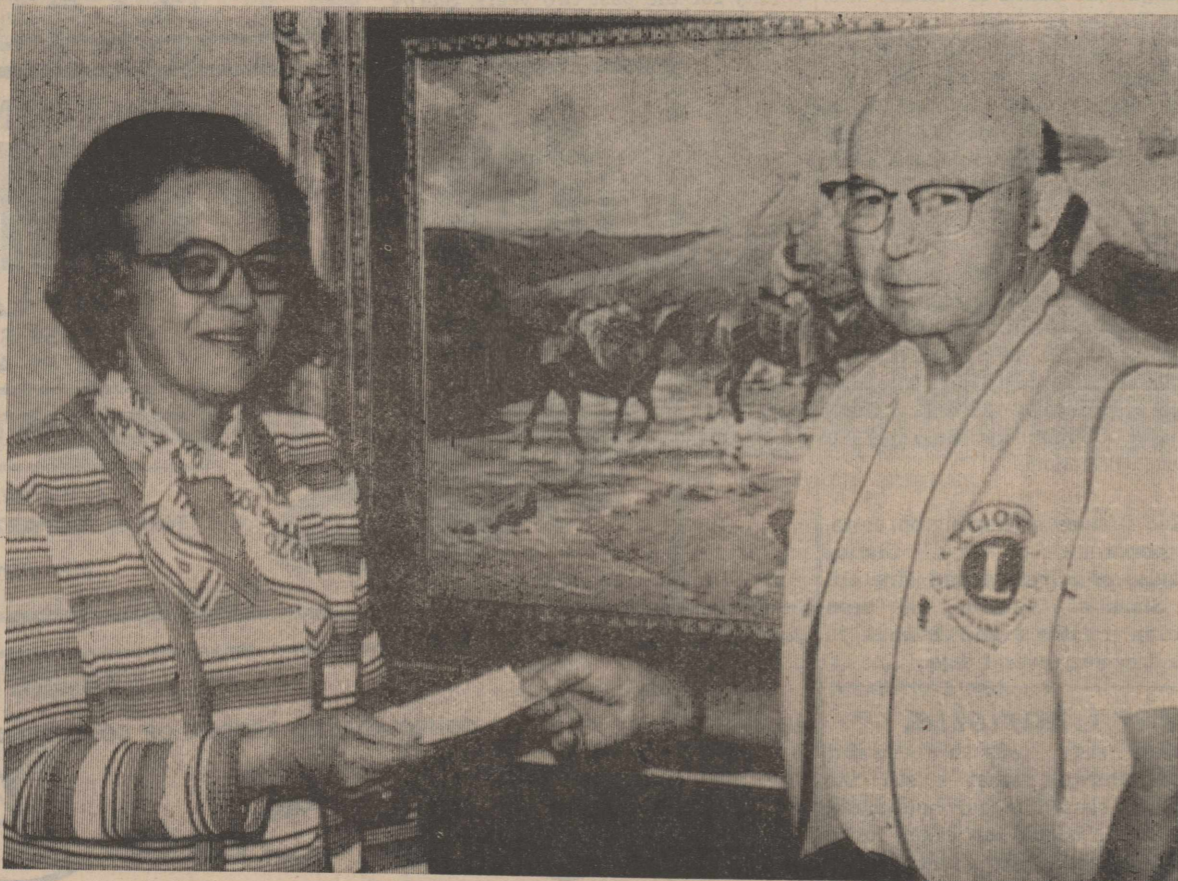

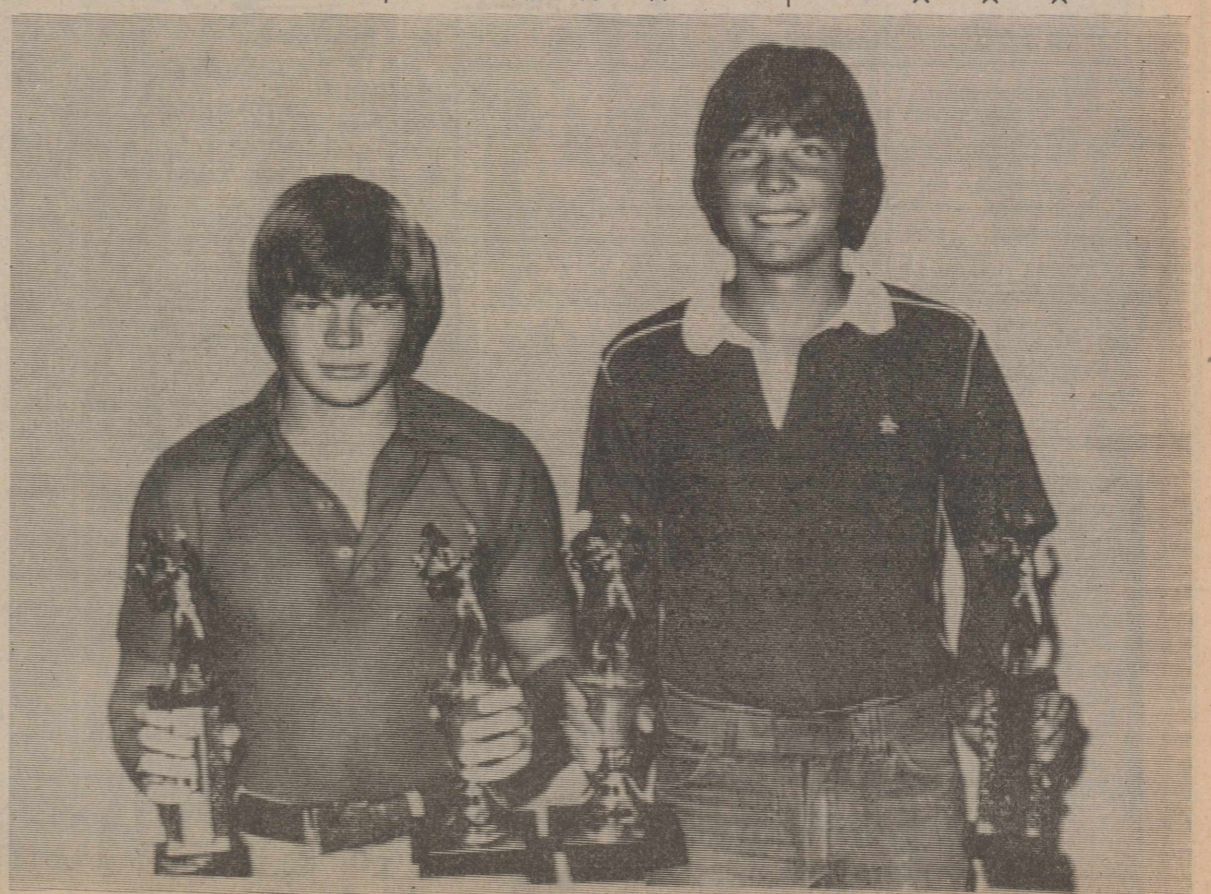

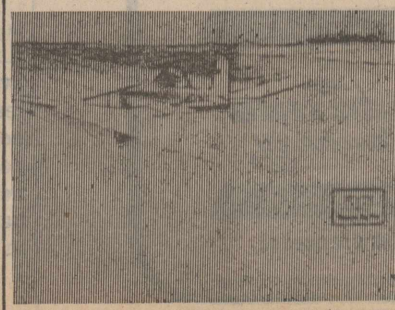
as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit. The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

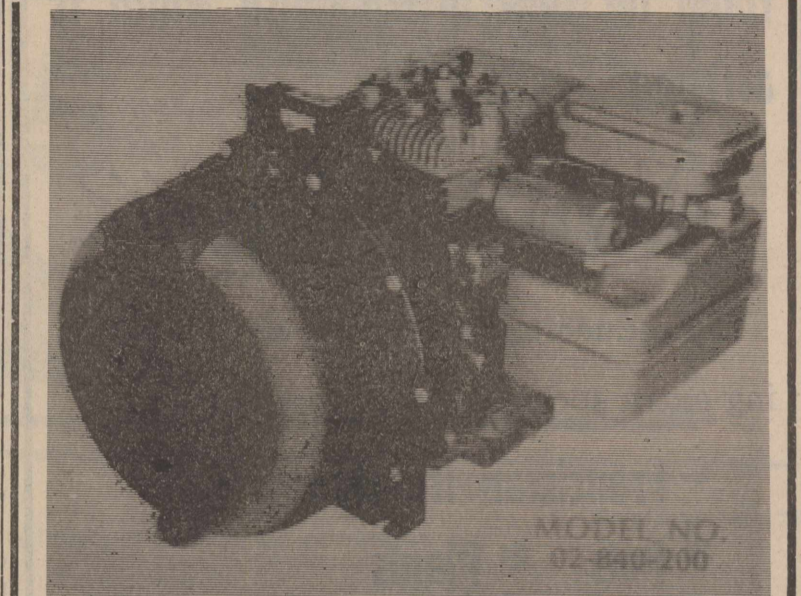

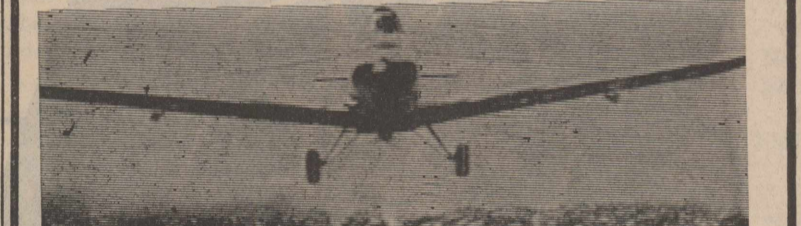
