Because many dryland and limited irrigation farms on the South Plains planted all cotton in 1977, sorghum production was generally found on the higher producing units, Sartin noted. "Thus, only those farms with the higher ASCS yields planted sorghum in 1977, but the average of these must be factored back to equal the composite county average yield,'

As an example, the economist said, a sorghum producer with 110-bushel yield last year might be in a county with a composite average of only 60 bushels an acre, and a factor of around .63 might be required to adjust yields. That farmer's yield for 1978 would be projected at 69.3 bushels (110 by .63). This is the yield that would determine the amount of deficiency and disaster payments he could receive for sorghum in 1978. Sartin explained.

Local ASCS bilices are now calculating the yields for their counties, and these calculations will be mailed to farmers soon, Wil-

If a farmer feels the yield prorecords for 1974-76 on his feed grain and wheat production, he can prove his yields and use the average production for those three years as his payment yield for 1978, Williams said.

"The situation is serious in several South Plains counties as individual producers' payment yields will be substancially reduced from previous levels," Sartin said. He encouraged such farmers to prove their yields with their 1974-76 records

The procedure for proving yields makes it important that farmers give careful consideration to planting a small acreage of each payment crop they might to grow in the next four years,' wish to grow in the next two to four years, Sartin stressed.



A different kind of excitement - maybe - but watching truckloads of fiberglass Indians, stuffed wolves and riverboats being hauled past the Southern Palace

Many people assume that each as still and quiet as a West Texas ghost town. But the 300 employes who work year-round to keep the entertainment center in shape, will testify that it remains a hub of activity between December and mid-March.

Starting in December, employes begin dismantling major parts of the park, piece by piece, to begin massive renovation.

Logs are removed from the Flume ride to be repainted, reneeded. Merchandise is taken out of all gift and souvenir shops so that each building may be thoroughly cleaned and painted, then the shelves are restocked. And, all flower beds are cleared, then

One of the biggest jobs in the yearly fact-lift procedure is to give the park a fresh coat of in the Gifts and Souvenirs departpaint. Approximately 5,000 gallons ment order more than 8,000 diffof paint are used to get the theme park in shape every year.

All rides, ride queue houses and other structures throughout the park are painted.

Replacing lightbulbs is another big job tackled during the winter. More than 5,000 lights must be The hustle and bustle of park replaced before each season be-

Park landscapers work year-round to maintain the lovely scenery for which the park has become well-known. As each season ends, the staff of 30 gardeners cleans out flower beds, trims shrubs, prunes trees and plants flowers. When the park reopens, more than 50,000 pansies, daffodils and tulips fill the park with spring time colors and scents.

Hundreds of animated figures are scattered throughout the park, but few people realize that most of them are constructed and decorated in a specialized department within Six Flags. At the end of each season, every "dancing tamale" seen from the Train ride, every "Indian," "trader" and "wolf" seen from LaSalle's Riverboat ride and every "spelunker" from the Cave Ride is completely overhauled by park

carftsmen Nearly 300 "characters" are mechanically repaired, or rebuilt and repainted. The craftsmen sometimes even build the figures from scratch.

Once the animated characters have been refurbished, they must be fitted in new spring wardrobes. The task of dressing the figures is accomplished by two women who sew everything from loincloths to fuzzy, glow-in-the-dark spelunker hair.

In addition to designing and sewing all costumes for the animated characters, the women also upholster every cushioned ride in the

Park guests rely heavily on the

thousands of signs scattered throughout the entertainment center. Whether looking for rides, show schedules, restrooms or restaurants, visitors can find more than 10,000 signs for information. Before each new season starts, almost half of those signs are replaced.

Safe ride operation is a primary concern during the off-season. During that time, every ride undergoes thorough and scientific examinations by park technicians. Resulting adjustments in the systems may be as minor as replacing a fuse, or as involved as replacing a complete computer safety system.

Guests who become hungry during their visit can choose from more than 40 restaurants and snack stands spread throughout the park. So that those locations will have an adequate supply and variety of food, the Food Service department spends a great deal of the winter ordering food for the coming season.

Just to be prepared for opening weekend, Food Service must order 12,000 hot dogs and 6,000 pounds of hamburger meat. And to quench the thirst of park guests, Six Flags also has more than 5,000 tanks of cold drink mix on hand.

Keeping those drinks cold, as well as chilling the water at all fountains, is part of the job of workers in the ice house. They spend the off-season preparing the facility to produce 15 million pounds of ice used during the operating season.
