## AN OPEN LETTER <br> TO THE VOTERS OF THE 13th CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT FROM CONGRESSMAN JACK HIGHTOWER

Two years ago I was elected to Congress by an overwhelming margin against an incumbent Congressman. During the 1974 campaign 1 refrained from any personal attacks on my opponent.
