Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA's) are still new enough that
here are several unanswered quesions. First, the accounts are desor his or her own the planning fr his or her own retirement
who is not already under a retirement plan (not counting social security). Secondly, there are some ground rules which should be unerstood about withdrawals from
he IRA. For IRA. re made by the depositor befors the age of $591 / 2$ there is a penalty on the amount withdrawn $\ldots$ and income taxes will have to be paid.
After age $591 / 2$ withdrawals After age 59 $1 / 2$ withdrawals may
be made in a lump sum, or in monthly, quarterly or yearly installments with taxes paid on the basis of taxable inco
time of withdrawal
It's a good idea to review the withdrawal system at age $701 / 2$,
because at that time a lump sum withdrawal may be beneficial for tax reasons (taxes will probably
be negligible). negligible).
Those qualifying for an IRA can
deposit up to 1,500 dollars or $15 \%$ of gross pay (whichever is less) each year... deduct the amount
from gross income and defer the from gross income and
taxes until retirement.
