For example, if withdrawals are made by the depositor before the age of 591/2 there is a penalty on the amount withdrawn . . . and income taxes will have to be paid. After age 59½ withdrawals may

be made in a lump sum, or in monthly, quarterly or yearly installments with taxes paid on the basis of taxable income at the time of withdrawal.

It's a good idea to review the withdrawal system at age 701/2, because at that time a lump sum withdrawal may be beneficial for tax reasons (taxes will probably
