## CHICAGO DOCTORS PERFECT TOXIN FOR SCARLET FEVER

Science has taken one more gigantic stride against disease.

Drs. George F. Dick and Gladys Henry Dick of the John McCormick Institute for infectious diseases, have their claim, the scarlet fever toxin perfected to the point where it will absolutely make for immunity from the disease.

For more than thirteen years doctors have been working to defeat scarlet fever by means of a serum. The last important announcement made was that the fever germs can be isolated. Now it is stated that complete immunity is possible by use of the toxin, and that the reaction is less than that of diphtheria and typhoid inoculations.

The tests which the Doctors Dick used to prove their theory were made on 200 subjects. Not one died after inoculation.



## JURY EXPECTED TO RENDER VERDICT IN COLLIER CASE TODAY. STATEWIDE INTEREST MANIFESTED

Judge Bruce W. Bryant will deliver his charge to the jury this morning at 8 o'clock, which will be followed by the arguments of the attorneys.

County Attorney Clyde Grissom will open for the State, followed by District Attorney Tom Davis. District Attorney Alford of Wichita Falls will close for the State.

Judge W. H. Murchison will open for the defense, followed by Judge Francis. Judge Cummings will close for the defense.

Trial of Mrs. Frank Collier in connection with the shooting of Elzie (Buster) Robertson, her 19-year-old son-in-law, at Wichita Falls last February was begun in the Thirty-Ninth District Court here Monday.

After both sides had announced ready for trial at 10 a. m., a jury was selected in record-breaking time. It was found necessary to examine only forty-three takersmen to procure twelve qualified jurors who were sworn at 2:20 o'clock Monday afternoon.

The indictment against Mrs. Collier was read. She entered a plea of "not guilty."

## Counsel in Case.

The prosecution of State is represented at the trial by District Attorney J. V. Alford of Wichita Falls, District Attorney Tom Davis of Haskell and County Attorney Clyde Grissom of Haskell. The defendant is represented by Attorneys Charles L. Francis of Wichita Falls, B. Y. Cummings of Wichita Falls and W. H. Murchison of Haskell. Sheriff J. C. Turnbow is on duty with several deputies in the courtroom and Miss Estelle Tennyson, District Clerk, is in charge of the court records.

All press associations and about a dozen newspapers have men here to report the proceedings in the case. The interest of the public in the trial seems to be greater than it was when Mr. Collier was tried at Wichita Falls last March.

## Watchman a Witness

The first witness, R. W. Windom, a watchman and former Deputy Sheriff of Wichita Falls, was called to the stand at 3 o'clock and the taking of testimony was in progress during the rest of the afternoon.

Windom was in the locality when the shooting occurred the night of Feb. 14 and described the killing as at the Wichita Falls trial of Frank Collier. He located the street corner at which Buster was killed by means of a diagram chalked on a blackboard by the attorneys and said before the shots were fired he heard Mrs. Robertson cry out, "For God's sake, don't shoot my child down in cold blood!" Witness disarmed Mr. Collier after the shooting and after calling an ambulance drove to the courthouse with Mr.

## GOOD RAIN FALLS OVER THIS SECTION

Late Sunday night a slight sprinkle of rain fell over Haskell county, but according to reports from all sections the rain was very light. In some localities considerable wind was experienced, but from reports the damage was light. A few outbuildings and fences were slightly damaged in the north part of town and C. O. Scott, 3 miles west of town reports his windmill blown down. From over the State and southern Oklahoma serious damage was reported from the wind, hail and flood conditions.

South Texas came in for a fair share of the rain's bounty and wrath. Austin's electric lighting system was wrecked and corn in Travis County was leveled by about one-half inch of rain. Property damage in Austin included the wrecking of the baseball park fence. Cotton in Travis County was benefitted. Temperature dropped fifty degrees and flakes of snow were reported by an Austin resident.

San Antonio's telephone connections with Central and North Texas cities were cut off by a wind which reached fifty miles an hour and which was accompanied by a bountiful rain.

Nine city firemen were injured at San Angelo when wind collapsed the ceiling in their sleeping quarters. Will Underwood, one of the firemen, had forty-six injuries dressed by a physician.

Trees were uprooted and plate glass windows in Abilene were smashed by the wind. Twenty-eight one-hundredths of an inch of rain fell there.

Another shower fell here Wednesday which will make a total of about one-half an inch of rain in the city. Farmers are jubilant over the rain as the ground was getting very dry and hard. This rain will bring up all crops planted

No Worms in a Healthy Child

All children troubled with worms have an unhealthy color, which indicates poor blood, and as a rule, there is more or less stomach disturbance. 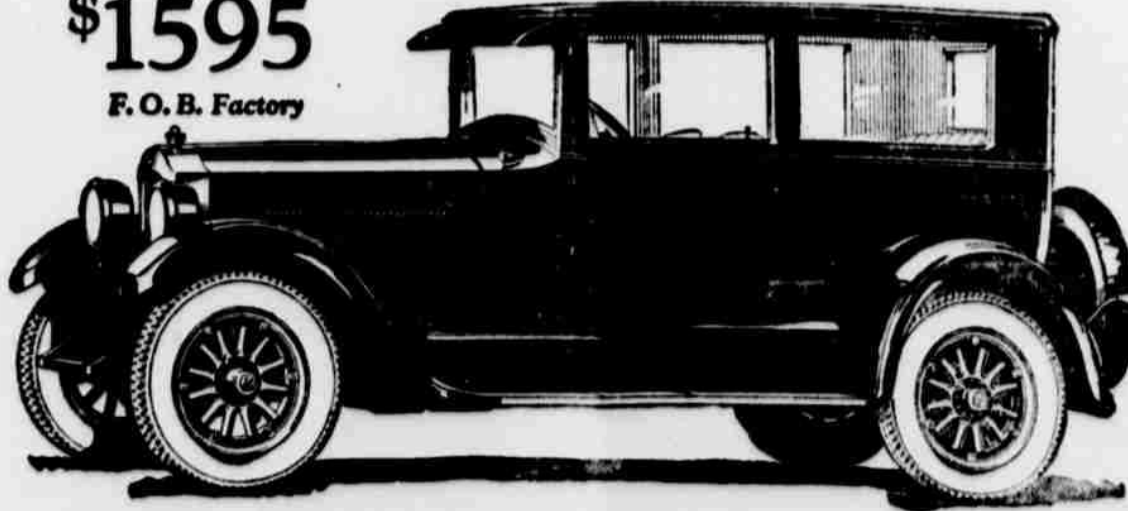

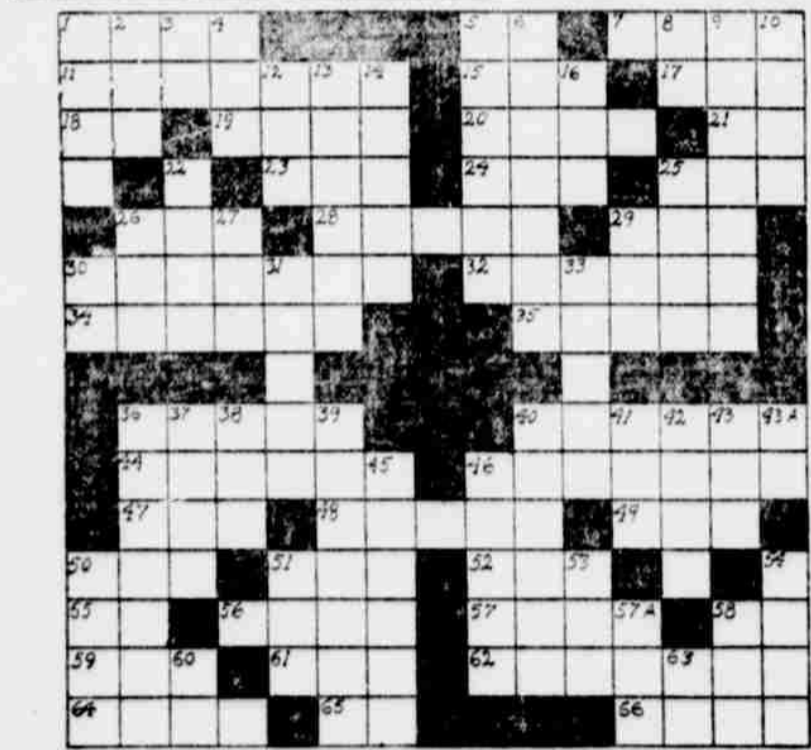

Many Poultry Associations over Texas are urging their members to get rid of the roosters from the poultry yards and sell infertile eggs which will bring a better price and eliminate the waste and loss from selling fertile eggs to the trade in hot weather. You can get an egg stamp from County Agent W. P. Trice and put your name and address on every egg you market and get the best price, which is money to the seller and a saving to the purchaser. Just ordinary roosters should be sold or eaten and you should have no rooster with your flock for at least two weeks before you begin to market eggs under a guarantee.

**BULLETIN CONCERNING  
REGISTRATION OF CARS**

The following instructions regarding the registration laws on automobiles was received from the State Highway Department by County Tax Collector Chas. M. Conner and is given below for the information of all, that the laws governing the registration of motor vehicles might be better understood. The Tax Collector is urged by the Highway Department to track the law to the letter in every instance.

"Special Bulletin to County Tax Collectors cancelling bulletin of May 5th, 1925:

"It is unlawful for a person other than dealers on new cars, to sell or offer for sale, or to purchase any motor vehicle on which the Highway license has not been paid for the year so offered. Therefore, the Tax Collector should require applicant to produce evidence as outlined below:

"If, for instance, a motor vehicle was registered in Travis County for 1924 and has never changed ownership, and application is made to Travis County Tax Collector to register for 1925, the Collector should verify and, if found correct, issue license without any further evidence; but if registered in Travis County for 1924 and removed to some other county, and application is made to register for 1925, the Collector of the other County should require applicant to produce registration receipt for previous year, or if ownership has changed since last registration, applicant should produce transfer.

"Taking the above into consideration if car has not changed ownership, get receipt, and if changed ownership, get transfer. Copy of receipt or transfer may be obtained from this office."

In 1909 with the help of his wife he organized the Union Baptist Mission on Main Street in Fort Worth. Prior to the organization of the present combination with Dr. Hogg, Mr. Williams was assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church of El Paso.

Collier. The pistol, a 45-caliber single-action weapon, was exhibited to the jury.

**Boy's Mother Testifies.**

Mrs. Hattie Robertson, mother of the deceased, was called. The witness was clad in black, including a veil, and was somewhat agitated, but not in the state of near-collapse as at the former trial. She faced Mrs. Collier, who was about twenty feet distant.

Mrs. Robertson described the courtship of her son, Buster, and Mary Frances Collier. The defense objected, but was overruled. She learned of the marriage, Mrs. Robertson said, the day after it occurred.

Buster received a telephone call the night of the killing from Mary Frances, she testified, and with her son she started to the Collier home.

The defense interposed numerous objections, but was overruled.

"I saw a car approaching," she said, "Buster said, 'They come Mr. and Mrs. Collier now, but Mary Frances is not here."

Mr. Collier, she testified, then got out of the car and came around to where she and Buster were standing. He shook hands with her, reluctantly, she testified, and asked her what she had to say about Buster and Mary Frances. "I assured him," said witness, "that Mary Frances would never be abused in my home. Then he seized Buster by the left arm and began shooting. I wrestled with him and tried to prevent him from killing Buster and screamed, 'for God's sake don't kill my boy in cold blood.' Mr. Collier fired four times."

**Mrs. Robertson Weeps.**

Shouting violently, Mrs. Robertson said that after Buster fell she picked his head up in her arms and begged him to speak to her, but the blood rushed and he couldn't utter a word. Mrs. Robertson concluded her testimony with the statement that after the shooting, Mrs. Collier had alighted from the automobile and told Mr. Collier to roll the car back a few feet so that the headlights could shine on Buster's body that his mother might see that he was dead.

Mrs. Robertson was excused without cross-examination and court recessed until Tuesday morning.

Tuesday morning Mrs. Frank Woods, the first witness to be placed on the stand collapsed in the witness chair. She was unable to resume her testimony until Thursday morning, Tuesday afternoon and all day Wednesday the court marked time waiting for the witness to recover sufficient to resume testimony.

Mrs. Woods testified that Mrs. Collier said that she believed they were justified in doing what they had done and if Frank had not killed him she probably would.

At the close of Mrs. Woods testi-

mony the state rested. The defense placed Frank Collier on the stand, but the State's attorney objected to him testifying in behalf of his wife. The defense also rested their case without placing any other witnesses on the stand.

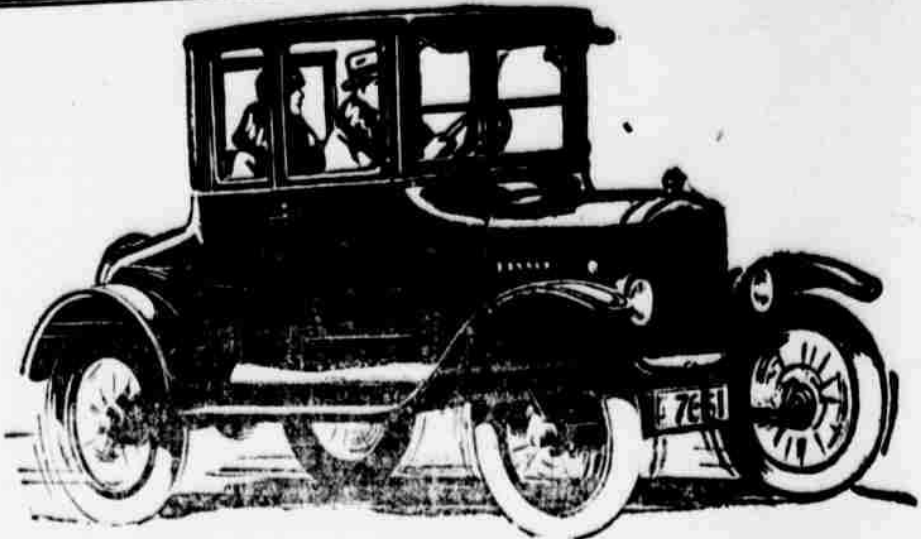
