The Panhandle pheasant season begins Saturday and continues through December 25, with a daily bag limit of two cock birds and a possession limit of four.

The panhandle regulatory counties open for hunting are Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

One county, Terry, in the Permian Basin regulatory district, will have a nine-day season, Saturday through December 18. Terry will be open to this limited hunt with the same daily and possession limits as the Panhandle, although the pheasant population is very small, compared to some northern counties.

Indications show a carrying capacity that will not increase unless landowners furnish more habitat suitable for pheasant. The short season should interest landowners in planting more grain and cover, even though most landowners will not allow any hunting this season.

Sportsmen are reminded to leave the head and feet attached to the pheasant carcass until the bird is delivered to its final destination. This allows law enforcement officers to inspect birds and insure that they have been legally agged.

Most successful hunters use dogs to find the birds or to retrieve the wounded. Hunters familiar with ringnecks know that the bird can run all day as he eludes the sportsman.







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Dear Customer:

The City of Silverton collected four bacteriological samples during the month of September 1977. The results of the coliform bacteriological samples exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523. Drinking water containing coliform bacteria in excess of the standard may constitute a potential threat to public health. Your water system has collected additional check samples as required by the "Drinking Water Standards," and these were found to be free of coliform bacteria.

Coliform organisms are common to the intestinal tracts of man and animals. Their presence in water is an indicator of bacteriological contamination of the sample either from the water system or from a sampling error.

In the months of August, September, October and November 1977, four water samples were tested each month and three of the four samples taken for the month of September were in excess of the standard. The following week additional samples were taken as required and were found to be free of coliform organisms.
