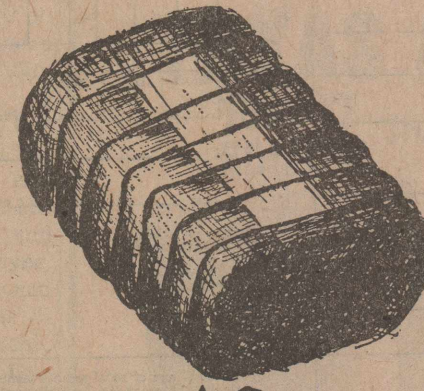
Music was under the direction of C. L. Mohon, jr., with Mrs. C. L. Mohon, sr., at the organ.

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Coaches Pleased With Outcome Of First Scrimmage

"Our defense looked good after they adjusted" to the type of offense Lefors was using against us," commented Coach Weldon McCord following the Owls' first practice outing last Friday night. "Our offense was inconsistent; at times it looked good. We have been working this week to shape it up. On the whole, the coaches were pretty well pleased with the boys after only one week of work."

The teams will be scrimmaging the Paducah Dragons at home beginning at 6:30 p.m. Friday. The concession stand will be open, and

it is hoped that fans will patronize the stand to help the Booster Club make the money it needs to pay for the work it has done on the new fieldhouse.

Work on the fieldhouse is not finished, by any means, but it is off to a very good beginning. The dressing rooms and showers have been provided for all the home and visiting football teams, and in addition to the weight room, the old junior high building now contains a good equipment room and a comfortable-size office for the coaches. Some type of floor cov-

ering is needed to replace the tile flooring which has come loose in many places, but this can easily be added later. A lot of wear and tear on the gymnasium and its floors has been eliminated by the use of the fieldhouse. (Speaking of the gym, it has seldom been seen as shining clean as it now is.)

In addition, since the law imposed on schools now requires the physical education classes to be offered to boys and girls together, the fieldhouse makes it possible to house activities for both boys and girls at the same time with-

out either interfering with the activities of the other. Incidentally, Coach McCord said the coed P. E. classes have been going a long very smoothly.

Superintendent O. C. Rampley this week praised the Booster Club members for the work they have done on the fieldhouse, saying, "They have spent many man hours working on the fieldhouse in addition to the money they have spent for materials. The donation of their labor amounts to as much or more in dollars and cents than their actual cash out-

lay. The school really cannot praise this group too highly for their contribution to our athletic program."

Physical education is offered on an every-other-day basis to the Third and Fourth grades this year.

The coaches don't have anything (except a desk) in the way of furniture for their office in the fieldhouse, but they are hoping that somehow some can be provided. They will be having visitors in their office, including visiting coaches, referees, etc., and would like very much to have a used couch and a couple of chairs. There is enough room for lounge or overstuffed-type chairs, if anyone has these items they would donate.

At the present time, there are 38 players on the varsity and junior varsity football rosters. Kyle Dunn is serving as team manager until such time as he can pass his physical to play football.

School Enrollment Down again this Year

"A few more are expected to enroll, but as things stand, our enrollment is down from last year," Principal B. J. Willis said Wednesday.

The high school enrollment stood at 112, down six from this time last year. The enrollment in the first eight grades stood at 195, down 20 from the first week of school last year.

The high school enrollment was 118 at this time last year, off nine from the previous year. There were 215 in the first eight grades, off 29 from the year before.

The total school enrollment stood at 307, down 26 from the 333 figure reported at the same time last year.

MASSIVE STATEWIDE VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVE BEING CONDUCTED THIS YEAR

Secretary of State Mark White has announced that his office is conducting a massive, statewide voter registration drive for this fall's Presidential election. A pilot registration drive was conducted last spring, White said, and it added around 400,000 new voters to the rolls in Texas.

"Last spring's experience convinced us we need to enlarge our registration efforts," White said. "The new Texas registration law makes it easier than ever before to vote in Texas, and we are trying to make sure every citizen is aware of that fact." Under the new registration law,

Texans need only fill out a registration postcard and mail it, White said, adding that the registration deadline for the November 2 election is October 1. Registration applications are available through county tax assessors or by calling a toll-free number in White's Austin office, he said. The number, which is open during business hours, is 1-800-292-9602. "Applications will also be on display in food stores around the state," White said. "There is one

printed adjacent to this news release in your hometown newspaper. We hope to literally put voter registration at the fingertips of most Texans before the registration deadline." White noted that only 20 percent of voting-age Texans went to the polls in 1974, which was an "off year" involving no national elections. In the last Presidential election, White said, 43 percent of voting-age Texans cast ballots. "Clearly there is room for improvement, and we hope our drive will help," White said. "We hope every Texan will register and vote."

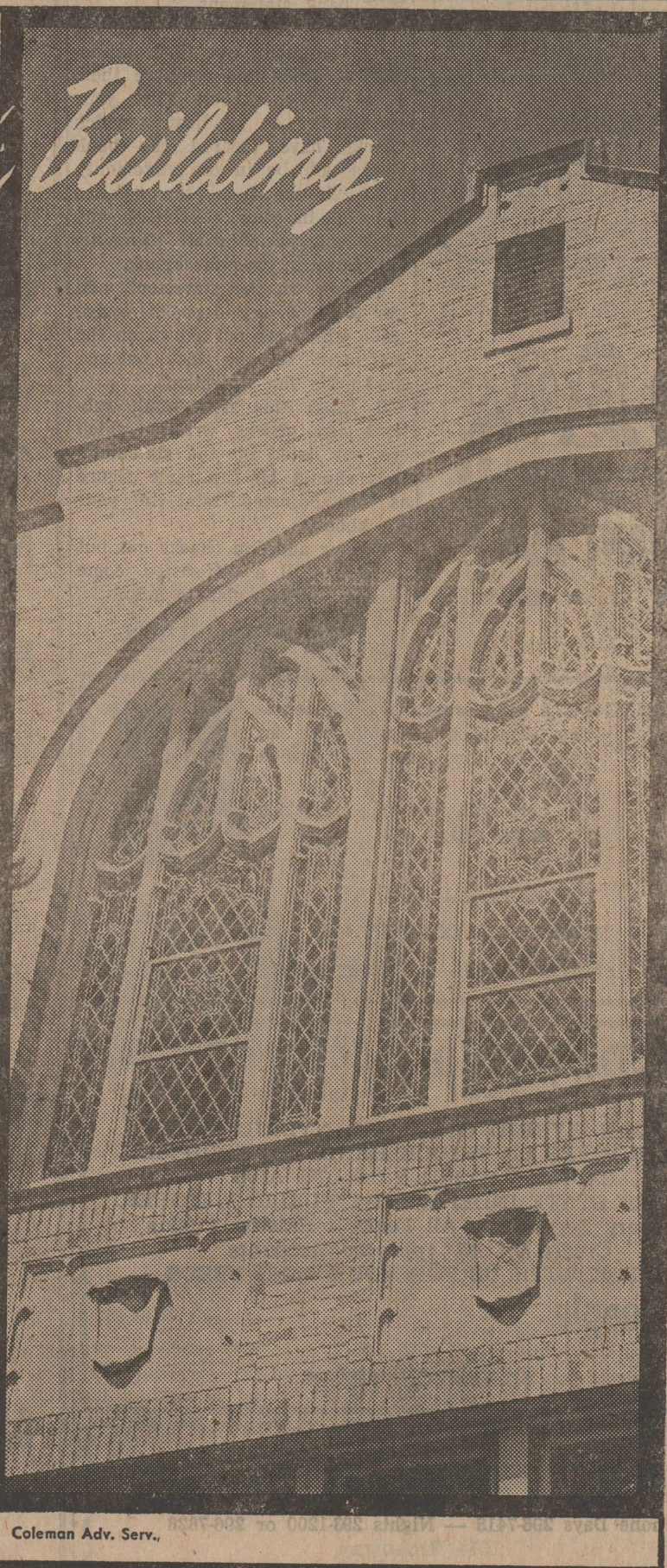

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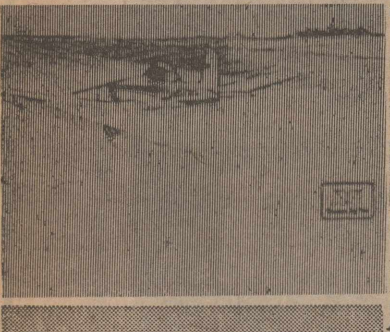

You Can BANK on it!
Getting the total in your checkbook to agree with the figures on your bank statement can be either next to impossible or relatively easy. The process of making these figures agree is called reconciliation. Here are some tips to make it simpler.

- 1—Don't wait around; do the reconciliation the day you receive your bank statement.
 - 2—Take your checks from the bank statement, put them in numerical order and compare them with your checkbook. Mark your checkbook to indicate which checks have cleared the bank (these will be in the statement).
 - 3—Subtract from the balance showing in your checkbook any bank charges or draft payments not shown in your checkbook.
 - 4—Now on the statement, add the total of any deposits you've made which are not shown on the statement to the last balance shown (on the statement).
 - 5—From this new total, subtract any checks written which are not listed on the statement. This should be the same figure as the adjusted total in your checkbook.
