### The last drop

Fall weather has officially arrived and brought some moisture with it. Even though the rest of the state was deluged with rainfall, Runnels County missed out on much of the rain. According to the National Weather Service in San Angelo, during the rain event from Oct. 22-Oct. 25, Ballinger received only .61 inches of rain. However, 1.38 inches was reported in Wingate. San Angelo, did not fare well either, reporting only 1.25 inches during the three day event, while Sterling City, northwest of San Angelo, reported over 5 inches of rain, forecasters

A cold front is expected to arrive in Runnels County today and is expected to bring precipitation with it. A 50 percent chance of rain is predicted today, turning to 60 percent on Friday and decreasing to 40 percent on Halloween. Temperatures are expected to be mild on Halloween with the high reaching only 71 and the low expected to dip to about 52 degrees.

So far this year, Ballinger has received 23.71 inches of rain while 26.22 inches has been reported in Wingate.The NWS reported 22.74 inches of rain has fallen in San Angelo.

# Commissioners keep burn ban in place

The Runnels County Commissioners turned down a bid to lift the burn ban throughout the county due to dry conditions, according to County

Judge Barry Hilliard. The rainy conditions did not converge over Runnels County last week like they did statewide, with

the most rain reported at 1.3 inches, recorded near Winters.

"There is still too much dry matter throughout the county," Hilliard said following the meeting.

Commissioners will canvass the votes for the Nov. 3 election at a special called meeting on Nov. 16.

In other business Tuesday, commissioners heard details on the Texas

Community Development Block grant to repair waterlines and infrastructure in Rowena for \$288,750 through the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Commissioners approved the salary of the county auditor at \$46,500 annually, which is no change from last year. Two assistant's salaries were set at \$26,915 annually which does not

include normal county benefits for all employees.

Commissioners also approved the use of the county auditor to audit the books of the Emergency Services District 1 in Miles. The City of Miles pays the City of Ballinger annually to provide ambulance services there.

Commissioners took no action on the purchase of a refrigerator and air

conditioner at the meeting opting to go out for additional bids.



### TEXAS HISTORY MINUTE

# Thomas Campbell Clark

Thomas Campbell Clark played an important role in shaping many of the civil liberties Americans enjoy today during his career. As part of a long and distinguished legal career, Clark be-

came the first - and to date, only Texan to serve on the United States Supreme Court.

Clark was born in Dallas in 1899. As a young man, he received a degree from the University of Texas in 1921 and completed law school the next year. He quickly returned to Dallas, eager to begin his law career.

He worked for the next few years in private practice in Dallas. In 1924, he married Mary Ramsey, the daughter of a for-mer state supreme court justice, and eventually had three children with her. With a growing family to support, Clark joined

the district attorney's office in 1927. He left after a few years to return to private practice, but in 1937, he received a great opportunity when he became a spe-

cial assistant to U.S. Attorney General Homer S. Cummings.

At the attorney general's office, his career advanced quickly. In 1938, he was assigned to the antitrust

division, combating monopolies. After World War II began, Clark investigated cases of espionage and subversion against the United States. By 1943, he was serving as assistant attorney general in the War Fraud division. Through this work, he several defense contractors indicted who sold shoddy equipment to the military or outright stole money from the government during the

Shortly after Harry S. Truman became president upon the death of President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1945, he appointed Clark as the new attorney general, having been impressed by Clark's work

against contractor fraud. When Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy died in 1949, President Tru-

man appointed Clark to fill the position. As a member of the Supreme Court, Clark helped usher in drastic changes in civil rights laws across the nation. In 1950, in Sweatt v. Painter, he ruled with the court's majority that the University of Texas must admit African-American applicants. With Terry v. Adams in 1953, he helped strike down the "white primary," which allowed state political parties to exclude minorities from their primary elections. In 1954, he was part of the High Court's unanimous ruling in the Brown v. Board of Education case that ruled racial segregation in all schools to be unconstitu-

Clark was also part of the majority decision in Gideon v. Wainwright in 1963, which declared that states had to provide attorneys for anyone accused of a crime. This decision led to hundreds of wrongfully convicted inmates being freed. He was also part of the unanimous New York Times v. Sullivan decision in 1964 to protect newspapers and free speech by redefining libel as a

statement that is both knowingly false and meant to defame another person's

Tom Clark retired from the Supreme Court in 1967 and was replaced by Thurgood Marshall. Shortly after his retirement, his son, Ramsey Clark, was appointed attorney general by President Lyndon Johnson.

He remained very active in his retirement. He became director of the Federal Judicial Center, a program designed to help courts with research and training for judges, shortly after its founding. He stepped down from the center in 1970 and continued to serve as a visiting judge for the US Court of Appeals, acting as a temporary judge for special cases. He died quietly in New York City in 1977. Years later, Clark High School in San Antonio, was named for him as well as the Tom C. Clark State Office Building in Austin.

## Weather Whys

Q: What is a gustnado?

A: A "gustnado," which is actually a slang term, is a short lived, low-level rotating cloud that can form as a result of the outflow, or gust front, from a severe thunderstorm, says Brent McRoberts of Texas &M University. The term is a blend of the words "gust front tornado" and they usually last just a few seconds to a minute or so. "The outflow is a product of strong downdraft winds that spread outwards when hitting the ground, causing intense winds at the surface," he says. "A gustnado can form in an unstable environment. They typically range in height from 30-300 feet and unlike tornadoes, are not connected with the cloud base of the thunderstorm."

Legislation that would extend the same federal hiring preference to fathers that is available to mothers of service members killed or permanently passed the House and was sent onto the President to be signed into law. The "Gold Star Fathers Act" (S. 136), which passed the Senate in May, takes its name from the symbol of parents whose children are killed in action. Such parents are referred to as "Gold Star Parents" because they traditionally display a Gold Star flag as a symbol of their loss and sacrifice.

The federal government has long recognized the sacrifice of Gold Star families by granting unmarried and separated Gold Star mothers—and unmarried and separated mothers of totally and permanently disabled veterans—a 10-point hiring preference when they apply for federal jobs. This legislation will make this hiring preference gender-neutral, extending it to unmarried or separated fathers of service members killed or totally and permanently disabled in action. 






important protection for agriculture. While Congressional leaders may sell this package as providing budget stability, it is anything but stable for farmers and ranchers. It took years to negotiate and pass a new Farm Bill. Producers have signed contracts and purchased policies. These proposals to make further cuts to the crop insurance program were not included in the House or Senate passed budgets, in any appropriations bills or in the President's budget request. Once again, our leaders are attempting to govern by backroom deals where the devil is in the details. I will continue to oppose any attempts to cut crop insurance funding or to change crop insurance program policies."


"Make no mistake, this is not about saving money. It is about eliminating Federal Crop Insurance,"said Chairman Conaway. "The House Agriculture Committee was not consulted regarding any changes to policies under the jurisdiction of our committee. This provision is opposed by an overwhelming majority or our committee members. It was debated and defeated during the 2014 farm bill process, and to move forward with it now breaks faith with the American producer. I am working alongside many of my colleagues to have the provision removed. If it is not removed, I will vote against this bill and work to defeat its passage. The American people deserve better than continued backroom deals struck in the middle of the night that entirely undercut the legislative process."

"I oppose any efforts to cut or reopen Farm Bill programs. It is particularly disappointing to see cuts to crop insurance in the budget agreement," said Ranking Member Stabenow. "These types of cuts only undermine the economic certainty that the Farm Bill provides. The Farm Bill made meaningful reforms to help reduce the deficit. Any attempts to reopen any part of the Farm Bill to more cuts would be a major set-back for rural America and our efforts to

create jobs." "We made major cuts when we wrote the Farm Bill," said Ranking Member Peterson. "It is not appropriate to cut agriculture again. The Farm Bill should not be raided. I oppose any cuts."
