According to the report of the Extension Service, A. and M. College of Texas experience last year indicated that amyl acetate used in place of lemons, gave better results, and it is advised this year if it can be obtain-

ed The formula recommended is: Wheat bran (avoid shorts) 25 lbs. White arsenic (or Paris rGeen)-1 16 Amyi acetate-1 ounce.

Cane molasses (avoid cane syrup)-2 quarts

> It is important to thoroughly mix after each addition of water, to secure an even distribution of all the materials. After one or two batches have been mixed, a person will learn how much water to use, so that no further additions need be made.

Only high grade amyl acetate should be used. Avoid bronzing liquids, which contain so great a portion of other substances as to be repellant to the hoppers. Where high grade amyl acetate cannot be obtained, use six lemons or oranges with the twentyfive pounds of bran. Squeeze the juce into the water grind the rinds thoroughly with a fine meat chopper and add to the water also, and then mix. It is important to include the rinds and to chop finely as advised. Merely cutting up with a knife will formula should cover five acres.

Do Not Put This Out In Piles The mash should be sown broad cast like sowing seed. The hoppers feed in the morning, and as the bait is more attractive when wet, it should be sown in the morning, before eight o'clock. Where the acreage to be covered is too large, sowing in late even-

ing may be resorted to.

Dead grasshoppers will not be found in great numbers for two or three days after sowing the mash.

Sown broadcast, as advised there is no dager to stock, and very little, if any danger, to poultry and wild hirds.
