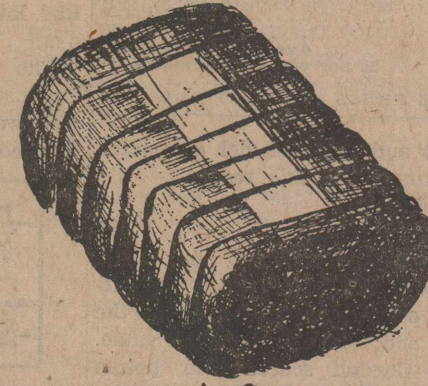

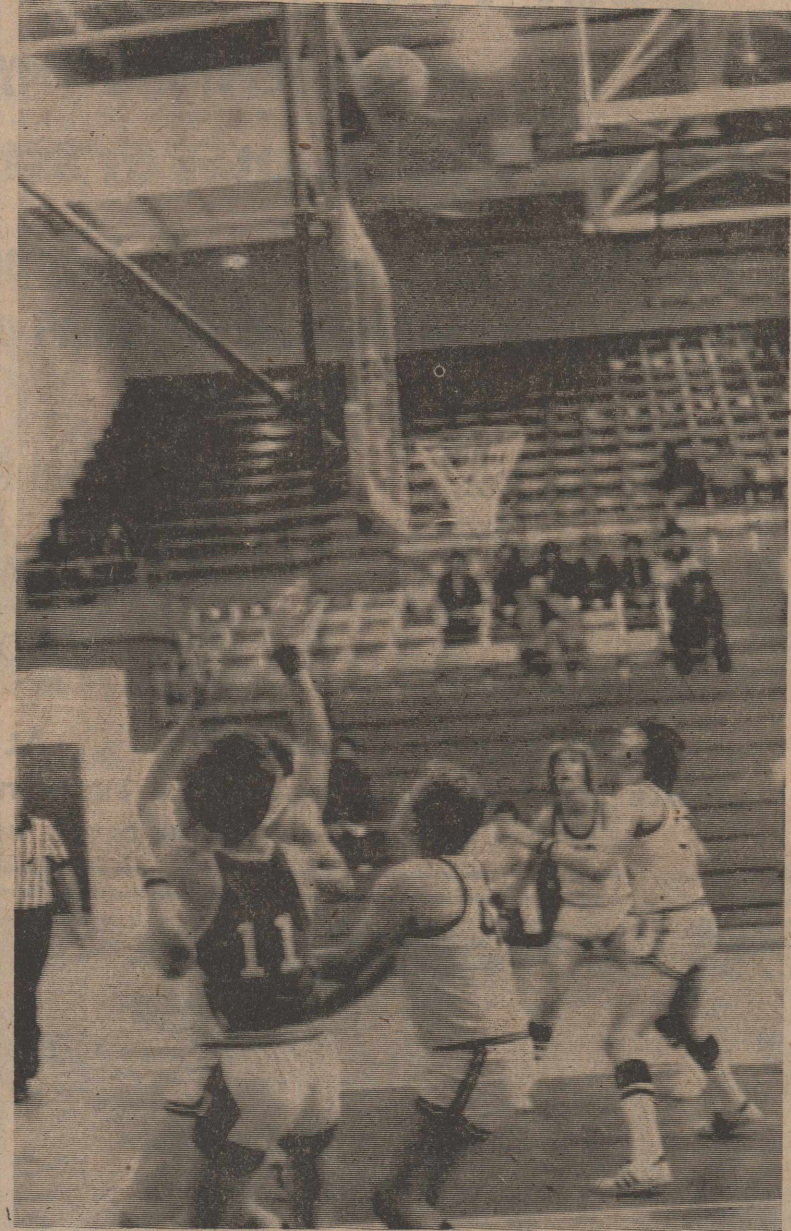

Owls Advance to Regional Tournament At Levelland



Silvertown's Big Red Fighting Owls battled back from a small five-point deficit Tuesday night to defeat Spade 57-53 for the bi-district championship. The Owls now advance to the Region I-B Tournament to be played in the Dome Stadium in Levelland and will meet Sands at 2:30 p.m. Friday.

School will be dismissed at 10:55 a.m. Friday. No lunch will be served in the school lunchroom, and the busses will run at 10:55.

A huge crowd of fans almost filled the north side of Hutcherson Center in Plainview Tuesday night for the bi-district game, sharply contrasted by the small crowd on the other side of the gym. Many Silvertown ex-students were present to cheer for their school in its first post-season basketball appearance since the Owlettes represented their district in 1959.

The Owls now stand 20-10 for the year, having lost only to Lubbock Christian High, Motley County High, Littlefield, Clarendon, Hedley (who won their bi-district game over Wheeler Tuesday night), Roosevelt, Abernathy and Vega. They have defeated District winners Samnorwood, Anton (who won their bi-district game over Ropes Tuesday night) and Goree, in addition to the Spade Longhorns.

Jackie Vaughn was one of the big weapons for the Owls Tuesday night, as he has been in many of their games this season. The 6-5 center dumped in 13 of 17 from the field and cleared off 19 rebounds for the Owls. His playing mates, Brent Brannon, David Strange, Gary Turner, Chief Davidson and Darrell Reynolds, also turned in fine performances in the game.

The contest saw Spade, winner of its district four of the last five years, grab a 35-30 halftime lead by effectively shooting over the Owl defense. But Spade hit only six of 26 in the last 16 minutes of play, while the Owls were canning 11 of 21 with a deliberate offense.

In the third quarter, the Owls scored eight straight points to take a 42-39 lead. David Strange's rolling hook shot gave Silvertown only its second lead of the game, 40-39 at 2:52 of the third period, and the Owls never trailed after that. Rodney Hall, who bombed in numerous shots from 20 feet or further out, tied the game early in the fourth quarter and it appeared that the Owls might be in trouble when Vaughn picked up his fourth foul with six minutes to go. However, Vaughn scored on three straight short jump shots as Silvertown began to take command. As one fan was overheard to say: "That center sure is living dangerously with four fouls."

Two free throws by Brannon gave the Owls a 53-47 advantage with 2:50 remaining. Spade closed to within three points with :50 showing, but Silvertown iced the game with free throws by Turner. For the game, Silvertown connected on 25 of 53 shots while Spade was able to make only 22 of 60. Silvertown had a slight edge in the rebound department, 35-33. Lynn Cowan had 16 points for Spade, about 10 under his average, and pulled down 16 rebounds. Hall led Spade with 20 points and Randy McCoy scored 10.

Brannon added 12 points for the Owls and Strange pitched in 11. Turner added five and Davidson got two points.

"We planned to get the ball

into Jackie right from the start, but Spade had him defended real well in the first half," said Coach Lyndel Norwood. "We switched to a man-to-man in the second half and that really helped us."

The Owls were successful in breaking the full-court press that Spade put on at various points during the game, never creating a turn-over because of it.

FARMERS HOME HAS NEW PROGRAM TO GUARANTEE RURAL HOUSING LOANS

The Farmers Home Administration has begun a program through which it will guarantee rural housing loans made by commercial banks, savings and loan associations, and other private lenders, George H. James, jr., FmHA County Supervisor for Swisher and Briscoe counties, has announced.

FmHA, the rural credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), will guarantee up to 90 percent of the principal and interest of these loans.

Guaranteed housing loans will be available for moderate income borrowers who cannot get housing mortgages credit without a guarantee. Applicants who cannot qualify for guaranteed loans may apply for loans made by FmHA.

At present, the USDA agency will offer loan guarantees only under its single-family housing loan program. FmHA will continue to make single-family housing loans with its own funds. It will also continue to make, but not guarantee, loans for rural rental housing, farm labor housing, housing site development, and other purposes.

Single family housing loans are made in open country, towns of up to 10,000 population, and certain designed towns of between 10,000 and 20,000 population. They finance modest but adequate housing and related facilities, James explained.

Loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, or rehabilitate houses and related facilities, and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems.

Guaranteed loans will be made only to applicants with moderate income, defined by FmHA as adjusted gross income of less than \$15,600 per year for residents of Texas, and not eligible for FmHA subsidized rural housing loans. Low income applicants may be eligible for subsidized rural housing loans made by FmHA.

Loans to be guaranteed are limited to 97 percent of the market value of homes and sites for the first \$25,000 and 95 percent of the loan in excess of \$25,000. The borrower must have equity from his own resources, in the form of cash or land for the down

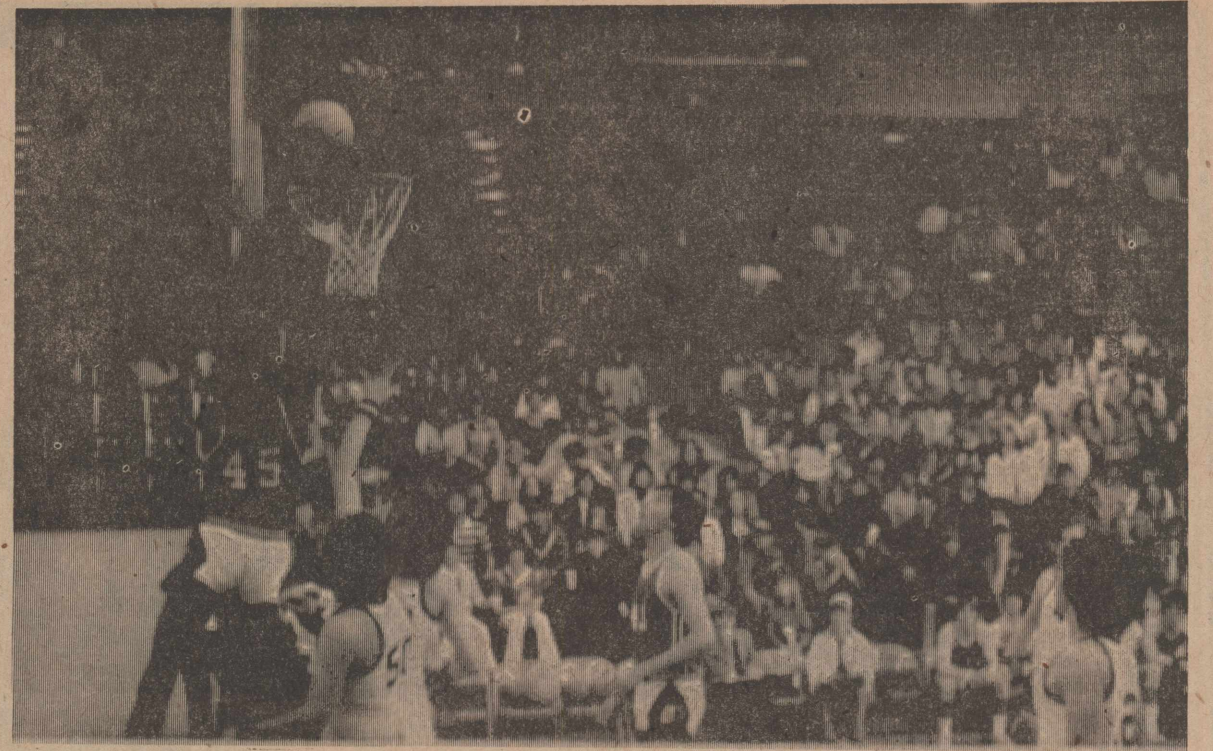
be held and date for the benefit. Cakes will be brought by members and chances will be sold on them.

FARMERS UNION LEADER

COMMENDS PROPOSED TAX LEGISLATION

A statewide farm organization leader announced today that the proposal to impose a 1.5c per gallon refinery tax to support public education is "a positive step in the direction of tax and educational equity."

Jay Naman, President of the Texas Farmers Union, commended

Senator Bill Moore and Representative Jim Nugent for introducing H. B. 1200. Naman said that the legislation would implement the recommendation of a Farmers Union Tax Study Panel.

"We are delighted that Senator Moore and Representative Nugent have taken the leadership in recommending legislation supported by Farmers Union that will equalize the tax load for the support of public education. All property

owners, particularly farmers and ranchers can no longer bear the total responsibility of public education. Our present ad valorem tax system is unfair to both landowners and the children in public schools.

"The refinery tax is a superior source of taxation to support public education. Most of the load will fall on out-of-state consumers of Texas energy who are now escaping taxation. It will give overburdened ad valorem tax payers a considerable relief."

The farm organization leadership said that House Bill 1200 should be amended to remove some objectionable details, but is generally consistent with the needs of farmers and ranchers.

"The refinery tax, coupled with our own recommendations for school finance reform, soon to be introduced by Representatives John Bryant of Dallas and Andrew Baker of Galveston, will
