ROCHESTER MAN KILLED AT ABILENE

He is survived by a wife and four children and other relatives. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. L. E. Frazier pastor of the First Baptist church of that city.

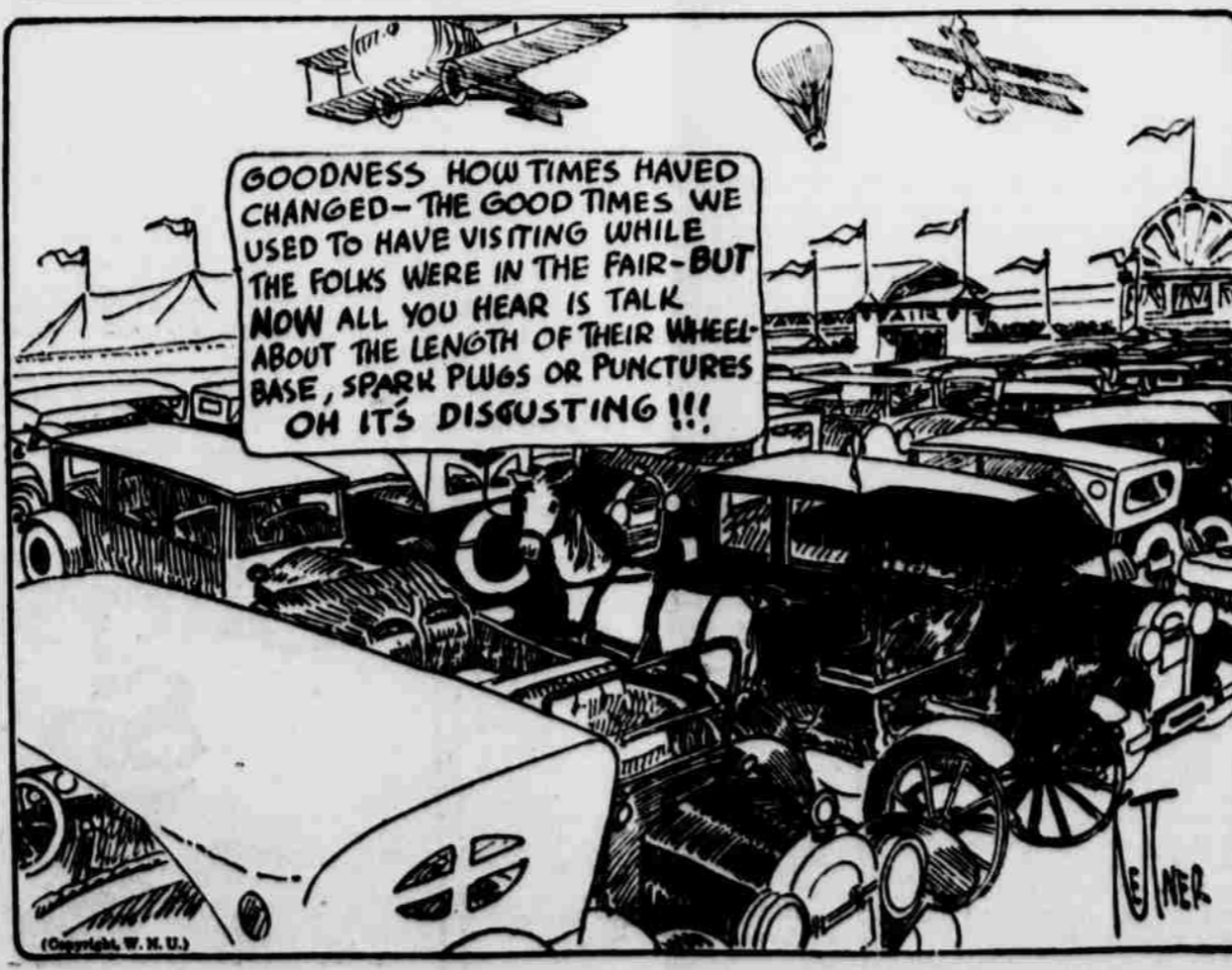

SHOULD TOWN PUBLICITY BE MAINTAINED BY TAXATION

Continuing my story of facts and figures on city and town publicity & taxation of week before last, I might say, that Mr. Lewis H. Chasel, secretary of the Marion County Chamber of Commerce, says: Experience has proved that community advertising intelligently directed is highly profitable. The best means for financing community advertising is another matter. It is my belief that it can best be done through taxation and that the funds so raised can best be spent through a chamber of commerce or board of city development.

cover over head costs. It is my judgment, therefore, that community advertising which benefits every property owner and tax payer, should be paid for out of the funds secured by a special tax for that purpose, putting the burden upon all alike and not too heavy on any in particular. The funds so raised should be spent by the Board of City Development or Chamber of Commerce, or some similar organization, because I am convinced that they will thus be most effectively spent in the most disinterested manner and without partisan political influence. Those Chambers of Commerce of Florida that are financed through a publicity tax up to this time have been successful to a marked degree. Organizations in over twenty Florida counties are now operated through a publicity tax, also many in Texas.

membership dues being nominal, from 50 cents to \$4.00 for the year. From one and a half to two and a half mills are assessed for this purpose in larger cities like Jacksonville, \$50,000; and Tampa, \$100,000; \$10,000 from the city and \$20,000 from the county; I. P. Dick-ey, Sec. of the Tampa Board says: "The City of Tampa and County of Hillsborough have for several years levied a millage on the taxable properties of the city and county to create a publicity fund, at the beginning of each year the officials of the Tampa Board of City Development prepare a budget of the estimated expenses during the following 12 months. This includes salaries, all overhead expenses, printing, entertainment, booklets, postage, tourist activities, band concerts, booster and trade trips, traveling expenses, exhibits, art work, and all advertising etc. With few minor changes as it is adopted by the city and county officials. There is no real distinction between one class of expense and another.

Apparently the general public is very well pleased with this means of raising funds for the activities of a commercial body, good results have come from the work and public men are satisfied or the officials would not continue to make these funds available and in no case has it been discontinued where it has once been tried.

The small community that has the kind of spirit, that dares to do and achieve can be created by the right kind of publicity work, financed by the community tax.

Many of the readers of this article have read from fifty cents to \$2.00 for a seat to look upon that thrilling and much advertised motion picture attraction, "Down to the Sea in Ships." There is no commercial advertising or industrial advertising in it, yet the little town of New Bedford raised \$175,000 to have the picture filmed in their town.

They are at this time amending the laws of the state of Georgia so that the County Commissioners can appropriate money for advertising and hope by coming through special legislation an appropriation of \$200,000 for publicity purposes having seen what wonders the same has done for their sister state Florida.

The States Washington and Oregon and the Province of British Columbia, by legislative acts, have authorized the expenditure of \$25,000 to be used to advertise jointly the resources and advantages of the Pacific International Northwest Country, California issues literature for distribution and advertising. The same is done nationally annually by some twenty counties in this state.

I have now covered in the last three articles the United States in a general way and there is not to my knowledge any compilation or disaffiliation of all the municipalities, counties and states which have made use of the Publicity Tax for upbuilding activities.

You will find the opposition to the Publicity Tax is largely engendered by individuals and concerns whose business is to "put on drives" to increase membership of Commercial Organizations. The public is fed up on drives. You will again find a few that are against it who own good business property that is paying them an income and who never gave a dime to a commercial organization in their lives yet have been profiting by the efforts and funds of the real progressive of the city that has increased the value of the property they now hold.

The Publicity Tax puts every dollar to actual work, there is no money wasted in drives or bill collectors. It avoids rousing the disgust of members who attend meetings by turning them into a begging party, which is the real beginning of the end of commercial organizations. The Publicity Tax makes it possible to treat all alike, for they have paid according to their means. When some big interest, to maintain an organization, planks down \$100 or \$10,000 as the case may be, it becomes favored, even if there be no requests for favors. The Publicity Tax works no hardship on anyone. In the larger cities one half mill is sufficient for all purposes, and even were it two mills, the small tax payer will have to pay from 10 cents to 50 cents a year for publicity. But it does not extract from the man with fish hooks in his pockets attribute according to his means or meanness. It also gives the railroads, telegraph and telephone companies and foreign corporations, chain stores and non-residence, a chance to give their mite. They profit as the town grows, and 98 cases out of a hundred they don't contribute one penny to the local trade today. In a certain county I have in mind, large timber interests sought an injunction to restrain the county from collecting a publicity tax. This company had timberland 50,000 acres of virgin pine timber, then timbered the land and left it in waste, and were offering the cut over land for sale at \$5 per acre. They were taxed about \$100 a square mile on their holdings after they had taken a fortune off of it. The tax was \$3 a square mile. The Publicity Tax was SIX CENTS A SQUARE MILE. They simply wanted to be nasty. The court denied the injunction. The tax assessor assessed the land at \$5 per acre, the land company raised the roof to the sky, and began to unload. Much of the land went into the hands of small possessors who cleared it and planted many hundreds of acres. Today land that went bogging at 5 per acre is being sold at \$100 to \$200 per acre and the land company now praises the Publicity Tax.

Old-time farmers and grove owners who were land poor, who claimed that taxes were nothing but confiscation and the publicity tax a scheme to make a fat position for some one, pay their taxes the first month the books are open, and come around to the Board of City Development and feed the force with cigars.

If there is a more equitable way to operate a Chamber of Commerce or Board of City or County Development than by the Publicity Tax I would like to be told all about it, or if there is any real logical argument against it, except that it is liable to run civic matters into politics, I would like to see it in print.

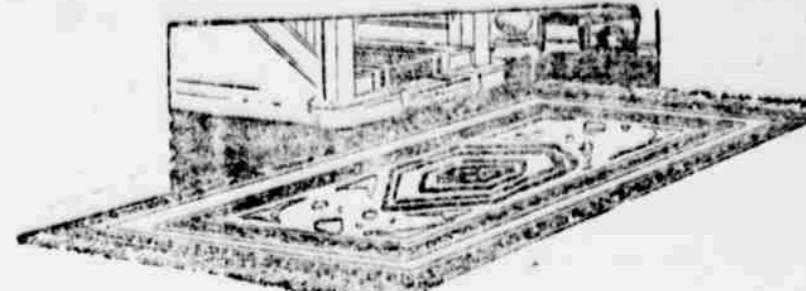

FROM THE FIELD

(Last week's letter.) Sunday night September 14th, we received a long distance phone call that our only brother who was living near Lamesa on the south plains had been run down by an automobile and had died from his injuries about 9 o'clock that afternoon. It was very painful news to us as this brother and myself were the only ones living out of a family of eight children. As most of our readers know we are an amateur car driver and the roads were very bad, but the phone call from the family of my brother insisted that we come at once. We made preparation and left Haskell about 2 a. m. Monday morning on our long journey. We were accompanied by our oldest daughter Ella Mae. We reached Hamlin before day light and proceeded on to Rotan where we stopped a few moments and ate breakfast. We were soon on our way going by the way of Snyder and Hall and on to Lamesa. This was said to be the shortest route but the roads were very bad. After 14 hours of steady driving we reached Lamesa at 4 p. m. just one hour after the body of my brother had been laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery in that city. You will find a detailed account of the accident in another part of this issue given by the Lamesa Reporter. It seemed that my brother had used every precaution in parking his car to avoid accident but a youth of Lamesa who was alleged to be a very reckless driver was running very fast and with out consideration of the fact that the night was dark ran into a car and a life was snuffed out without warning.

According to the information obtained from those who were present and the sheriff, and others who viewed the scene there was no cause on the part of my brother for the accident and only the recklessness of a youth who was not looking where he was driving caused this horrible tragedy and the sorrow to a family that can not be repaired.

The automobile is a blessing if used with proper care and is the safest means of travel where the drivers are mindful of their duty, but when turned over to boys and girls with the idea in their heads that they are the only individuals on the streets or highways then they become more deadly than any one thing in all the world. This has been proven over and over again. But people will not heed and one sad accident after another is daily taking place.

We notice our own people here in Haskell driving cars too fast around corners and in the streets and we are only waiting our turn until some sad accident will be the consequence. When it happens no doubt all parties concerned would give all they possess that it might not have been this, but that will not undo the act. It can be prevented by careful driving. Occasions are like angels, few and far between that require the speed that the Automobile drivers have acquired from the habit of fast driving through the streets and crowded thoroughfares.

Friday morning we set out in our Buick for Jud by the way of Rule. We stopped with Editor E. B. Harris at the Rule Review office and found him busy getting his type arranged for the next week.

Rev. Brownlove, pastor of the Methodist Church, as also in the office. We drove to Jud stopping at the store of Bonann Kerr, who has been at Jud for a number of years and has been in business quite a while in that city. He says that business was good with him and the gin was running full capacity all the while. Jud has a fine cotton crop this year and they were very busy picking cotton in that section. We drove to the home of our old friend W. L. Ray who was in a rush picking cotton. He is said by many to have grown the best maize crop in the history of this country this year. He also reports a fine cotton crop. Mrs. Ray gave us a good dinner. Raymond Elliott was with us and that boy sure did eat a dinner. Mrs. Ray is a good cook and we enjoyed the good dinner and the association of these our friends.

Friday afternoon we drove to Rochester where we met many friends and the city was in a stir getting ready for the Stamford Boosters who were expected there at 3:45. She was preparing to give the Boosters a royal reception.

We stopped with our friend J. H. Walk near Rochester. He has out 17 bales of cotton and was just getting started to picking. He has a good cotton crop this year.

We drove to Knox City, and only having a few moments we stopped at Press Hitchcock's barber shop. He is a former Haskell boy who has made good in the barber business. He is ably assisted by Mr. Pate and Smith, who have been located in Knox City for quite a while. They are a fine bunch of fellows and know how to relieve all who are suffering with a bad case of "whiskers."

We came back by O'Brien and spent a few moments in the city, meeting T. V. Thomas, C. M. Walsworth, T. B. Austin and other business men of the city.

O'Brien is very prosperous this year. Her trade territory has an excellent crop of feed and cotton, and cotton picking was getting in "high" all over the country and things were humming all around.

We drove from O'Brien to Haskell

and note good crops and people very busy all along the way. Elliott and I enjoyed the trip thoroughly.
