The last drop

Heavy rains fell upon Runnels County last week adding some much needed moisture to the area. Ballinger 3.79 inches of precipitation while Wingate received 1.98 inches of rain according to the National Weather Service in San Angelo reported.

Cloudy conditions continue through Thursday when there is a 40 percent chance of rain in the forecast, with highs in the low 80s and lows around 60. Friday should be sunny and clear with highs in the upper 70s to low 80s. Saturday the forecast calls for partly cloudy conditions with the high around 80 and the low in the upper 50s. There is a slight chance of thunderstorms Sunday.

So far this year, Ballinger has received 6.77 inches of rainfall, with 5.50 reported in Wingate and 7.39 inches received in San Angelo.

he heavy equipment is out at the corner of Highways 83 and 153 where construction has begun for The Crossing Travel Market. Randall Conner, economic development director for the Winters Area Business and Industrial Corp. said that plans called for the construction to go down three feet to

build the base of the facility. "Then it will be another three feet above grade," Conner explained. "That part of the project is coming along nicely.

Conner said recent rains have delayed the work on the project.

"As soon as the base passes inspection, then they will begin concrete work for the building,' Conner said.

Owner Doug Wheat has said

that The Crossing will be a "destination stop" for travelers, commuters, truckers, and local and regional fleets. The Crossing will offer several quick-service food options including Krispy Krunchy Chicken,

Hunt Bros. Pizza, and its Hometown Grill, which will feature a variety of menu offerings. The store will have indoor seating for 40 patrons

An alert convenience store clerk thwarted a robbery attempt early last Wednesday morning, sending a gun wielding wouldbe robber running out the door, officials with the Winters Police Department

Angela Bryan Perkins to make donation Friday

Like many former students from Winters ISD, Angela Bryan Perkins has not forgotten from where she came and this week, she will be in town to make a very special presentation to the Winters Independent School District.

Perkins, who graduated from Winters High School in 1994, will return to

present CPR kits to the district on Friday.

This is a matter very close to her heart because she suffered a cardiac arrest two years ago at the age of 37 while at work. And, thanks to the Dallas Fire and Rescue, the administration of CPR and four shocks from an Automated External Defibrillator, she was revived.

Following the cardiac arrest, Perkins spent 10 days at Medical City Hospital recovering.

Since that time, she has

become heavily involved with the American Heart Association as a spokeswoman and she shares the story of her survival, when

and wherever she can. Meanwhile, doctors have not found the cause of her cardiac arrest. Perkins, who practiced a very healthy lifestyle, is still puzzled as to the cause.

"I try not to worry as much about small things now and be thankful for each day," Perkins said

Just Around the Corner We're on the inside of history

As many of our readers know we have moved the offices of the Ballinger Ledger just down the street to 709 Hutchins to a wonderful historic building owned by Richard and Karen Thorpe of Winters. And, we are so glad to have made the move!

As with any move, from a place of business or a home - it was not an easy task, although I can assure our readers, that we didn't have a lug the type of equipment that the Ballinger Ledger would have had back in the early days like presses, light tables and Lino Type machines, thank goodness. But during the chaos, (all moves are chaos), we may have missed a message or two - if we did, let me apologize.

And now, we are in this historic structure that has been a fixture on the town square for lo more than 125 years - we are home, where we should be.

I had the occasion recently to visit with Bob-O Wright over at Higginbotham's who happens to know a little about the history of this building that once housed the James Brewer Jewelry Store and Soda Fountain. In fact, about 30 years ago, while doing some picking (Bob-O is a world class picker) he came across

looked like a coupon in an old cook book, found in an attic somewhere in Ballinger.

"It was being used a bookmark in an antique cookbook that was a calling card for a Coke," he explained.

So apparently, a century ago, you could go into the jewelry store and have a fountain drink while you shopped. Bob-O had some won-

derful photos of the town square bustling back at the turn of the century and this sandstone building, erected circa 1890, was always featured in the photos. According to Bob-O, a man named Asa Cordill built this building. And from the little bit of information I have gleaned from perusing the Internet, Mr. Cordill was quite the character, having been a community leader,

man about town, son, father and well, as far as I can tell, the first Runnels County resident to own an automo-

I have contacted the good folks at Angelo State University for more information on Asa Cordill, which I will share with readers as I receive it.

Bob-O shared photos of crowds gathered out front in the horse and buggy days, for special community events. There are photos of the flood of 1906, with this building featured in the background with water flowing down what were then, dirt roads and many of the old photos, have the building, with the Runnels County Courthouse built in 1889, also featured prominently in the frame.

Oh, and did I mention the safe? Yes, there is a big old safe in our building and the walls are about a foot thick. It appears to be very well built. Someone said it might be a good place to hide during a storm - but don't close the door, who knows what the combination is!

Thanks to Bob-O we have some interesting old photos to adorn our massively tall



walls. Steve over at Ballinger Printing is doing the honors. Oh yes, and thanks to Fred Schwake for donating a large photo that he had rolled up in his shop, and some other artwork (that is for sale) that we plan to hang in prominent places throughout the building.

Meanwhile, we would like to invite everyone to stop by for an open house this Saturday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. during Ethnic Fest to take a look around. We can swap stories, enjoy some refreshments and we'll have a few free goodies on hand.





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

Deluge a blessing for Runnels County farmers

Rains help wheat, milo

The recent deluge that fell on Runnels County was considered quite the gift to area farmers and ranchers and also filled area livestock tanks and added much needed water to area lakes and reser-

The National Weather Service in San Angelo reported that Ballinger and Winters received about four inches of rain respec-

Meteorologist Matt Groh of the NWS, said there were no damage reports from the rains.

We had intense lightening, but there was no hail - just heavy rainfall," Groh

The rain was a blessing to Dale Duggan, who farms about 1,100 acres with his son in northeast Runnels County. "This rain has been

extremely beneficial for crops," said Duggan, who lives in the community of Crews. "The wheat crop is already in the ground and it will help make a heavier crop.'

Duggan said he and other farmers will take all the rain they can get at this point, but there can be a down side.

"More rains will bolster the crops," he said. "But some of this real young milo where water sits in fields - it could suffer. If it (milo) was really freshly planted it could drown it out.'

Duggan warned against severe weather like hail and high winds, saying that could definitely damage the crops.

"We do not need any hail storms or high winds - a hail storm would devastate it," Duggan said.

That is apparently what happened last year, and the crops were severely damaged.Winters Economic Development Director Randall Conner recalled in a San Angelo Standard Times story published Tuesday.

'Some of the wheat was 100 percent gone and

some 50 percent damaged," Conner recalled. 'Some of the crop was estimated to harvest 60-plus bushels per acre."

If all goes well, the wheat crops could yield 25 to 30 bushels per acre this year, Duggan said.

Duggan said the recent rains were also beneficial for getting the milo growing.
"It will get the milo

growing and thriving and season the ground for cotton planting which is about a month off," Duggan said.

But the rains also filled the tanks that ranchers use to feed their livestock. Many of those, were seri-

"We've caught water in our stock tanks which is needed through the summer for livestock," Duggan

Rain continues to be in the forecast for the weekend, with a 40 percent chance predicted for Sunday, the NWS reports.
