It's a sad, but true, statement that the people of Silverton have been taken!

A month ago, the clinic board mailed a contract to Dr. Francisco de Vera, and received a letter in reply from him stated that the contract was fair and acceptable and that he was looking forward to moving to Silverton to practice medicine. He stated that he needed a house to rent and some help in securing his license.

"These are amongst several imbeen offered to sign a Contract day afternoon. to work as an Emergency Room Physician in Houston, with a minimum annual guaranteed income of \$56,000 plus paid interview and moving expenses, free life, disability, medical and malpractice insurance and a very comfortable three bedroom house to rent in one of the best neighborhood locations in Houston. To be fair, even though the Contract is here ney. with me, I have not signed nor committed myself to them not until I have given Silverton a

"I would like to offer certain additional provisions in the Contract to be signed by me and the Briscoe County Medical Association, which upon your approval, would definitely change our decision into a favorable one for

1. Paid interview and moving deavors.

2. Guaranteed annual minimum income of \$60,000.00 for the first year. In the event that half of such figure is not attained within six months, I have the option to leave Silverton and automatically dissolve such contract without any legal consequences on my

3. Free maintenance and insurance of clinic including the procurement of necessary apparatus, equipment (see enclosed list), paid utility bills and paid malpractice insurance (\$200,000.00 policy) for the first six months.

4. Written assurance of a physician's assistant, nurse or allaround Medical Technologist to start work in clinic within 30 days from start of my practice, to be handled exclusively by the members of the board subject to my approval in hiring such employee.

5. Written assurance of a comfortable roomy and decent home consisting of three bedrooms to rent and further requirements of my family.

6. Immediate financial back-up by the Briscoe County Medical Association through local financial institution on the first few months of my practice.

"In closing we sincerely wish to make Silverton our next home, but unfortunately we have several and difficult problems that we have to contend with and we hope you all understand our predicaments," Dr. de Vera concluded.

In the most ladylike language I can think of, we've been had! Of course it is a consideration if you are trying to get waivers to rush the processing of a license to practice medicine for a doctor who is moving to a town and county with no doctor. But since he changed his mind about so many things so quickly, I am wondering if he ever really intended to move to Silverton, Texas USA.


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

Worth Alexander was a good man in the fullest sense of

Born in California, he was raised in Texas. In his middle teens he returned to California. His mother died when he was very young. His father remarried. His step-mother became a very good mother to him.

Twenty-five years ago he met were married in St. Francis de Sales Church in Oakland. Then Every time you eat or drink. of their marriage a tree that bore much good fruit. Carefully they tended that tree through the years.

Seven children were born, all of them living, Debi, Bob, Vickie, Frances, Pat, Nancy and Bernadette. They were given a solid ceived excellent moral training and good example at home. They have not failed their parents' hopes and prayers. Mr. Alexander was a strict father, but always fair. He got along with his children beautifully. He only wished he could have walked his daughters down the aisle in marriage. He will in spirit. Worth's whole life was his home, his wife and his kids.

Worth Alexander had a wonderful personality. Everybody liked him. He had a thousand friends where he worked for some 35 years. He leased a parking lot in the heart of the old South of Market district of San Francisco, on Minna Street, between 4th an 5th, not far from St. Patrick's Church. Worth had a delightful sense of humor.

About seven years ago Worth Alexander discovered that he had cancer. He did not give up. Prayers seemed to have worked some kind of miracle, because after a couple of years of pain and medication, the disease seemed to have gone away. God gave a blessed reprieve for a few years. In the last year or so the cancer returned and was the hand of God taking Worth to Himself.

. . . Though he was always an upright, Godly man, and though he was a partner in the raising of his children in the Catholic Religion, he himself was not a Catholic. Often he went to church with the family on great feasts. On November 17, 1971, he was baptized and received into the Catholic Church by Fr. La Barbera. From that day on he has been an exemplary Catholic. He went to Mass and to Communion every Sunday until his illness kept him away in the last few weeks. Then Christ went to him. His faith in Christ's presence in the Eucharist was strong. After Communion he would kneel with his head buried in his hands.

It is sad to see a good man go. The world could do with a lot more Worth Alexanders. The world is better for his coming. It will still feel his influence. Good men leave their footprints in the sands of time.

I could wish for nothing better for his children than that they serve God and their fellow man as their father did.

Monday night the Junior High teams split a pair of games at Lakeview, the Owlettes dropping a 27-25 decision, and the Owls earning a 30-25 victory.


