For those who are planning a trip to Texas Stadium to watch the Dallas Cowboys this season, I have a word of advice. We attended the Cowboy-Steeler game Saturday night, and it was 95° inside the stadium during the game. Everywhere I looked I saw people with perspiration running down their faces.

We saw pitching in the last inning of the game Sunday night by Kansas City's Mad Hungarian. Now this cat is really something, as you have probably noticed by watching him on television. He walks off the back side of the pitcher's mound and about halfway to second base and psyches himself up before marching back to the mound and pitching. He accepts the sign from the catcher with a nod, then shakes his head as he goes into his stretch. The KC fans love him—the Ranger fans boo him.

Verlin Towe says his son, Greg, got them some tickets and that they were at the game Friday night when Zisk hit his grand slam homer. There weren't quite 40,000 people there, but we didn't see the Toves.

CAUTION URGED WHEN DRIVING PAST SCHOOLS

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety at Lubbock, said today, "There are hundreds of thousands of good reasons why Texas motorists should use extra caution when driving near schools during the next few weeks.

"Many of our youngsters will be going to school for the first time and will not be aware of the many hazards existing on Texas' busy streets and highways.

"Precautionary measures, such as traffic signs and signals, safety zones and pedestrian crosswalks are virtually useless if your children have not acquired good pedestrian safety habits."

Children's responsibilities to and from school include: observing all traffic signs and signals, walking against the flow of traffic when no sidewalk is present, crossing streets at designated crosswalks, and maintaining orderly conduct while enroute to and from school.

"As parents, we must be absolutely sure our children have a clear understanding of traffic dangers. In addition, as drivers, we must always be on the lookout for school children. It's our responsibility—as a parent—as a motorist—as a citizen," said Major Bell.

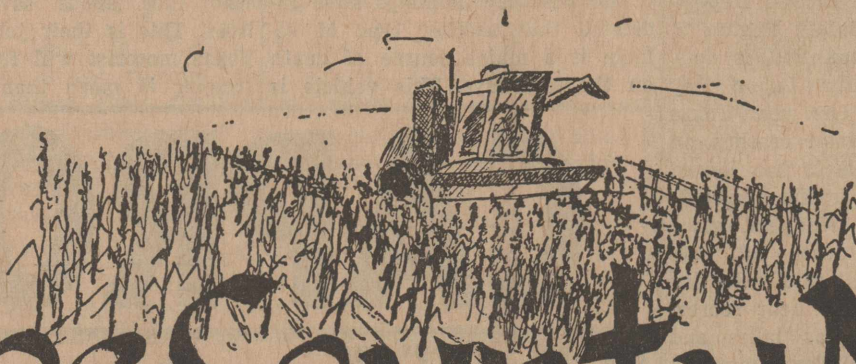

Information Given On School Meals Program

The Silverton School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75 cents, breakfast for 35 cents and extra milk for 10 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the scale below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents and for breakfast 10 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, complete an application form which is available in the office of Superintendent O. C. Rampley. The information given on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced-price meals. Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing O. C. Rampley, Box 597, Silverton, Texas 79257, 806-823-2476.

In certain cases foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. BOYS RANCH PREPARING FOR ANNUAL RODEO

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, 36 miles northwest of Amarillo, 385 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-fourth annual Boys Ranch Rodeo.

Practice rides on the broncs and bulls have been going on since June with only about 150 riders expected to appear in the Ranch's rodeo arena over the Labor Day weekend. They will be competing in bareback bronc riding, Brahma bulls, steers, calves and even stick horses for the three-to-six-year-olds. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys riding professional rodeo stock under RCA rules are the only contestants.

Approximately 3,000 boys have lived at the Ranch since it was started in 1939, and the rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the Boys Ranch Alumni Association. Some of the graduates and their families travel long distances to attend.

An added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1.50. Reserve box seat tickets at \$2.50 will be on sale at the Boys Ranch Office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75c for children under twelve. Performances are scheduled for 3:00 p.m. each afternoon, September 3 and 4.

4-H adult and teen leaders who are involved in Horse Programs are invited to participate in a September 22-24 workshop at the Texas 4-H Center near Brownwood, according to County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker.

"Theme of the weekend workshop sessions is 'A More Productive County 4-H Horse Program,' and 4-H volunteer leaders from throughout the state will be present to learn and share new ideas," Kiker adds.

Instructors for the September 22-24 training will include Dr. Doug Householder and B. F. Yeates, Extension Horse Specialists, College Station; Dr. Bill Jackson, Iris Kalich and Janet Yeates, Area 4-H and Youth Specialists; and County Extension Agents Mac Gilliat, Real County, and Greg Gerngross, Callahan County.

Participants will select several workshop sessions on such topics as "How To Work With, Teach, and Challenge 4-H Members;" "Visuals and Resources for 4-H Horse Programs;" "Horse Show Planning and Management;" "Try A Yearly Horse Project Calendar;" "Horse-ship;" "Horse Judging;" and "Demonstrations and Records."

Bell Hoping For Safer Holiday

Regional Commander Major C. W. Bell of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region 5, composed of 60 counties, is optimistic for a safer Labor Day Weekend in 1978. Last year, Texas lost only 27 in fatal crashes on the highways. This is the lowest number killed in traffic accidents on a Labor Day Weekend since 1966, when the death toll was only 23. Major Bell said, "Holiday traffic will be heavy near recreational areas such as lakes and camp grounds. The Texas motorist should be extra careful for children playing and for motorcycles. Both are difficult to recognize by the motorist in these crowded places." Bell said that the drinking driver still poses a problem in traffic. He urges the motorists to cooperate with all law enforcement agencies in helping to reduce loss of life by being especially alert for the drunken driver.

The Texas Department of Public Safety will have all its uniformed personnel available around the clock during Labor Day Operation.

end.

Major Bell concluded by saying, "More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed by the handgun. These traffic deaths are just as senseless, as needless, and as tragic as those by the handgun, but not nearly as well publicized."

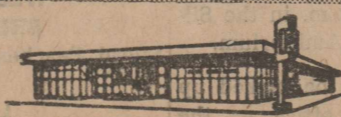
