ASCS HOPES TO ANNOUNCE FARM PROGRAM DETAILS SOON

Due to the number and complexity of changes in the farm program triggered by the new farm act, some of the details will not be available as soon as area farmers would like.

Farmers are quite naturally interested in getting program details and the ASCS is equally concerned about informing producers as soon as decisions are made. The need for getting information to farmers early is heightened by changes the new farm act has inflicted upon the planted and harvested acres of 1977.

The ASCS is currently gearing up to make wheat deficiency payments, which were generally increased by 43 cents per bushel for the 1977 crop wheat.

This process can only work just so fast with so many changes, the ASCS hopes farmers will be patient until the new regulation can be developed.

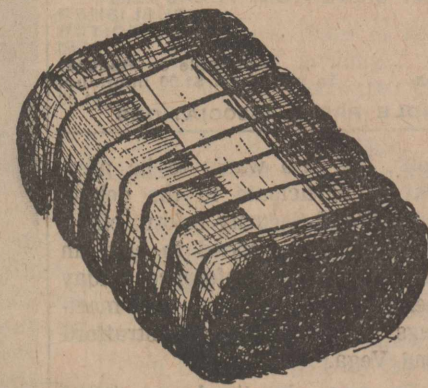
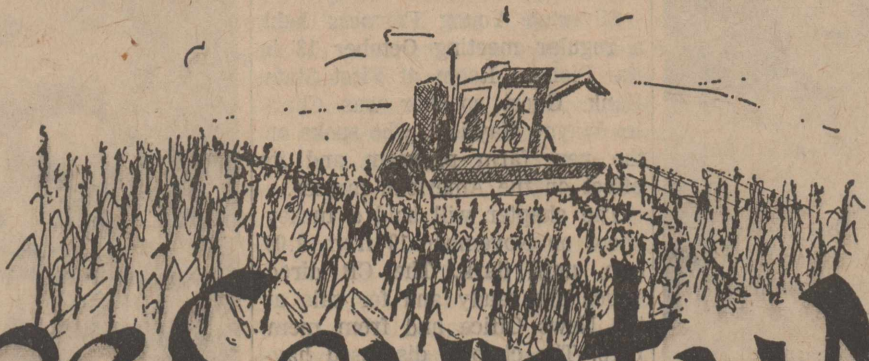
There will be no charge. The clinic will be held in the Silverton Elementary School from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. on November 23.

Owlettes Open New Season By Defeating Cotton Center 77-31

Owls To Host Sudan Today

Please note that the day and time of the football game between Silverton and Sudan has been changed. The game will be played today (Thursday, November 3) at 7:00 p.m. at Owl Field.

This will be the last game of the season for both teams. The Owls traveled to Lazbuddie last Friday night and were defeated 55-6 by the Longhorns who recovered a Silverton fumble on the second play of the game and scored with 11:08 remaining in the first quarter. The Longhorns kicked the extra point and held an early 7-0 lead.

Unwilling to give the Owl offense a chance with the ball, the Longhorns recovered their own on-side kick and scored another touchdown with 10:48 showing on the first quarter clock. They ran for two extra points, and extended their lead to 15-0.

The Longhorns kicked off to the Owls, Silverton fumbled on first down and Lazbuddie recovered. After picking up a first down, the Longhorns fumbled and Jace Francis recovered it for the Owls.

Runs by Doug McJimsey, Jace Francis and Greg Hill picked up two first downs, but the Longhorn defense held and the Owls were forced to punt.

The next Longhorn score came with 9:28 remaining in the second quarter. Lazbuddie also ran for two extra points, and led 23-0.

SECRETARY BERGLAND OUTLINES CROP INSURANCE PROGRAM

Termining the current farm disaster programs "a disaster themselves," Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland opened a three-day seminar designed to train Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service personnel in the administration of certain phases of the Federal Crop Insurance Program.

Speaking to a group of Agricultural Department employees, Bergland expressed enthusiasm for a pilot program that will use members of farmer-elected county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committees in some phases of the Crop Insurance Program now administered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Stressing that the pilot program will operate within current legislation, Bergland also indicated that if the project is successful, it could become a very important part of a new, all-risk Crop Insurance Program currently under White House consideration.

The new crop insurance envisioned by President Carter and Bergland would merge the delivery systems at the local level by using County ASC Committees to establish coverages for each farm and make the County ASC Office the focal point for handling the insurance program.

A sizeable number of the nation's farmers would need to cooperate in a comprehensive crop insurance program for that program to be successful, according to the Secretary.

Twenty counties in nine states have been initially selected to participate in the pilot program. The program will open in the selected counties on December 1, when the County ASC Office will become the contact point for county farmers with FCIC policies.

The pilot program will cover only 1978 crops. Farmers in the selected counties who currently have FCIC policies for 1977 crops will continue to deal directly with FCIC until notified differently.

In Texas, Hale, Knox and Williamson Counties were selected to participate in the program. Representing Texas at the meeting were J. D. Smith, Member, Texas State ASC Committee; Leonard C. Williams, State Executive Director, and Don Loyd, Program Specialist, Texas State ASCS Office.

Tower Cancels Area Tour

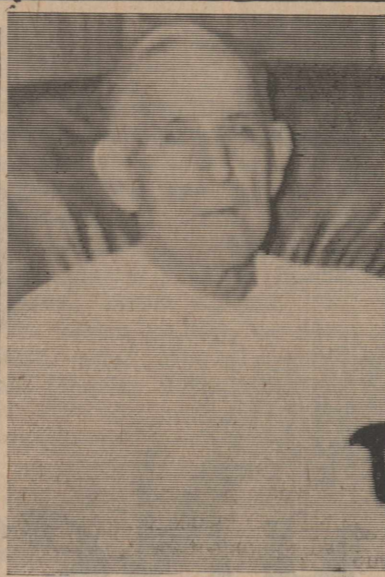
A Panhandle area tour scheduled this week by U. S. Senator John Tower has been cancelled so Tower will not be absent from Congress while important business is being transacted.

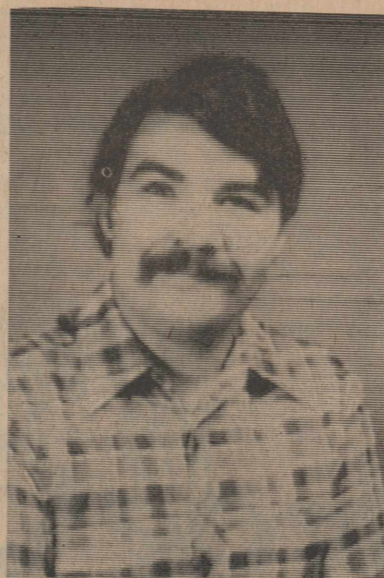
ATTEND CONVENTION
