

Owls To Host Springlake Earth Friday Night

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines will come to visit the Owls at 8:00 p.m. Friday for Silverton's second home appearance of the season.

The Owls seem to be on the verge of putting it all together, and wanted a win at Claude last Friday night badly; however, Mother Nature cheated them out of a shot at victory.

The score stood at 8-6 when the coaches and referees first discussed calling the game due to an approaching storm. Then Claude ran sixty yards for a touchdown on their first down following an Owl punt and moved the score up to 14-6. With 5:40 remaining to be played in the third quarter, the storm hit with a savage fury, first with strong, dusty wind and then with rain which fell in sheets and completely obscured the visibility. Wind was reportedly clocked at 80 miles per hour and some property damage was done.

The Mustangs made ten first downs in the game, as compared with six for the Owls. One penalty against the Owls was refused by the Mustangs, and Claude saw the officials step off 80 yards against them.

The Owls made a first down at the top of the game, but were unable to make two in a row, and punted to Claude. The Mustangs drove to the Silverton 12, where the defense refused to budge. An attempted field goal was wide, and with 4:29 remaining in the first quarter, the score was 0-0.

Again the Owl offense unable to make a first down, and punted. The Mustangs were set back by a face-mask violation, and began operating on their own 40. Mixing passes and running plays, Claude moved to the Silverton eight-yard line, from where they scored with :26 remaining on the first-quarter clock and ran for two extra points to hold an 8-0 lead.

The Owl offense, with players in new positions, failed to get cranked up on the next series, and again punted to Claude. This time the Owls forced a fumble and took over on their own 33.

The next two series were a repeat performance, with the Owls punting to Claude, the Mustangs fumbling, and this time Kelly Comer came up with the loose football on the Claude 40.

Doug McJimsey ran for a Silverton first down on the Claude 27, then McJimsey and Kirk Durham combined talents for another first down on the 15. Durham picked up four yards, and McJimsey went in for the score with 2:57 remaining in the second quarter. The Owls tried and failed on a two-point conversion, and the score stood at 8-6.

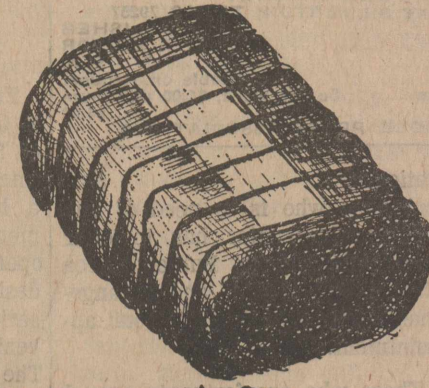
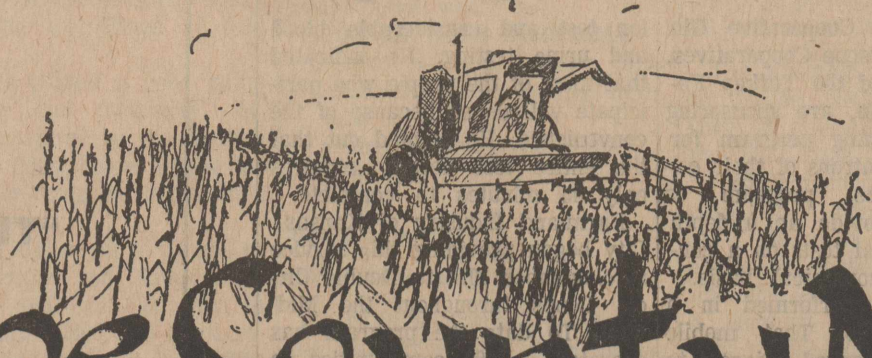
Claude ran the ensuing kickoff to near the Silverton goal, but the play was brought back to midfield by a clipping call against the Mustangs. On this series of plays, the Owl defense looked really hungry, and after setting the Claude quarterback for an eight-yard loss, Kelly Comer and Wayne Reed teamed up to stop a Mustang touchdown after a pass completion. The Mustangs completed another pass, with Comer again making the stop for the Owls. Claude was penalized for having an illegal receiver downfield on their next play, and when the play was re-run, Kirk Durham intercepted a Claude pass on the Silverton 37. This action took place with 1:23 still remaining on the clock in the first half, and the Owls gained two first downs before time expired.

The Owl defense came back tough in the third quarter, and Claude was forced to punt on its first possession after outstanding work by Mitchell Roehr and Darrell Couch. Their punt carried to the Silverton 23, from where runs by Doug McJimsey were unable to gain enough for a first down. The Owls punted out to the Claude 40, and first down, the Mustangs got loose for the final score of the game. Their kick attempt for extra point was wide, and with 7:22 remaining in the third quarter, the final 14-6 game had been made. The game ended with 5:40 still remaining to be played in the third frame.

The Owls wanted a win at Claude very badly. Their spirit was the highest it has been all

October 5 is the special auction day for the rehabilitation center at Coleman Livestock Auction in Coleman, Texas.

Cattlemen and interested people from Briscoe and the surrounding area may donate cattle and money to help the center offer continued services to patients at no cost to the patient. Many patients from this area have gone to the center for treatment and eval-

uation.

Anyone who is in need of any service the center has to offer can call Johnnie Burson, Area Chairman, 847-2524, and arrangements will be made for your appointment.

Those who are fortunate enough not to need treatment at the center are asked for a donation of cattle, horses, sheep, goats or money. If you will help by donating any of these, call Johnnie Burson, and arrangements will be made to pick them up and take them to the sales; if you wish to give a cash donation it can be mailed to West Texas Rehabilitation Center, 4601 Hartford Street, Abilene, Texas 79605.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center, established in 1953, has served more than 25,000 handicapped individuals from all over the southwest. This private, non-profit treatment center now operates on three campuses—in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder. These units are staffed by 125 highly-trained professional therapists and medical personnel.

Cooperatives To Sponsor Health Screening Program

The Farmers Cooperative Gin of Quitaque, Briscoe Cooperatives, of Silvertown, and the Turkey Farmers Co-op Gin, are sponsoring a health screening program for members and patrons of their cooperatives. The program is designed to provide an in-depth series of medical tests on a convenient and economical basis. The testing is performed in a clinic on wheels. That mobile facility will be parked adjacent to the City Hall in Silvertown one day to be convenient for the people of Silvertown.

Dan Maguire, Program Coordinator for the Health Program was in town today in advance of the mobile unit's arrival. He pointed out that the test series includes two x-rays (chest and facial), an EKG, pulmonary lung func-

tion test and considerable blood and urine testing. He indicated that most of the people who participate will do so because of the convenience. He pointed out that the entire test battery requires only 45 minutes to complete.

Farmland Industry of Kansas City began providing this service in November 1974 to Double Circle Coops throughout the Midwest. To date the program has operated in 300 communities in 10 states and has been utilized by over 60,000 Coop members. Roughly one-third of the Coop members screened to date were detected to have some previously unknown abnormalities.

The test data that is generated on the van is reviewed by a Texas internist-cardiologist and a Texas radiologist. Their report, along with all the raw data (including actual x-rays, EKG, and lab reports) is sent to the participant's personal physician. Each participant will also receive a copy of the reports. It should be pointed out that the Coop Health Screening Program is not intended to replace or interfere with regular visits to your personal physician. Rather it is designed to allow for a more convenient and economical system of data gathering to be used by the physician in the patient's behalf. It is strongly recommended that each participant contact their physician as soon as the test results have been received.

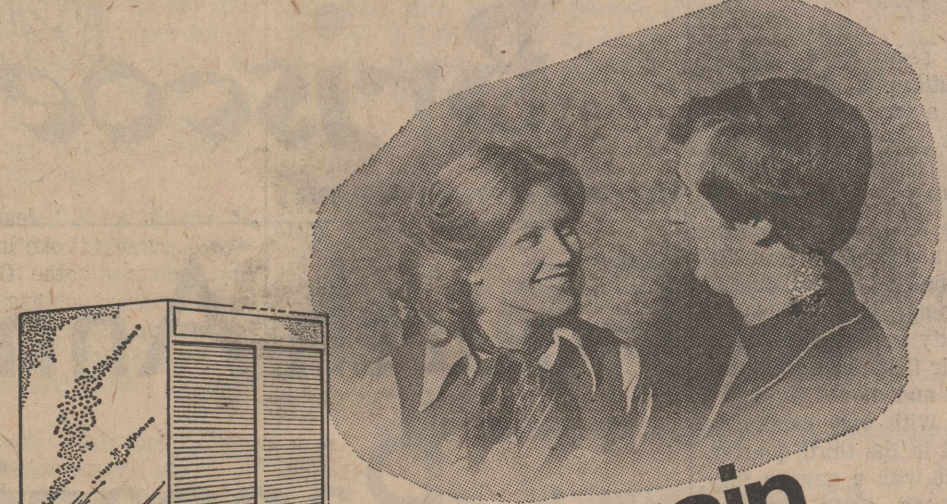

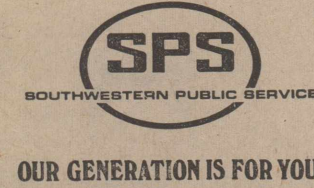

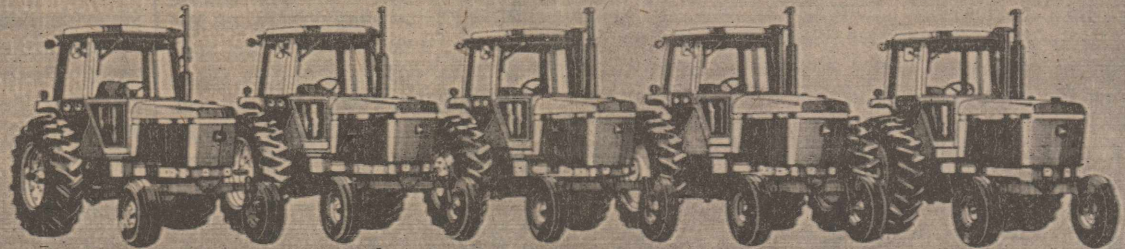

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

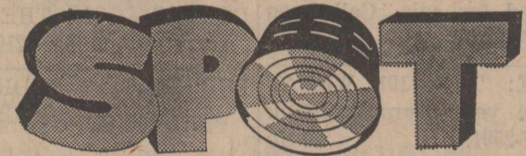

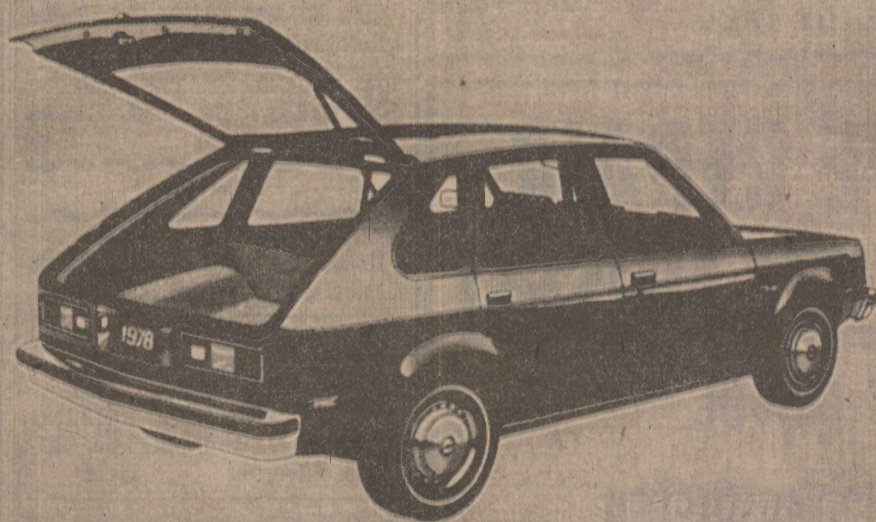

LEGAL NOTICE

ANTI-LITTER ORDINANCE

SECTION ONE: It shall be unlawful for any private corporation, firm, or person to dump, deposit, or leave any refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on the properties of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

SECTION TWO: The following terms as defined herein, shall control in the construction and enforcement of this ordinance:

(a) "Refuse" shall include garbage, rubbish and all other decayable and non-decayable waste, including vegetable, animal and fish carcasses, except sewage from all public and private establishments and residences.

(b) "Garbage" shall include all decayable waste including vegetable, animal and fish offal and carcasses of animals and fish, and shall include all such substances from all public and private establishments and from all residences.

(c) "Rubbish" shall include non-decayable waste except ashes.

(d) "Junk" shall include all worn out, worthless and discarded material, in general, including but not limited to, odds and ends, old iron or other metal, glass, paper, cordage or other waste or discarded material.

SECTION THREE: Any violation of this Ordinance by any person, firm or private corporation shall upon conviction, subject the offender to a fine of not more than \$200.00 and each day of any such violation shall be treated as a separate offense.

10. No ski zone where posted by buoy.
11. No hunting or use of fire-

- arms permitted on the Authority's property.
 12. No littering of garbage, junk or refuse on Authority's property.
 13. No motorcycles or motorbikes permitted on Authority's property.
 14. Speed limits of motor vehicles as posted.
 15. Cutting of trees or shrubs on Authority's property is prohibited.
- A breach of any of the above rules and regulations will subject the violator to a fine of up to and including Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). The full text of the above regulations are on file in the principal office of the Authority on Lake Mackenzie where the same may be read by any interested party.
