It's time to talk about blood donations again, even though it hasn't been very long since the Coffee Memorial Bloodmobile was here.

Several Silverton patients in Amarillo hospitals have been using blood, and will have to pay \$50.00 a pint if replacement is not secured.

Even though Silverton people have been generous with their blood donations, many have used their blood to buy blood insurance policies for themselves or others, and not very much has been going into the Silverton pool for replacement of the blood used by those who don't have blood insurance. At this time, the Blood Bank is needing replacement for blood used by Lillus Ruth McJimsey and John Baird. Mrs. McJimsey's blood is to be replaced at the rate of five pints for each one she uses because of the extra filtering, etc. they have been having to do to it before she can receive it. Baird's blood is to be replaced at the rate of about 3 1/2 pints for each pint he used.

Any Silverton residents who would like to help defray this expense to these families are asked either to go directly to Coffee Memorial Blood Bank, 2911 Amarillo Boulevard West, to give blood or to make plans to give blood at the Bloodmobile when it comes to Quitaque soon. A schedule of the day and hours the Bloodmobile will be in Quitaque will be announced as soon as it is received.

All you need to do when you give your blood donation is to say that it is for the Silverton blood pool.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Baird of Silverton; four brothers, Jerry Baird of Silverton, Bob Baird of Huntsville, Arkansas, Jim Baird of Alvord and Bill Baird of Malakoff; and a son, Barry Don Baird, of the home in Silverton.

Last summer, she was listed on the Honor Roll with a 4.7 gpa. She is studying nursing.

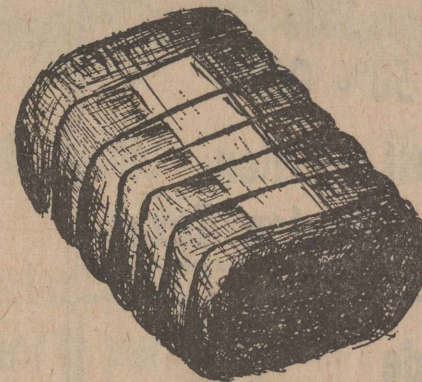
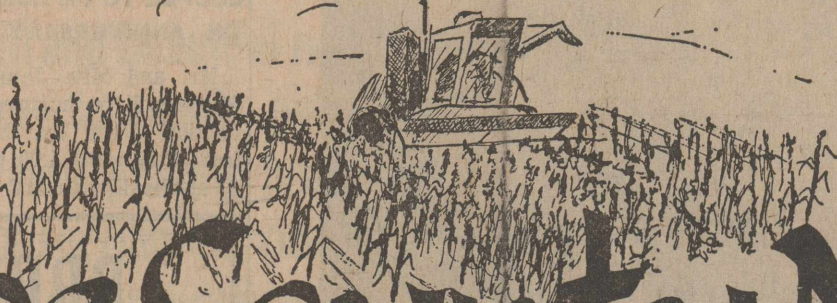
Fred Dudley Dies In League City

Ginning Continuing In Briscoe County

Ginning is continuing in Briscoe County, with Silverton and Quitaque gins having quite a few bales still on the yards to be ginned.

Quitaque gins have reported that when they are finished, they will have turned out approximately 13,000 bales.

The Silverton gins will have ginned approximately 11,000 bales each, and the rural gins will have turned out more than 11,000 bales also.

This gives a total figure for cotton ginned in Briscoe County at near 47,000 bales. This is not, however, the production figure for Briscoe County because of cotton ginned in the county that was produced in other counties, and cotton being hauled to gins at South Plains, Lone Star, Providence, etc.

A total of 22,000 more acres were planted to cotton in Briscoe County this year than the previous year. James Griffin of the Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service office in Silverton estimates the production for Briscoe County to have been 50,000 bales for 1977. Production figures for 1976 totaled 21,400 bales.

CHILDBIRTH PREPARATION CLASSES DISCUSSED

The purpose of Childbirth Preparation Classes is to further the understanding of the birth process so that a couple may share a positive and satisfying childbirth experience. Through knowledge and training the couple is prepared to actively participate in their labor and delivery.

The Lamaze Method prepares women emotionally, intellectually, psychologically and physically for childbirth. Being more aware of the mechanics of labor and delivery enables her to work effectively with the tools she is given. She uses these tools as she and her doctor feel are most effective in her particular labor. Women are taught to regard birth as a positive experience and are trained to respond to their uterine contractions with effective breathing and relaxation techniques learned in the class.

The Lamaze Method does NOT necessarily mean childbirth without any anesthetics. There is usually less need for anesthetics and drugs because the trained couple is physically prepared, relaxed and less fearful. No one is running an endurance contest to win or lose. There may be a problem involving the safety of mother or baby, or it may just hurt too much. She has been taught to give full support to her doctor, primary concern is a healthy mother and baby and a good experience to be remembered, with or without anesthesia.

The Lamaze Method is NOT (necessarily) childbirth without pain. Every woman has a different pain threshold. Every woman is structurally different and the size of the baby or complications may contribute to pain. However, a trained mother knows how to work with, not against, her contractions, eliminating much pain and making pain controllable and positive. We teach that labor and delivery should mean activity, work, concentration, and confidence, not helplessness or suffering.

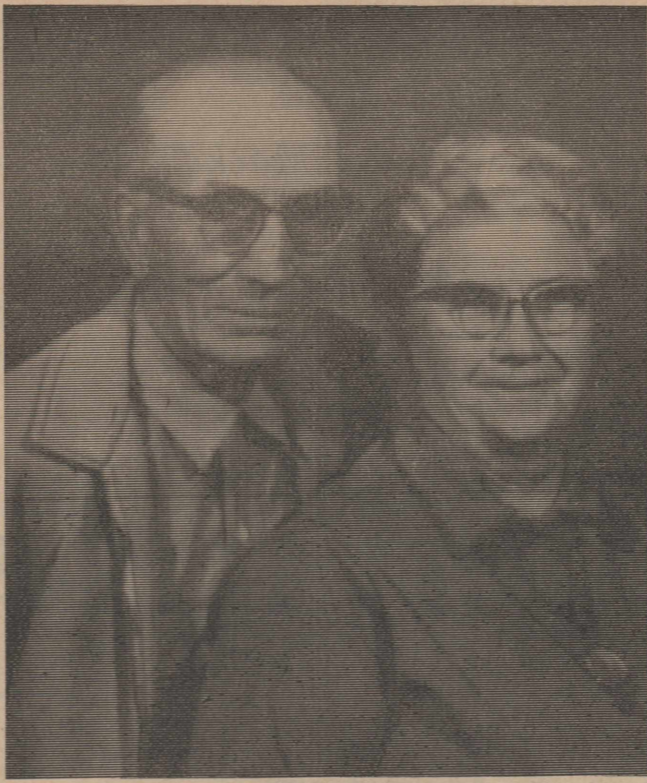

Lamaze is based upon a scientifically devised means of dealing with contractions. The patient is conditioned to respond to contractions with effective responses such as breathing and relaxation.

Lamaze has the distinct advantage of allowing a woman to assume an active rather than a passive role in one of the most important events of her life. It permits her to enjoy and remember with pleasure a uniquely rewarding experience. Her husband is a major part of the childbearing team—he acts as her coach, sharing the experience of birth.
