### **Whaley Announces** For State Office

Foster Whaley of Pampa was in Briscoe County recently, and authorized the local newspaper to print the announcement of his candidacy for State Representative in the 66th Legislative District of

A native of St. Jo, Texas, he was born March 23, 1920. He finished high school at St. Jo and served in World War II under General George S. Patton and received the Bronze Star and Purple Heart.

He finished Texas A&M University as a distinguished student in 1949, and received several awards during the years he served as County Agricultural Agent. His writings have been published in many national publications. One of his publications on hedging of live beef cattle has been reprinted numerous times. In 1967 he was named by a national conservative magazine, "Farm Technology," as one of the top ten County Extension Agents in the nation.

He made the following statement:

"I am today formally announcing my candidacy for the position of State Representative of the 66th District of Texas subject to the Democratic Primary scheduled for May 2, 1978. This district comprises nine rural counties-Armstrong, Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Floyd, Hall, Motley, and Wheeler-and one highly industrialized county-

"To properly represent this diverse and large district, a person must have a unique background. The person should be familiar with the problems and opportunities facing today's modern agriculture. basic knowledge of agriculture. But, I feel my past experience while serving in the Extension Service would be of much greater help in carrying out the responsibilities as State Representative.




After being told that there is "no room at the inn", the celebrants are at last admitted to one of the homes, and the fiesta

The highlight of this celebration is the smashing of the pinata by youngsters.
A clay pot, filled with nuts and candies and other trinkets, and imaginatively decorated with paper-mache, is strung up on a rope; each youngster is

In Mexico, the celebra- blindfolded in turn and allowed to take a swing at the pinata with a stick. Since the rope can be pulled each time a youngster swings at it, many blows are usually required, with much shouting on the part of onlookers, before the pinata is finally broken and goodies cascade upon the delighted youngsters.

The tradition of the pinata was actually brought to Mexico during the 16th century by Europeans. Although it is no longer a tradition in Europe, the custom of breaking a candy-filled pot has flourished in Mexico.

Christmas in Mexico is a blend of both religious sig-nificance and merry-making, much as it is in the United States. And of all the Mexican customs currently enjoyed south of the border, none is merrier than the breaking of the pinata. · ·

### **Ideas For Your Outdoor Tree**

It is not necessary to have an evergreen tree on your lawn to have an outdoor Christmas tree. Almost any small tree can be decorated to look pretty, even in the daytime. When decorating with lights, try using a two-color scheme with the lights, and your tree will stand out from others in the neighborhood. If you don't use lights, but do have trimmings, perhaps you can rig up a lighting arrangement to throw a spotlight on your tree. Heavy cord, double sockets, and a metal gooseneck lamp can turn your lawn into a stage.

A Christmas tree decorated especially for the birds can serve two purposes. It can serve as a helpful restaurant for the feathered friends, and as a different decoration for the humans. Gay red cranberries, white popcorn balls, both lend color, and with other things birds like to eat, atner. Suet strings, or suet cakes are a treat for them. For the cakes take suet or other fat and bird seed and mix the seeds in

the melted fat. Breadcrusts, sunflower seed and nuts can also trim the tree.

Allow one pound per person rub the roast well with salt and freshly ground pepper. Stand it on a rack in an uncovered roasting pan. Place in preheated 450 degree oven for 20 to 25 minutes or until the roast is well seared and brown.
