
#### The last drop

## Deer plentiful during hunting season

**COLLEGE STATION -**Thanks to plenty of rain at the right times, the 2015 hunting season has been a "jubilee year" for the whitetailed deer crop, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service wildlife specialist.

'The deer crop this year has been fantastic," said Dr. Jim Cathey, AgriLife Extension wildlife and fisheries program leader at College Station. "There are a lot of happy hunters out there.'

"We've had ample rainfall this year for much of Texas, and we could not say that in previous years,"

he said. "Animal quality is very good. I'm hearing good reports of harvests out there in the field now. We will continue to have good conditions into the

late fall and early winter." The economic impact in Texas for hunting was \$3.65 billion in 2011, a drought year, and the most recent year for which he has statistics, Cathey said.

"Of that, deer hunting alone counts for \$2.16 billion," he said. "So it's a pretty important economic driver for our state and wildlife conservation in Texas.

Cathey noted that it's been a very good year for other types of hunting, particularly quail, as numbers

are back up.

Cathey noted that because 2011 was a drought year, which meant poorer crops of deer and other game animals, he would expect the economic impact for this year to be better.

"We should probably have brand new numbers within a year," he said. "But I can't say they will be higher because everything depends on license sales and related items. But drought or not, it's definitely worth getting the license, not only for the importance of going out there and enjoying wildlife recreation but for the contribution the hunter conservationist makes back into the management of wildlife.'

> something big a stereo. So. that fall, I started conveniently leaving the Sears catalog open on the stereo pages. As I recall, I wasn't asking for anything too fancy, just something like a Close 'N Play so I could play my 45s. So, I would conveniently leave the catalog open

on my mom's side of the bed or next to my dad's recliner, with the pages dog-eared and arrows pointing to my dream hi-fi. Now so I circled several stereo models with detached speakers and a turntable, and even one with an 8-track player, but if Santa saw fit to Celinda bring me the Close Hawkins 'N Play, I would've

been elated. Sometimes my dad would call me to the recliner for the list discussion — which always got my hopes up.

"So you want a record player, do you?" he would say. "And you think you deserve this because ...?

"I have been good, Daddy and I only want that one with the turntable in the middle with speakers on the side (the Close 'N Play)," I explained, offering to get him a glass of tea and piece of cake and rake the leaves in the front yard.

As I rushed off to wait on him, I could feel his sheepish smile behind me. It felt like he was up to something. But I was going to err

on the side of caution and be a good kid. Yes, that is what I would do.

And so that fall I hopped, skipped and did everything I could to deserve that record player. And you know what? It paid off, but my parents kept me in suspense until Christmas morning.

As it turned out, my fa-ther's diabolically wonderful plan trumped anything I could have ever dreamed of at the time. Little did I know, he had been shopping for a stereo for quite some time, looking everywhere for the best bargain. Those were the days before hi-fi stores and electronic shops, so things like stereos and radios were purchased at places like Radio Shack, the television stores or of all places at drug stores. My dad loved a

good deal — and he ran into a few during his life. That stereo was one of them. That year, his good friend Ken Benson and his father were liquidating the merchandise at the Medicine Shoppe a downtown drug store in Odessa. Some of the items on sale were — you guessed it — stereos. But not just any

stereos — they were Sony stereos. And he got a deal on the Sony — which had a turntable, 8-track and two detached speakers with black and white fabric on the front.

And at 5 a.m. on Christmas morning, when my sister and I sneaked out to the tree to get an early glimpse of what was there, I tripped over the speakers and when I turned on the light, I think I squealed so loud I woke up the neighborhood. Can you say ecstatic? That I was, it was indeed the best Christmas of my life, especially since this Sony was the exact same model that Mary Richards had in her apartment on the "The Mary Tyler Moore Show."

So maybe in this age of instant gratification we should make the kiddos wish a little longer and harder.

That year, the hints and the hard work paid off and we rejoiced as we played the first 8-track of Three Dog Night's "Joy to the World."

"Joy to the world, all the boys and girls, Joy to the fishes in the deep blue sea, Joy to you and me..."

Oveta Culp Hobby was a woman of drive and determination. From newspaper editor to presidential cabinet secretary and more, Hobby lived a life of service and breaking barriers for women.

She was born Oveta Culp in 1905 in Killeen to lawyer Ike Culp and his wife, Elizabeth. She was one of seven children. She was very intelligent and studious as a child. When her father was elected to the state legislature

in 1918, she accompanied him to the capitol on many occasions to witness the legislature in action.

After graduating from Temple High School, she took classes at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor and the Univer-Dr. Ken sity of Texas. Along the way, **Bridges** she briefly served as a teacher and as a reporter for the Austin Statesman. In 1925, she was hired as the first woman parliamentarian for the Texas House of Representatives. Through this position, she made rulings on procedural questions and debates occurring in the legislature. She served for six years until her already adventurous life took yet another turn.

In 1931, she married William P. Hobby, who had served as Texas governor

from 1917 to 1921 and was publisher of the Houston Post. The two would eventually have two children together. Their son, William P. Hobby, Jr., would serve as lieutenant governor from 1973 to 1991.

Completely devot-

ed to her husband, Oveta Hobby served as a research editor for the Post before becoming executive

vice-president in 1938. She also served on a variety of local cultural boards in Houston and as president of the Texas League of Women Voters.

In 1943, she was asked by Gen. George Marshall to organize and lead the Women's Army Corps. This was the first American military organization designed specifically for women. The WAC trained women to fill vital service roles from drivers to telephone operators to clerks but would not serve in combat. Hobby led tens of thousands of women volunteers, eventually earning

the rank of colonel and becoming the first woman to earn the Distinguished Service Cross for her service.

After she stepped down from her duties as WAC Director in 1945, she resumed her work with Houston civic organizations and the newspaper. In 1949, she became the first woman

to serve as president of the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association

In 1953, Hobby was named by President Dwight D. Eisenhower to be the first Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. She was only the second woman in American History to serve as a presidential cabinet secretary, following Frances Perkins, who served as Secretary of Labor under President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The new department oversaw federal pensions, Social

Security, hospitals, medical research. and aid to universities. During her tenure as secretary, she approved the new polio vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Salk for use, a vaccine that effectively ended the polio epidemic in the United

As her husband's health began to falter, she resigned her position in

1955 and returned to Houston where she became president and editor of the Post. The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare was separated into the Department of Education and the Department of Health and Human Services in 1979. Oveta Hobby

earned many honors in her later years, including having the Central Texas College Library in Killeen named after her as well as an elementary school in Killeen. In 1984, she was inducted into the Texas Woman's Hall of Fame. In April 1995, the Houston Post ceased publication after years of falling profits and increased competition from the Houston Chronicle. Hobby died four months later in Houston at the age of 90.

#### Weather Whys

Q: Sometimes you hear the weather forecaster refer to "virga." What is it?

A: Virga is a common weather feature, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. It refers to rain or snow that forms a wispy streak beneath a cloud and appears not to be reaching the ground. "Most of the virga people see today is usually composed of snow, since snow is so much brighter and easier to see than rain," he explains. "Even in the warm days of summer, the virga coming from the tall anvil-shaped thunderstorms is most likely snow, forming in the frigid temperatures 5-10 miles above the ground. Virga can also come from the base of a thunderstorm and other types of clouds, and it can be mistaken for a tornado at a distance because of its V-shaped appearance."
