REDUCED PRICE LUNCHES

The Silverton School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 65 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the accompanying scale are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, you must complete an application (available in the office of Superintendent O. C. Rampley) and return it to the school. Within ten days of receiving your application, the principal will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Supt. Rampley, Box 57, Silverton, Texas 79257, 806-823-2476.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify Supt. Rampley or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Owls To Scrimmage At Lefors Friday

The Owls will be traveling to Lefors Friday night to test their strength against the Pirates, a Class B school which Silverton

has had on its regular schedule in seasons past. It has now been several years since the two teams met.

Scrimmage time is 6:30 p.m. The following Friday, the Owls will host the Paducah Dragons for a scrimmage at 6:30 p.m.

Silverton will be playing football this season in District 2-B North Zone, and will have conference games against Valley High (Oct. 1), Happy (Oct. 8), Motley County (Oct. 15), Nazareth (Oct. 22), Lazbuddie (Oct. 29) and Sudan (Nov. 5).

The non-conference schedule will include Kress (Sept. 3), Hart (Sept. 10), Claude (Sept. 17) and Springlake-Earth (Sept. 24).

Coach Weldon McCord is the first to admit that his Owls have just one way to go this season, and that's up. A very young team last season, the Owls went through a winless season in one of the state's toughest Class A districts (2-A) and didn't score in half the games.

But the Owls have quite a few starters back (having lost only three at graduation) and will be in the new surroundings of their Class B district.

About sixteen seniors dot the lineup this year.

The club will run the Veer offense some as well as the Power I and will generally go with a six-man front since good size in the line appears to be a strength of the team.

Quarterback Brent Brannon, a junior letterman, will be pushed for the job by senior letterman David Strange. "We're going to throw more this year and we've got a good target in 6'5" junior letterman Jackie Vaughn," says McCord.

Senior lettermen Carl Wilson, Danny Perkins and Glen Kingery will also be competing for a starting position at end.

There is better size in the back field with 163-pound senior letterman Tommy Lacy and speedy 162-pound senior Chief Davidson, who transferred from Oklahoma last year and was ineligible for the varsity team. Also expected in the starting trio of backs is 150-pound three-year letterman Brent Bean. Senior letterman Gary Younger and sophomore Doug McJimsey also will see action at running back, with Wes Fleming, a 160-pound senior, backing Lacy at fullback.

Up front, 6'2", 225-pound All-District senior Dayne Mayfield, who has started the past three years, 192-pound senior letterman Jim Wilson and 191-pound senior Jack Robertson, a two-year starter, give the Owls good bulk. Gary Turner, a 163-pound senior with two years experience, teams with Robertson at guard while 184-pound junior letterman Jace Francis and 155-pound sophomore Earl Jarrett are ready for action in the line. Two-year letterman Jeff Jones and sophomore Mitchell Simpson will handle centering duties.

Both Wilsons, Perkins, Mayfield, Francis, Turner, Robertson, Brannon, Lacy, Davidson and Bean are expected to start on defense with Lacy and Davidson at linebackers. The schedule will be rough,

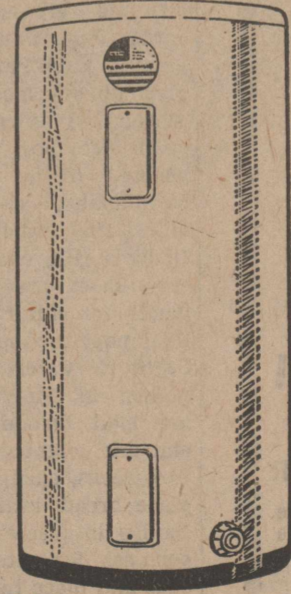

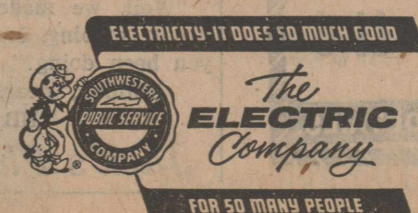

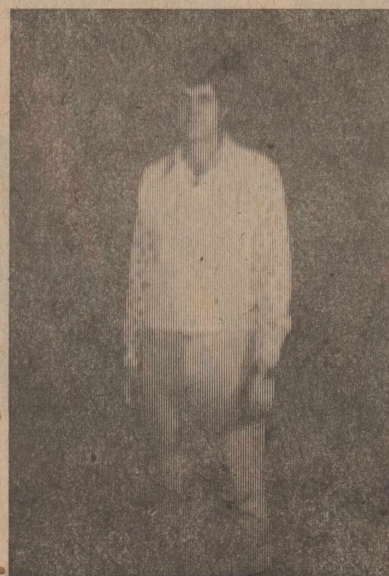

Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon also appeared in the parade and greeted constituents later during the barbecue.

The barbecue was served by members of Silverton service organizations. The meat and other food were donated by Briscoe County businesses, individuals and organizations.

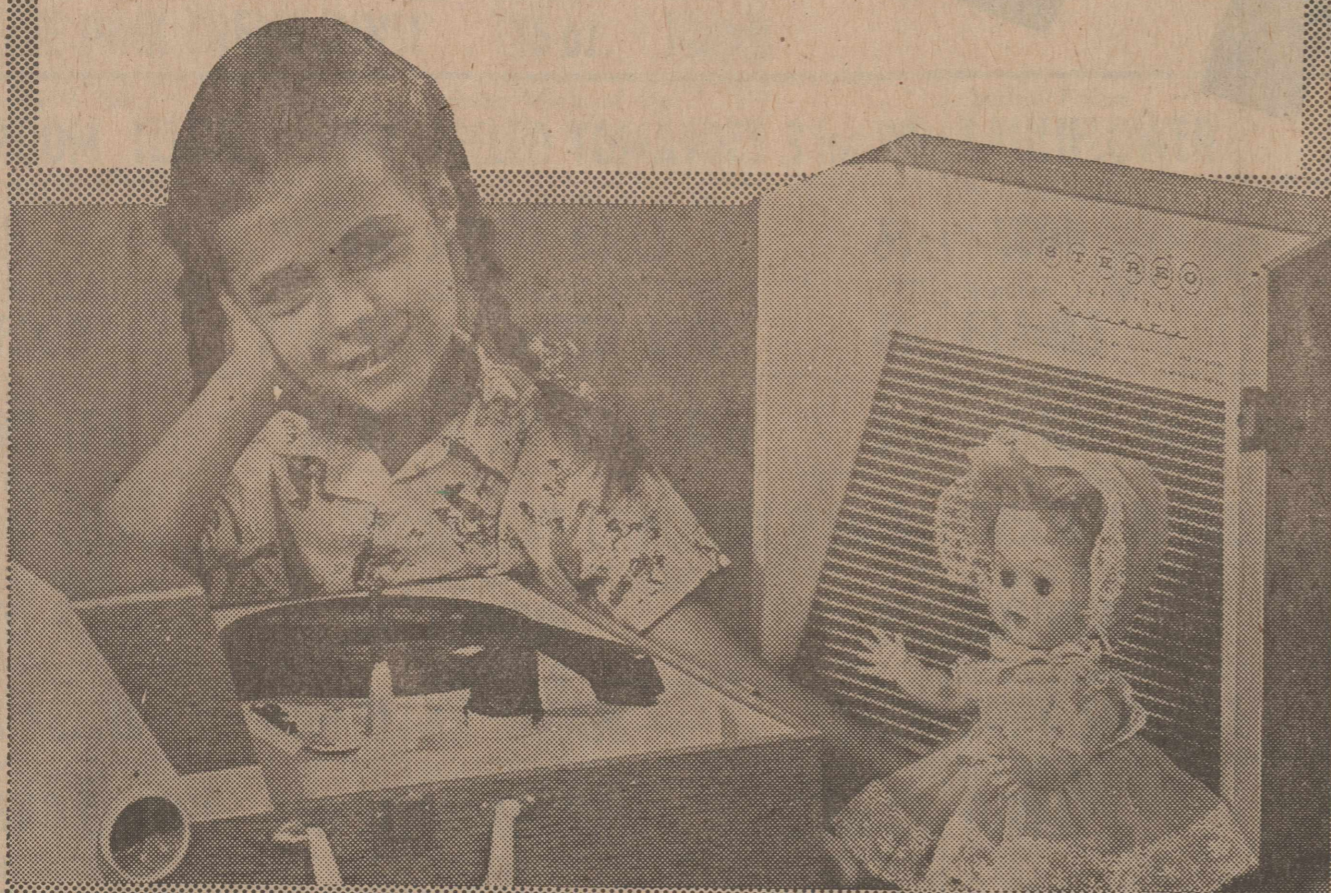

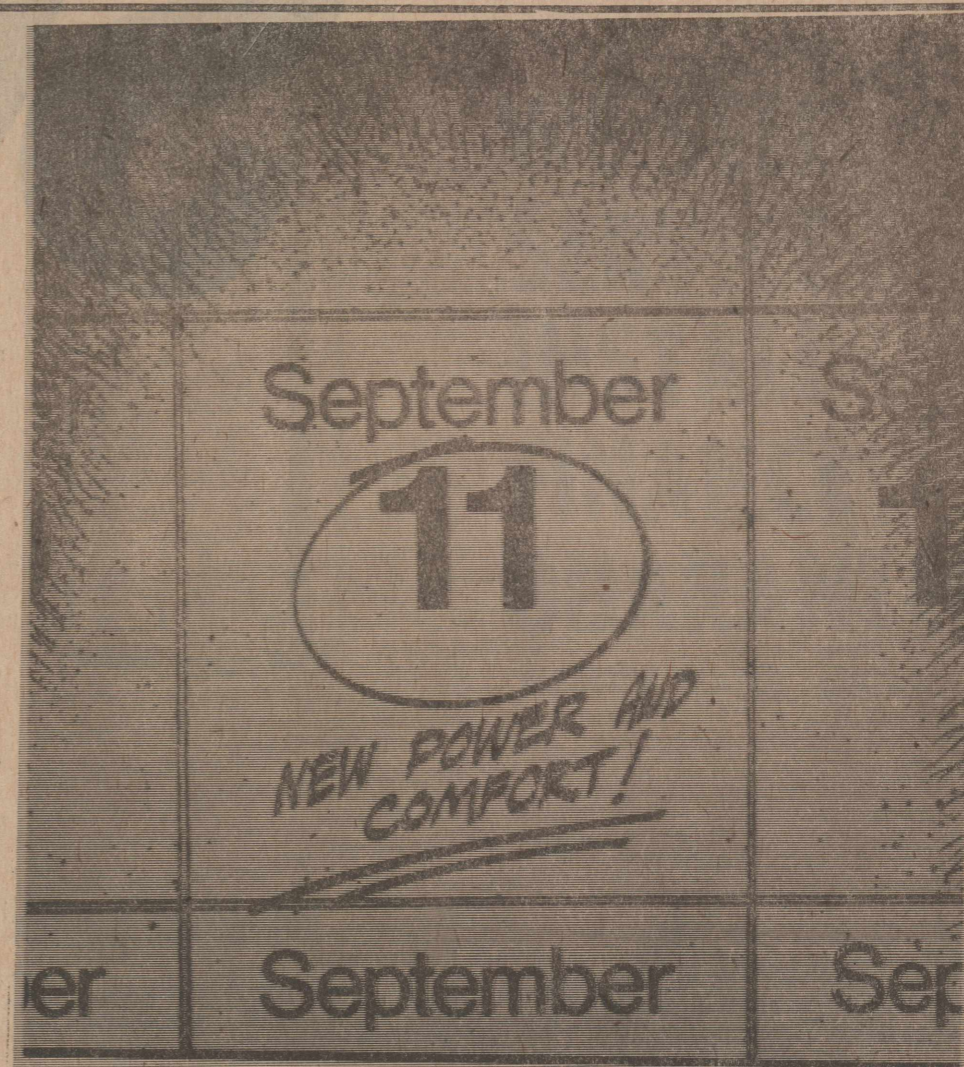

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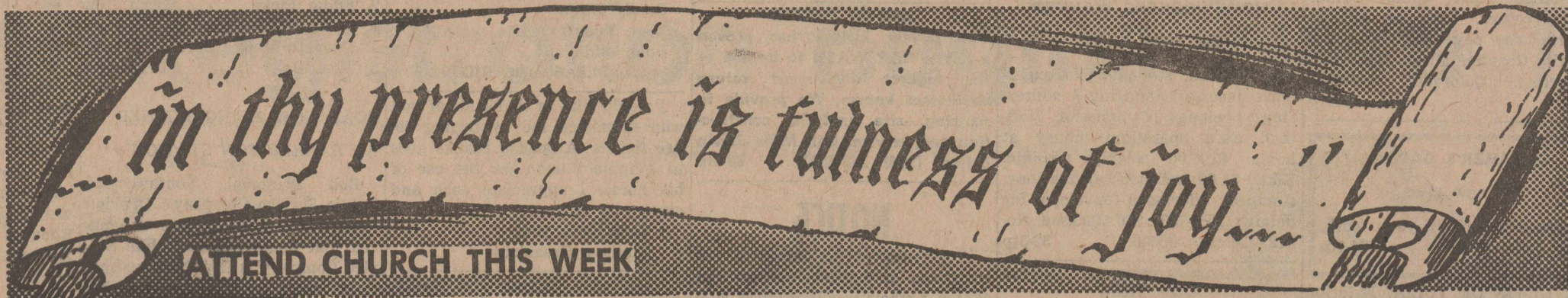
