Man of the Year winner: John Long



Q: Sleet is in the forecast. Is there any difference between sleet and freezing rain?

Weather Whys

A: The major difference is how they are formed in the atmosphere, explains Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. Freezing rain is rain that freezes when it comes into contact with other surfaces. such as pavement or cars. "Freezing rain forms when warm, moist air moves over cold air near the surface," McRoberts says. "Freezing rain is very dangerous because it tends to coat roadway surfaces. When surface temperatures are at or below 32 degrees, rain will quickly freeze on contact, and if the ice accumulates, it can shut down an entire city very quickly. Sleet is often confused with freezing rain, but sleet hits the ground already frozen, often forming in advance of a warm front. Sleet falls as ice pellets that make a familiar crackle sound as they hit the ground,

I was struck by a Washington state party of 12. Of the dozen, 10 were family, including two sisters, three brothers and their spouses. Several of them hung out many afternoons to play their ukuleles.

character's almost 10-foot height, necessitating kneebending through most doorways....

Always welcome are the smiles and helpful countenance of ship personnel who hail from throughout the world. They are genuinely happy to be there, and so are we.

USDA extends deadline to update base acres, yield history

WINTERS ENTERPRISE

WASHINGTON - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced Friday that a one-time extension will be provided to producers for the new safety-net programs established by the 2014 Farm Bill, known as Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC). The final day to update yield history or reallocate base acres has been extended one additional month, from Feb. 27 until March

The final day for farm owners and producers to choose ARC or PLC coverage remains March 31, 2015.

"This is an important decision for producers, because these programs provide financial protection against unexpected changes in the marketplace. Producers are working to make the best decision they can. And we're working to ensure that they've got the time, the information, and the opportunities to have those final conversations, review

their data, and to visit the Farm Service Agency to make those decisions.

said Vilsack. If no changes are made to yield history or base acres by March 31, the farm's current yield and base will be used. A program choice of ARC or PLC coverage also must be made by March 3, or there will be no 2014 payments for the farm and the farm will default to PLC cover-

age through the 2018 crop year.

Nationwide, more than 2.9 million educational postcards, in English and Spanish, have been sent to producers, and more than 4,100 training sessions have been conducted on the new safety-net programs. The online tools, available at www.fsa.usda. gov/arc-plc, allow producers to explore projections on how ARC or PLC

coverage will affect their operation under possible future scenarios.

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.



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

Rainey Collinsworth
Rainey Isaac Collinsworth married Mary
Launa Rampy on May 1, 1904 in Hunt County, Texas. They came to Runnels County by train in 1911 and farmed at Pumphrey. They were members of the Methodist Church.

Wylie Cooper

Wylie Farnsworth Cooper was born February 14, 1848, in Union County, South Carolina. He married Frances Hubbard in Morgan County, Alabama. She died shortly after her children were born. His grandparents William and Annie Cooper came from South Carolina to Alabama to help Wylie care for his children. They all then moved to Hill

County, Texas.

In 1885 Wylie married Mary Venable. They had nine children. Wylie suffered with chronic bronchitis and was advised by his doctor to move to a dryer climate. In 1904 the family came by train to Talpa, then by wagon to their farm they bought at Crews, where they farmed for many years. They are buried at

Jasper Drake

Crews.



Jasper H. Drake moved to Norton from Marlin, Texas as a boy. He served in the Army in France in World War I. He returned to Norton to marry Edith Taff of the Mann community. They farmed at Wilmeth until 1940 when they moved 3 miles northwest of Winters, where they lived until his death in 1965. Mrs. Drake moved her house into Winters where she lived until her death in 1980.

George Garrett W.P. Garrett, father of George Garrett, came to Garretts Bluff, Texas from Fort Smith, Arkansas about the turn of the century. There he ran Garretts Mercantile and a farm, he moved into Paris, Texas in

George graduated from A&M in 1924 as a Civil Engineer and started his career with the Texas State Highway Department in the mid 20s, moving to Ballinger as Resident Engineer in 1928.

He married Lura Lee Tinkle in July

Upon retiring he and his wife chose to me home to Runnels County, built a ome in Winters in 1966, next door to the home of Mrs. Fred Tinkle.

Edward Gerhart



Edward Fredrick Gerhart was born in Germany in 1852, coming to America at the age of two years and two months with his mother, Lena Schneider Gerhart.

Landing in Galveston they traveled to San Antonio where Edward's father had purchased property. The family received reports on economical prices of land in Runnels County, so they sold their property in San Antonio and purchased 1,200 acres in the Crews area, moving to Runnels County in 1901.

Jacob Goetz



Jacob Gerhard Goetz came to Runnels County in 1902 and located in the community of Hatchel.

Jacob Goetz was born January 1, 1868 in Tanne Hausen, Germany. He married Antje (Annie) Wessels on December 7, 1893 in Copeland, Texas. Antje Wessels was born March 13, 1876 in Norden Ostfriesland, Germany.

He bought 800 acres of farmland near Hatchel before 1902, but brought his family on the train in November of 1902. The family attended the Lutheran

Charles Graham



Charles (Charlie) Luther Graham came to Runnels County May 1915 and settled

Charlie and Eula Mae Cooke were married August 12, 1908 in North Park, Abilene at the home of the

bride's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Robert Cooke. Charlie was farming with his father in Jones County that year.

Their first home was on a farm in Clyde. Following a hailstorm in 1911 and several years of drought, the family moved to Winters in May on 1915.

Jess Harris

Jess Robert Harris came to Texas from Alabama in 1898. He worked for W. W. Wilkerson at Yarrelton, Texas. In 1901 he married Massie Myrtle Wilkerson and they moved to Runnels County in 1907. They settled in the Dale community.

In 1910 Mr. and Mrs. Harris purchased a stock farm in the Hatchel area and added to their property holdings in 1923. Jess introduced the registered Brown Swiss Cattle to Runnels County having

a contact with the government of Venezuela to furnish a number of cattle each

Jess and Massie had five children. Jess was the son of a Civil War veteran. His son Jack served as a pilot

of a B17 bomber during World War I

and was shot down and killed over Kassel, Germany in 1943.

His daughter Lillie Harris served as Captain and Chief Nurse of the 127th General Hospital (the overseas unit of the University of Texas) during World War II. Jess died in 1960 and Massie in 1968.

Stanley Harter and family moved to Runnels County from Dallas County settling on a farm in the Wingate community. Besides farming Stanley also did custom machine work.

He met and married Ethel Renshaw in May 1910. They had five children and they all grew up in the Wingate area.

Henry Henniger



Henry W. Henniger and Lena Wagner were married in 1883 in the Lutheran Church in Round Top, Texas.

They lived in Shelby where he owned a leather shop. He made saddles and boots until 1895 when they moved to Milam County where they farmed until 1904.

In 1904 they moved to Runnels County in a covered wagon with their nine children. They first settled in the Hatchel community in 1907 then moved to the Dale community and farmed. In 1928 they retired and moved to Winters.

Carl Henslee

Carl Henslee and Margaret Butchree were married in Buffalo Gap where Carl

was employed in the bank.

They moved to Hawley, Texas and he was in the banking field. Their children were born there.

In 1919 they moved to Winters from Hawley and Carl worked in the Winters State Bank until he retired.

A.J. Holshauser



A.J. Holshauser landed on Galveston Island in 1845 and moved to Runnels County in 1903, settling on a farm seven miles north of Winters in the Baldwin community. He died in 1909.

Fritz Kraatz

Fritz and Annie (Koch) Kraatz came to Runnels County from Port Arthur, Texas, settling first at Olfen then in Winters, where they remained until death.

Mr. Kraatz was a farmer and they were lifetime members of the Lutheran Church.

Charles Kruse



Charles Kruse, Sr. was born in Fayette County, Texas. on October 13, 1872. Dorothea Schroeder Kruse, whose father was a tailor, was born in Hanover, Germany, on April 22, 1872. She came to America with her parents in 1878, settling at Industry community near Fayetteville, Texas. Later they moved to Gonzales County.

On December 4, 1896, Charles and Dorothea married at the home of the bride's parents. Mr. and Mrs.

Nickolaus Schroeder by the Rev. Wolfdorf. They lived on their farm at Cheapside, a small community near Gonzales, until 1942. At that time they moved to Winters. Runnels County, Texas settling on their farm one and one-half miles east

Johan (Dick) Kruse Mr. Dick Kruse moved from Cheapside (near Gonzales) Texas to Winters in 1921 and settled on a farm in the Dale community. He moved all his possessions, including livestock by train and the move was delayed due to an impending strike by railroad employees.

Mr. Kruse married Johanna Pauline (Lena) Wessels on August 16, 1922. Lena came to Winters with her family (John P. Wessels) from Illinois. The Kruses reared their family of six children on the Kruse farm in the Dale community.

W.P. LloydA native of Texas, Will Lloyd was born at Rockdale in 1875. He married Mary Ella Pumphrey in Milam County in 1896, and the couple moved to Runnels County ir 1900 settling in the Pumphrey com-

as in 1916 that they established the nome two miles west of Winters. Mr. vas a devout Christian, a prominent landowner and was associated with his sons Ralph and Raymond as owners of the Main Drug Store.

Jeff Miller

Jeff and Rebecca past through Runnels County on their way to Arizona in a covered wagon, Jeff worked as a drover on cattle drives. When he wasn't on the cattle trail he searched for maverick

An Indian squaw helped with the de-livery of a child while they were living in Arizona.

The Millers came back to Texas, settling on a ranch in northeast Runnels County (Content community) in 1917.

William Minzenmayer
William Minzenmayer was born in 1870 in Toledo, Ohio. He met Wilhemina Caroline Ernst while the two families were living in Williamson County, Texas.

The Ernst family moved to Runnels County in 1898, later in the year William came to Runnels County to marry his sweetheart in 1898. Two of William's brothers, John and Henry, also moved to Runnels County.

The family farmed north of Winters. William and Minnie were charter members of St. John's Lutheran Church.

Martin Mitchell



Martin Luther Mitchell was born in 1878 in Coryell County, Texas. He married Nancy Elizabeth Yancy in 1900 at Killeen, Texas. The couple came to Runnels County in a covered wagon in 1904 and farmed in the Pumphrey community.

The town of Winters was very young so they traveled to buy their household goods, groceries and clothing, this was a two day trip usually. Later the Pumphrey community developed two general

stores, a drug store, a doctor, barber shop, blacksmith shop, a school and two churches (Baptist and Methodist).

J.S. Neely



J. S. Neely, family came to Runnels County in the fall of 1902, from Williamson County. They first lone a one-half miles west of Draseo. In 1903 moved to what is now L.C. Hill place. Then they moved to the old Neely place 7 miles North of Winters. His occupation was farming and carpenter work.

Robert O'Dell



Robert Mack O'Dell, born Februrary 9, 1985 in Springfield, Missouri, married Sarah Frances Gibbins (born August 30, 1857 In Izard County, Arizona). About 1900 they lived for a short time at Wingate and did not return to Runnels County until 1915, where they farmed in the Crews community
