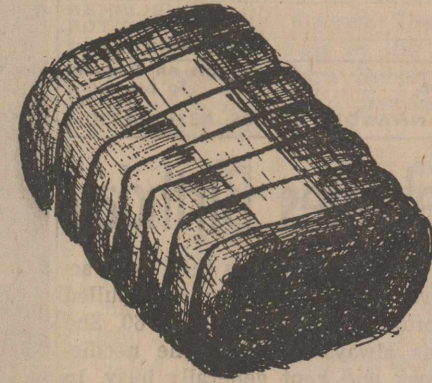
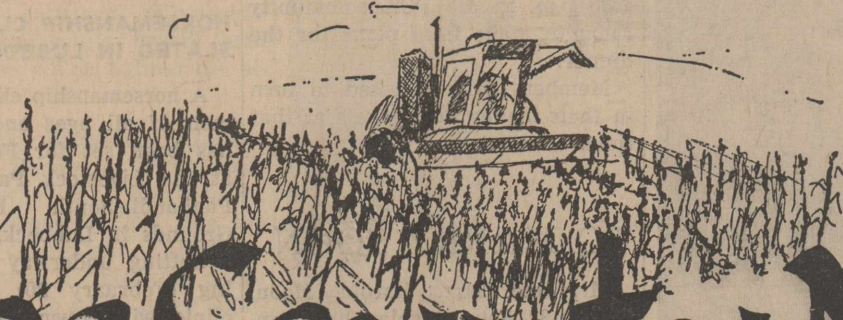

First Baptist Church in Silverton will host a World Missions Conference beginning at 7:00 p.m. today (Thursday, February 19).

"This is a rare experience and opportunity for everyone in the community," said Rev. Larry Wilson, pastor. "Such conferences normally are not available to the smaller, rural congregations."

Described as being similar to a revival emphasis, but mission oriented, the World Missions Conference is designed to lead people to an increased involvement in sharing their Christian testimony, mission action, prayer for missions, and presenting missions as a possible Christian vocational choice.

Scheduled to speak during the four-day conference are both home and foreign missionaries.

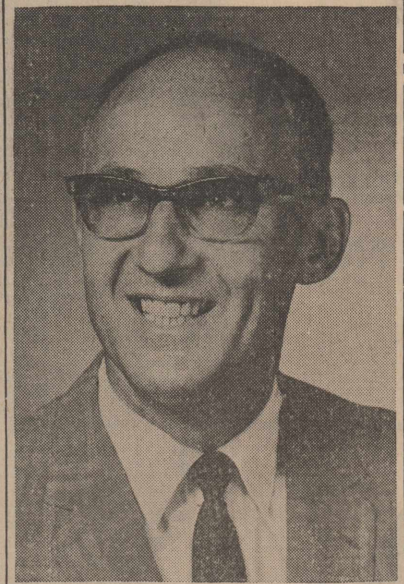
Thursday, February 19, at 7:00 p.m. the emphasis will begin with Rev. Logan C. Atnip as guest speaker. He will be followed on Friday, February 20, at 7:00 p.m. by Mrs. Meredith E. Wyatt.

Saturday at 7:00 p.m. the speaker will be Rev. James W. Hatley. Sunday at 11:00 a.m. the speaker will be Rev. Joe W. Bruce, and Sunday at 6:00 p.m. Rev. Jim Howard Goins will fill the pulpit.

The general public is invited to attend any or all of the special missionary sessions, regardless of denominational preference. The World Missions Conference is a continuing series of programs being offered concurrently in 12 participating churches within the Caprock Baptist Association.

HORSEMANSHIP CLINIC SLATED IN LUBBOCK

A horsemanship clinic for horse-men of all ages and experiences has been set for February 20-21 at the Livestock Pavilion of the Panhandle-South Plains Fair Grounds in Lubbock.

Getting underway Friday evening (February 20) at 5:30, the clinic will cover halter training, basic western horsemanship, equipment, maneuvers, showmanship and performance events. Most of the activities on Saturday will deal with performance instruction, including western pleasure, western horsemanship, hunter hack and timed events.

B. F. Yeates and Doug Householder, horse specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, will teach the clinic, according to Billy C. Gunter, District Extension Agent.

"Yeates and Householder are both veterans with years of experience in dealing with horses and horsemanship," says Gunter. Anyone within a day's drive of Lubbock is encouraged to attend.

OF PRAYER

"Give ear to my words, O Lord, consider my meditation. Harken unto the voice of my cry, my King, and my God: for unto thee will I pray."

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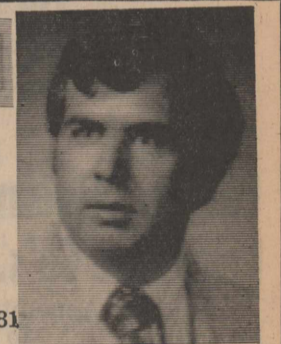

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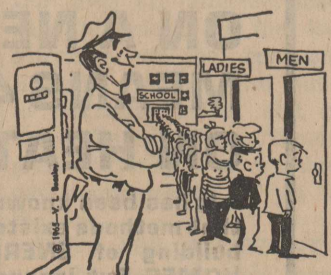

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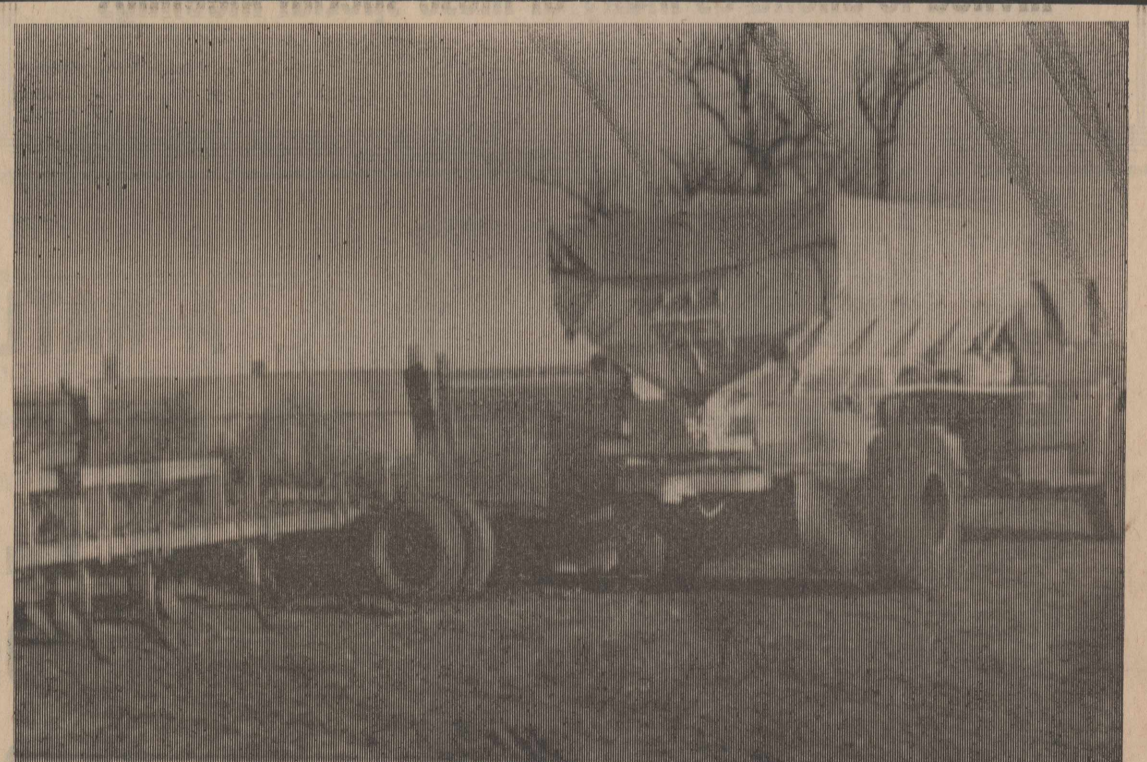
