Amarillo Man Injured At Lake

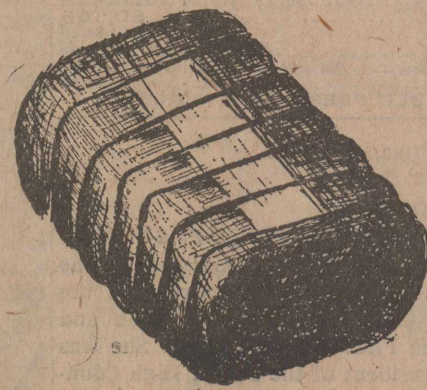
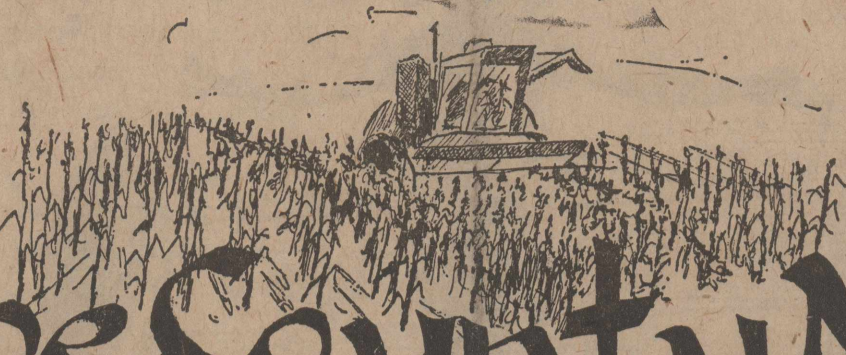
An Amarillo man who had brought his family to Lake Mackenzie for the weekend holds the doubtful distinction of being one of the first to be injured on lake property.

Funds Available For Great Plains SCS Contracts

The Great Plains Conservation Program has been available to Briscoe County land users for 20 years this month. This program is designed for farmers and ranchers who want to treat all of their conservation problems. Two hundred and twenty-five contracts have been developed on 342,509 acres in the county. This is 38% of the operating units and 63% of the agricultural land.

The most popular conservation practices have been brush control, terraces and irrigation pipeline.

The following list of practices can be cost shared: range seeding, pasture planting, field windbreaks, grassed waterways, terraces—parallel and standard, diversion terraces, grade stabilization structures, irrigation pipeline, land leveling, wells for livestock water, pipelines for livestock water, water storage facilities, ponds, cross fencing, brush control, irrigation tailwater recovery system, pollution abatement practices and critical area treatment.

Funds are now available to prepare new GPCP contracts. Contact the office of the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton for further information.

"TEXAS" Is Story Of Panhandle And Its People

"TEXAS", the musical drama which plays on summer evenings in Palo Duro Canyon, is the story of the land in the Texas Panhandle and the people who lived there, both Indian and Anglo. The story is told by a cast of eighty, and a supporting company of sixty more—both Indian and Anglo.

Twenty members of the performing company have Indian drums in their heritage, as do eight members of the technical and hospitality crews. Though their names are Lynn and Cook, Green and Watkins, nine have at least one great-grandparent who was a full-blooded Indian. Stan Easter, Teresa Cook and Rosemary Burkhardt each have an Indian grandparent.

Cherokee and Comanche, Sioux and Choctaw, Creek and Apache are represented in the Company. John Red Fox leads the list. He is the grandson of the famed Sioux Chief, William Red Fox who is renowned for his interpretation of Indian characters on stage and in films. Director of the Indians for Buffalo Bill's Wild West shows, and later for those of the 101 Ranch, he appeared in more than a hundred movies and spent his long life representing his race for audiences of all kinds. He died this spring at the age of 105. John Red Fox plays the role of the old chief in "Texas", and bases a good deal of his interpretation on the character of his grandfather.

The others playing Indian roles in the production draw on the experiences of the ancestors of cast members for their parts.

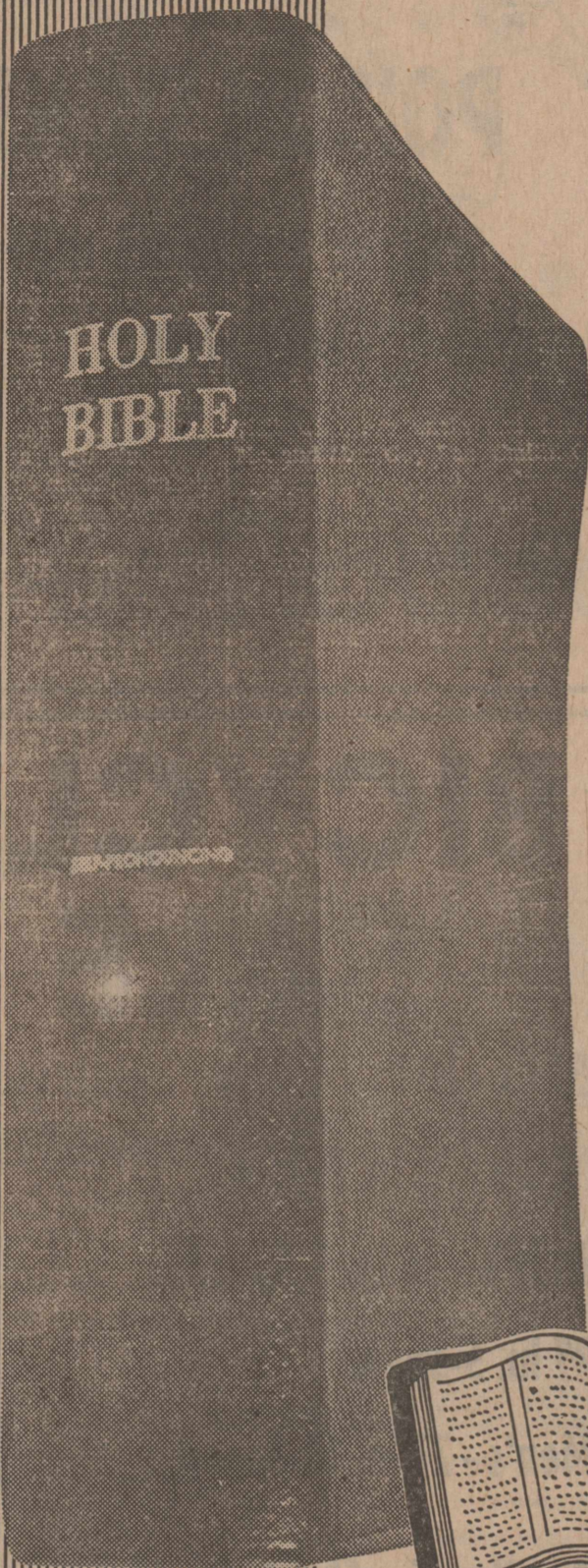

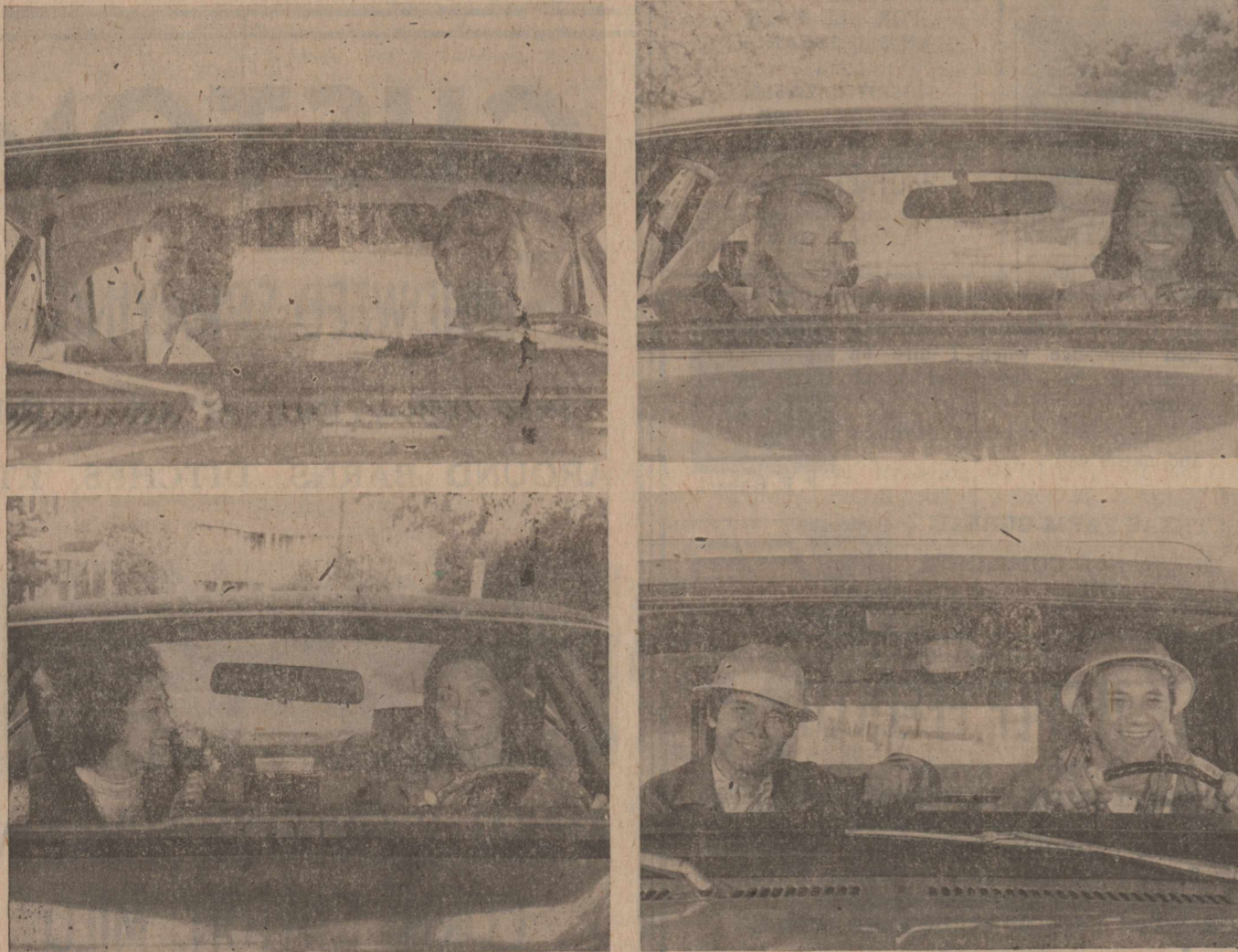

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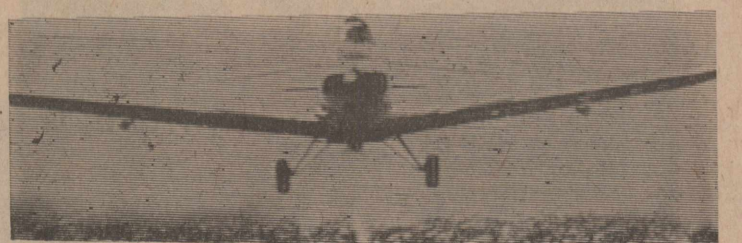
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
