## Lions Club Elects New Officers

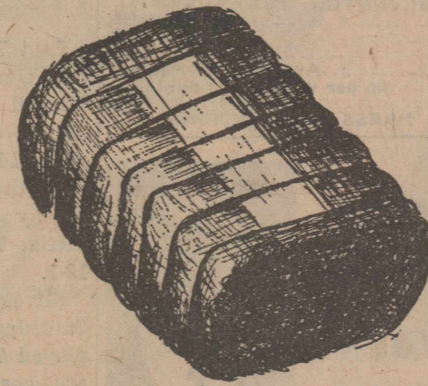
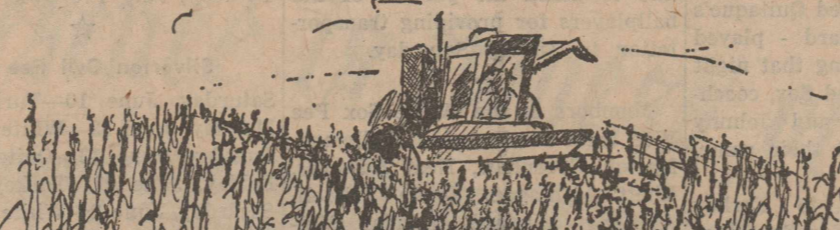

## Archaeological Discovery Made

An archaeological discovery was made at Lake Mackenzie Sunday morning by two boys who were camping on Cope Creek. They located a skeleton skull and upper body which the lake was washing out of the bank.

The grave had been covered by a big sandstone rock, but the rising waters were washing the skeleton and artifacts which had been buried with the body out of the bank and into the lake, according to Gary Martin, Assistant Mackenzie Lake Manager.

Dr. Jack Hughes of West Texas State University was called, and he was taken by boat to the location by Game Wardens Julius Stevens and Ronnie Vandiver, Acting Lake Manager John McCammon and Martin. One-half of the skeleton was out of the water. This was examined and excavated by Dr. Hughes, who commented that it was remarkably well preserved. He stated that he believed it to be the skeleton of a young Comanche Indian woman, and that he would send the Mackenzie Authority a written report on the find. There were several tiny copper or bronze wire bracelets on the skeleton's wrist. Two Spanish bridle bits were also found in the grave along with some little buckles. In the water, a metal stirrup was found. There could have been more that had already gone deeper into the lake and become lost.

Bruce Tiffin and Jeff Jones assisted by volunteering to dive into the water to help retrieve the parts that were being lost.

It is possible, Martin stated, that in the future there will be a display of artifacts that were recovered at Lake Mackenzie before the water began rising, and it may be that the things recovered Sunday will be made a part of the display.

Heavy rains on the watershed have kept Lake Mackenzie on the rise during the past week, and combined with hail and static electricity have just about destroyed the cotton crop. At the present time, some pretty young stands of cotton can be seen between Silverton and Tulia, but a lot of washed and hailed out crops can also be seen. South, southeast and southwest of Tulia, very little crop remains.

Rainfall measured in Silverton during the past week by Fred

Strange has been 3.75 inches, bringing the total rainfall for the year to 13.45 inches. Much heavier rains have fallen elsewhere.

Lake Mackenzie had risen to a depth of 98.5 feet as of Wednesday morning, with water continuing to come into the lake. At that time, there were 937 surface acres of water, up approximately 73 surface acres in the past week. The lake was holding a total of 14,022 acre feet of water, up approximately 4,145 acre feet in the past week.

At 98.5 feet, Lake Mackenzie was 30.34% full. The total rise since May 27 has been 16 1/2 feet.

With dry and warmer weather predicted for the remainder of the week, farmers are trying to decide what crops to plant when their fields are dry enough to support tractors.

Meanwhile, pasture lands have seldom looked better. The native grass is tall and lush, and cattle are contented to graze and walk a short distance to water. Surface lakes are full and farmers are speculating about their value for irrigation water when the new crops come up.

Mr. Oates, who taught last school year at Houston Channelview, is a graduate of Texas A&M University. Originally from Hemp Hill, near Louisiana in East Texas, he will teach junior high science and will be an assistant coach.

Mrs. Nola Denton has been employed to teach fifth grade. She is the wife of Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Silverton. She and her husband moved here last year with their nine children from New York where she had taught for ten years, and she has done substitute teaching in the system for the past several months. She taught school in Texas two years before moving to New York.

According to Superintendent O. C. Rampley, all faculty vacancies are filled except those which occurred in the special education department.

## Information Given On Failed Cotton

Producers who lost planted crops Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 28-29-30, need NOT file a request for failed acreage IF the same commodity that was destroyed is to be replanted.

If any portion of the acreage is to be planted to a different commodity, then a request for failed acreage MUST BE filed with your local ASCS office.

Producers who have planted a farm to cotton (exceeded the NCA) must remember that should grain sorghum be planted on failed cotton ground, the planted acreage of grain sorghum plus the required 10% set-aside must not exceed the NCA.

Also, you must forgo payment on the acreage of cotton that was planted above the NCA.

Crops planted behind failed cotton (such as soybeans and sunflowers) that do NOT require set-aside would not create the problem described above.

**COTTON INJURY FROM HAIL**

In her usual fickle ways, Mother Nature keeps farmers guessing. About rain, about wind, or about temperature. Sometimes, though, it's not what's going to happen that a farmer is concerned about but what has happened, a good example is hail and the damage it does to a crop.

Where, how much and how badly was the crop damaged are the big questions a producer ponders in this instance, and finally comes the big one, "Will I have to replant?"

You don't make snap decisions when it comes to hail damage. It will appear much worse than the actual damage immediately after the storm. In the cast of cotton, the plants have a remarkable capacity to recover. Already this year crops have been hit by hail, and may receive more hail as the season progresses. If a producer's crop suffers hail damage, he will have to consider several factors in determining whether to replant. Among these are growth stage, type and extent of injury and seasonal conditions.

A first point to consider is how much of the field was damaged. A hail storm can reduce the plant population to only two seedlings per row foot in 40-inch rows, or about 26,000 plants per acre, and the crop can still produce a normal yield, unless, of course, the crop is poorly distributed or has long skips.

## SUMMER AG-YOUTH EMPLOYMENT REGULATIONS ARE LISTED

With the summer months fast approaching, potential summer employers of agricultural youth should be aware of certain age and labor requirements which apply to them, points out Briscoe County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker.

Under provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, producers may employ minors 16 years of age and over at any time in any agricultural occupation. Youth 10 to 15 years of age may also be hired but with certain restrictions.

Youth under 16 may not be employed during school hours and may not be employed at any time in an agricultural occupation declared to be hazardous by the Secretary of Labor. Hazardous occupations include the handling or applying of anhydrous ammonia and certain hazardous pesticides; operating, driving or riding on a tractor over 20-horsepower; operating, riding or unclogging certain power-driven farm and fieldstead equipment; and working from a ladder or scaffold at a height of over 20 feet.

Examples of some permitted jobs for youth under 16 included operating a truck, auto or garden-type tractor on the farm proper; loading or unloading trucks; picking produce and placing it on conveyors or in containers; clearing small brush and trees; hand plant-

ing and cultivation; milking cows; raising and caring for poultry; picking cotton; and cleaning barns and other buildings.

Kiker explains that the only exceptions to these provisions apply to employment of youth by their parents. Also, certain student learners enrolled in vocational agriculture education training programs and 4-H youth 14 and 15 years of age completing a tractor and machinery safety project may be certified to operate select, but not all, hazardous equipment.

Kiker further notes that non-hazardous work may be performed with written parental consent by youth 12 and 13 years of age on any farm having less than 500 mandays of labor during any quarter in the preceding calendar year.

THRIPS ARE THREAT TO EARLY VEGETABLES

Young vegetable plants with figured new leaves which seem to be growing too slowly or not at all may be under severe stress from thrips.

Close examination of the growing tips of several plants will confirm the presence of thrips.

Recently emerged pepper, bean and pea seedlings are susceptible to this type of injury from thrips.

Thrips are tiny insects which prey on vegetative tips of young vegetable seedlings. Thrips work their way between the folds of young succulent leaf buds. They scrape the leaf surface and suck the sap out of the tissue.

You must inspect the foliage near the growing tip in the center of your little plants with a magnifying glass to see the thrips. If they are present, you will see them as tiny orange or tan-colored insects scurrying around over the leaves.

Now is the time to watch for thrips and to apply controls, because the stunting they cause will retard early growth and reduce the yield potential of the crop. As the weather gets warmer and wheat matures, the thrips will migrate into home gardens and commercial fields of succulent young vegetables.

Diazinon, Cygon or De-fend, Nudrin or Lannate, and malathion are used for thrips control. Nudrin and Lannate should not be used by home gardeners.

To determine which insecticide is authorized by the Environmental Protection Agency to control thrips on a specific vegetable, you must read the label on the container. Consult "Your Vegetable Garden Insects and Their Control" (MP-1257), or "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Commercial Vegetable Crops" (MP-775), for recommendations.

Be absolutely certain to read insecticide labels thoroughly before spraying insecticide control for thrips to be sure that you can apply the chemical safely.
