An announcement last Friday by Wal Mart corporate headquarters on the closure of the Wal Mart Express in Winters, could have left the small town without a supermarket, after Lawrence Brothers had announced two weeks January





### **USDA Expands Microloans to help** farmers expand and improve


WASHINGTON - Agriculture Deputy Secretary Krysta Harden announced Tuesday that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will begin offering farm ownership microloans, creating a new financing avenue for farmers to buy and improve property. These microloans will be especially helpful to beginning or underserved farmers, U.S. veterans looking for a career in farming, and those who have small and mid-sized farming operations.

"Many producers, especially new and underserved farmers, tell us that access to land is one of the biggest challenges they face in establishing and growing their own farming operation," said Harden. "USDA is makto hit the ground running and get access to the land that they need to establish their farms or improve their property."

The microloan program, which celebrates its third anniversary this week, has been hugely successful, providing more than 16,800 low-interest loans, totaling over \$373 million to producers across the country. Microloans have helped farmers and ranchers with operating costs, such as feed, fertilizer, tools, fencing, equipment, and living expenses since 2013. Seventy percent of loans have gone to new farmers.

Now, microloans will be available to also help with farm land and building purchases, and soil and water conservation improvements. FSA designed the expanded program to simplify the application process, expand eligibility requirements and expedite smaller real estate loans to help farmers strengthen their operations. Microloans provide up to \$50,000 to qualified producers, and can be issued to the applicant directly from the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA).

This microloan announcement is another USDA resource for America's farmers and ranchers to utilize, especially as new and beginning farmers and ranchers look for the assistance they need to get started. ### **VETERAN'S CORNER**

At a press conference in Albany, New York, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand (N.Y.) announced a new push to pass bipartisan legislation to ensure thousands of Navy Vietnam veterans are eligible to receive the disability and health care benefits they have earned. These "Blue Water" vets were exposed to the powerful toxin Agent Orange (AO) while serving off the coast of Vietnam and are currently ineligible for VA benefits for medical conditions related to AO exposure. Gillibrand is rallying support for the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act (S. 681) legislation, which would clarify existing law so that blue water veterans would be

fully covered by the VA if they served within 12 miles of the Vietnam shoreline. Several local TV stations and local print media covered the event. Currently, veterans must prove they had "boots on the ground" in Vietnam or served on the "brown water" rivers of the country before the VA will presume they were exposed to the herbicide and provide disability benefits for diseases related to that exposure. Gillibrand's bill, introduced with Senator Steve Daines (Mont.) would presume exposure for blue water vets, allowing the VA to process their claims for service-connected conditions and alleviate a portion of the VA's backlog. ### \$3,000 reward offered for most wanted sex offender from North Richland Hills

Prior to absconding from the North Richland Hills area in 2011, McBride had expressed an interest in living and working in Alaska. 

### DPS seeks leads in 1981 murder of San Antonio woman

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Comal County Crime Stoppers are asking for the public's help in solving the murder of 18-yearold Carol Deleon of San Antonio in 1981. As part of a DPS public awareness program, one unsolved case is featured by the Texas Ranger Unsolved Crimes Investigation Team each month in an effort to generate new investigative leads and bring added attention to unresolved or "cold cases" across the state.

On Thursday, June 4, 1981, an unidentified body of a woman was found along IH 35 in Comal County, just south of the city of New Braunfels. An autopsy later determined the victim







died from multiple gunshot wounds. The victim was buried as a Jane Doe in 1981; however in 2009, the Texas Rangers identified the victim as Deleon using DNA technology.

At the time of her death, Deleon lived in the West Avenue area of San Antonio and had graduated from Thomas Edison High School on May 28, 1981, just days prior to her death. She was believed to have attended a San

Antonio night club on June 3, 1981. DPS is also seeking to identify the male standing with her in the photo (above right) as a possible witness.

The Comal County Crime Stoppers is offering an increased reward of up to \$10,000 (for the next 30 days, expiring on Feb. 12) for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for the death of Deleon. To be eligible for the cash reward, the tip must be submitted by calling 1-800-640-8422 or visiting the Comal County Crime Stoppers website at www. comalcrimestoppers.org

## Just Around the Corner The challenges of a community newspaper

The face of the newspaper industry across the country has completely changed in the 20 plus years that I have been a reporter and editor. And, technology has been the driving force behind all of the changes that have occurred over the last two decades. The other day I saw a

Facebook post that asked whether or not the viewer knew what a little plastic canister with a black lid was. It was a film canister and this tells you everything you need to know about the gargantuan changes that have occurred in media and journalism.

knew about this little item first hand because back in the day, during my first gig at the Monahans News, I spent many hours a week in a dark room, develoning the film inside those canisters. It was a tedious process. First , you had to break the film out of its metal canister in complete darkness, roll it up and put it in another canister with chemicals - all in the dark. Once the film was safely in the sealed canister, the red light came on in the dark room and you could see what you were doing. Once the film developed, the photos were printed on

black and white paper (in those days, we rarely used color). Then the photos are hung up to dry in the red light. A few hours later and voila! Photos for the weekly

paper. In those early days, very few folks had Internet. I remember the day in 1996 when the Brownwood Bulletin put Internet on one computer in the newsroom. There was always a line of reporters waiting to get on the IMac and it was dial up - remember that? Slow as molasses.

And, by the time I got to the Bulletin, the standard was color film, which we had developed at a photo place. We had a negative scanner, which was at the time, state of the art - and thanks to Photoshop - we were able to make the photos look awesome.

But within a year, digital cameras were all the rage - and newspapers were enjoying not having to fork over mega bucks for film

and developing supplies. Dark rooms became relics and were no longer used.

Meanwhile, newspapers across the country were in a race - to see who could have an online presence the quickest. In my opinion, the stampede to put newspapers online for free - was not very well thought out, a topic which has been debated for 20 years.

Some have referred to the aftermath as the demise of the newspaper industry. Many papers scampered to repair the financial damage to their bottom lines by putting up pay walls. When a reader goes to the news site, they are met with about three paragraphs from a story and when they click to read more, they are asked to pay for a subscription, for a day, a week, a month or a year. This process has deterred many readers, who just hunt for the rest of the story else-

Today, the industry is still struggling to make sure that community newspapers like the Ballinger Ledger and the Winters Enterprise, maintain a viable business. In 2014, GateHouse Media purchased the two papers along with other papers in Brownwood, Waxahachie,

Midlothian and Glen Rose. And now the challenge is to make sure the two weekly papers continue to grow.

We have worked hard to update the look of the papers and in September, launched websites for both. We have put special sections in the papers during special events. And moving forward, we want to evolve and improve even more.

All of that said, it is very important that the community newspaper is supported by the community or communities it serves.

In 2016, we want to continue to provide more news with better content, more local sports and more opportunities to improve our readership.

I would like to put together an editorial board, made up of members of the community and concerned citizens, who are interested in making the community newspapers better. This six member board will be made up of citizens from across Runnels County.

Friday. "It will take a bit of a ramp up and that way but we wanted to make sure Winters won't be without a grocery store.' City officials were relieved at the an-

nouncement.

'We have see quite a turn of events with businesses in Winters during the past two weeks," said Randall Conner, Economic Development Director for the Winters Area Business and Industrial Corporation. "A agreement with Lawrence Bros was made late last week to retain the pharmacy in Winters when Wal Mart made its announcement to close.'

Soon after, Conner said the decision was made to keep both the Cash Saver and the pharmacy open. The Wal Mart Express opened in 2014. In addition, Winters is also home to Dollar General and Family Dollar

Before all of these events transpired, we knew that it would be difficult for Winters to support two grocery stores and two dollar stores," Conner explained. "We are pleased

that Cash Saver will remain in Winters."

Wal Mart announced Friday Jan. 15 that Wal Mart would be closing 154 stores in the U.S. including 29 stores in Texas. Wal Mart will be closing the 102 Wal Mart Express stores, which had locations in Winters, Anson, Merkel and Haskell in the Big Country.

In a news release Friday, Wal Mart indicated the closures were the result of a review of the company's 11,600 locations world wide and they represented less than 1 percent of

the company's holdings.

Lawrence had previously indicated that Cash Saver would close by the end of January because the community could not support two grocery stores. And last week, they were in the process of closing.

Employees are now working furiously to restock the shelves in the store as well as the pharmacy, Lawrence said.

"It will take us about a week to get to 95 percent but by the time Wal Mart closes on Jan. 28, we should be 100 percent stocked,"

Lawrence Brothers closed a store in Merkel two weeks ago and now will be working to reopen that location as a Cash Saver. The Cash Saver in Anson, which was set to close,

will also remain open.

Meanwhile, Walmart's statement showed that approximately 10,000 U.S. associates (workers) will be impacted by the decision including 30 full and part time employees in

According to the news release, stores for employee transitions are only 10 miles away

from another store. This is not the case in Winters.

The closest Wal Mart locations to Winters are Ballinger, which is 16 miles away, San Angelo, which is approximately 52 miles away and Abilene, which is 40 miles from Winters.

"We are concerned for the Wal Mart employees as they seek new jobs," Conner said Tuesday. "Winters Area Business and Industrial Corp. is working with Workforce Solutions to help the employees secure new jobs and/or job training.'

Conner stressed the importance of shopping locally to keep retail businesses in the

"It is vitally important that we shop at our local stores if we want to keep them," Conner said. "Every time shoppers go out of town to buy items that are available locally, it is a vote to close local businesses.'

Brenda Grohman echoed Conner's comment on the Winters Enterprise Facebook

"This is why we need to purchase locally as much as possible, Lawrence Brothers has been a part of our community for over forty years," Grohman posted. "Without our locally owned business(es), Winters would slowly fade away. Please support our local businesses."

Overall commenters were thankful that Lawrence Brothers made the decision to remain in Winters.

"I was confused as to why Wal Mart was ven allowed in our town knowing in the back of our minds that it could potentially cause a long time merchant to have to close their doors," posted Julie Burch Frierson. "BUT if that wasn't enough once they force the long time merchant out they say never mind we aren't staying! Like they aren't messing with people's lives jobs and our town. Thanks Cash Saver for hanging in there and being here for us!"

Monica Hagle agreed.

"Guess we've found out who really cares about our community," Hagle posted.


