SECRETARY BERGLAND OUTLINES CROP INSURANCE PROGRAM

Terming the current farm disaster programs "a disaster themselves," Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland opened a three-day seminar designed to train Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service personnel in the administration of certain phases of the Federal Crop Insurance Program.

Speaking to a group of Agriculture Department employees, Bergland expressed enthusiasm for a pilot program that will use members of farmer-elected county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committees in some phases of the Crop Insurance Program now administered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Stressing that the pilot program will operate within current legislation, Bergland also indicated that if the project is successful, it could become a very importder White House consideration.

The new crop insurance envisvery systems at the local level ties. by using County ASC Committees to establish coverages for each farm and make the County ASC Office the focal point for handling the insurance program.

A sizeable number of the nation's farmers would need to cooperate in a comprehensive crop insurance program for that program to be successful, according to the

Twenty counties in nine states have been initially selected to participate in the pilot program. The program will open in the selected counties on December 1, when the County ASC Office will become the contact point for county farmers with FCIC policies.

The pilot program will cover selected counties who currently have FCIC policies for 1977 crops will continue to deal directly with FCIC until notified differently.


