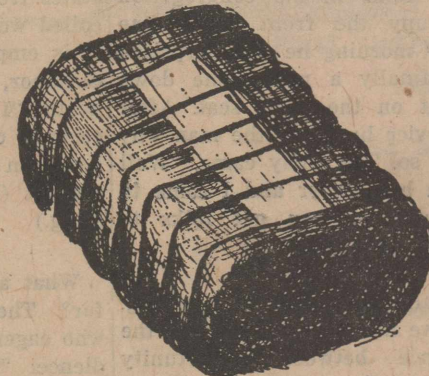
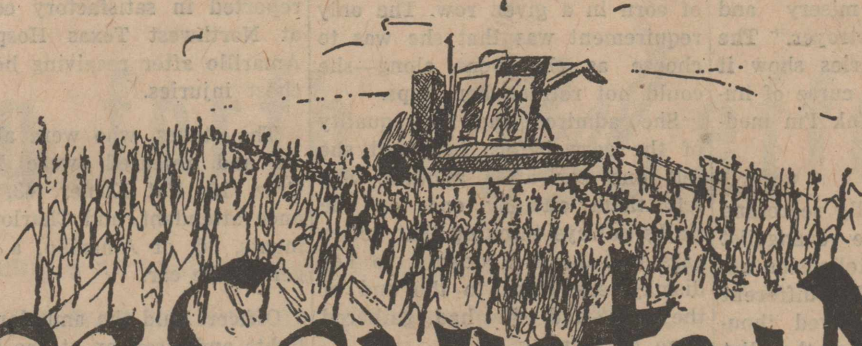

Silverton's varsity Owls entered their game last Friday night with high hopes after their junior varsity counterparts had defeated Hart 16-0 the previous night, and came away with a big 12-0 victory.

A large crowd of fans was on hand to see the Owl defense completely stifle the Longhorns. Almost all of the game was played in Hart's end of the field, with the Longhorns having no penetration and no scoring threat.

The Owls opened the game by kicking off to Hart and holding them to a four-yard gain. Silverton moved to a first down via a penalty against Hart, but after a six-yard gain on three downs was forced to punt away. This time Hart was held to a five-yard gain, and the Longhorn punt was taken by Kirk Durham back to the Silverton 40.

Making eight yards on three tries, the Owls punted to the Horns again, they fumbled, and Larry Stephens recovered for the Owls.

After a series of incomplete passes, the ball went over to Hart on downs, and this time Hart made their first first down of the game on their own 42. The Horns made another first down by inches on the Silverton 48, and had their next series of plays marred by penalties. The first was a 15-yard penalty against Hart for having an ineligible receiver downfield. On their next play, a pass was intercepted by Paul Brannon, but this was nullified by a penalty against the Owls, and Hart was given a first down on the 43. Kelly Comer intercepted Hart's next pass for the Owls, giving the lo-

er loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation. "Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mr. James said.

### Emergency Loans Available From Farmers Home Administration

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), George H. James, Jr., FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Mr. James asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought and hail to make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 219 NW Second Street, Tulia, Texas. Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until June 27, 1979 for physical losses and October 1, 1979 for production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation.

The City of Silverton has been notified that on August 28, 1978, Mr. Ron Freeman of the Texas Department of Health regional office, inspected the city's municipal solid waste disposal facility.

The inspection revealed, according to the Department of Health, that the site is being operated in violation of the following subsections of the enclosed April 1977 "Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations." The corrective actions required for each violation are described as indicated.

1. F-2.8: "Our representative noted open burning of deposited waste. Open burning of solid waste at this disposal site may be in violation of the Texas Air Control Board's rules and regulations and should be discontinued unless authorization for open burning is obtained from the Texas Air Control Board."

2. F-2.13: "A Type III operation with monthly compaction and covering of all deposited solid waste with at least six inches of compacted earth must be provided. A final cover of two feet of compacted earth must be placed over the entire surface of each completed portion of the disposal area. The final compacted cover must be graded to drain and should be seeded to prevent erosion."

Mr. Jack C. Carmichael, P. E., Director, Division of Solid Waste Management, went on to say: "As you are aware, proper cover is an impossibility at this site. Therefore, the City must take immediate action to relocate in an area where all deposited refuse can be disposed of properly."

Needless to say, if the City of Silverton has to relocate its dump-ground and purchase equipment for the operation of a sanitary landfill operation, this will place an enormous burden upon the city's taxpayers. Steps are being taken to seek immunity to this order.

### BUS BEING TAKEN TO FOOTBALL GAME AT HAPPY

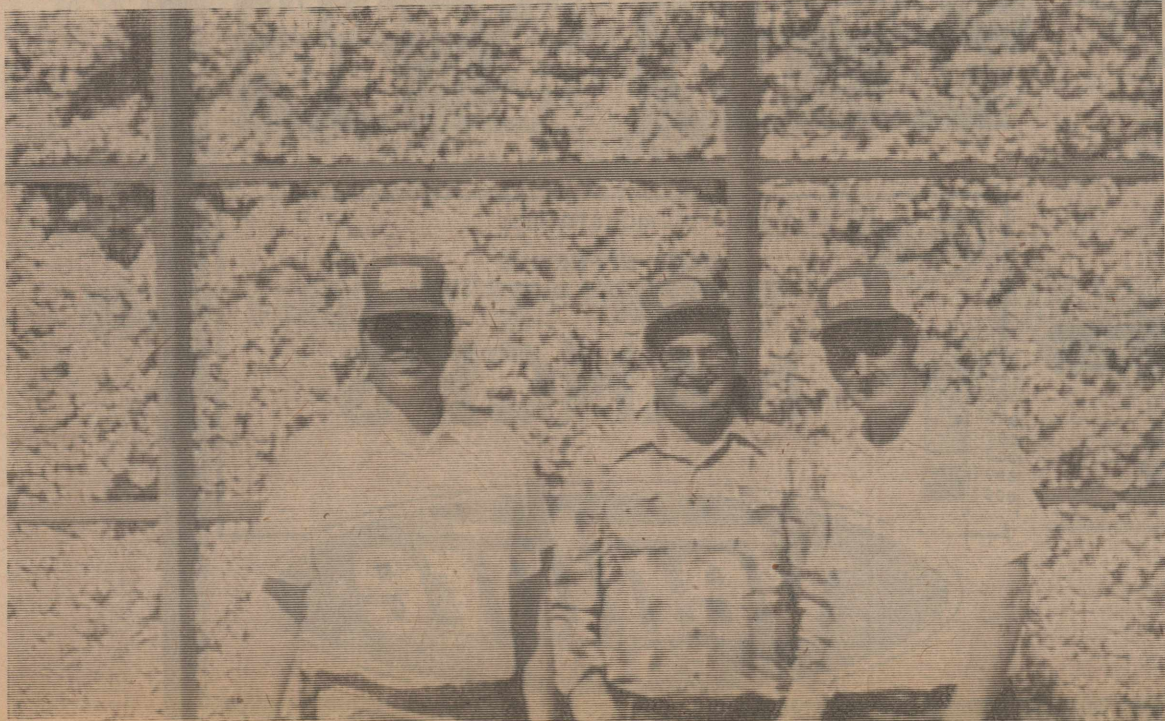

# European Corn Borer Can Be Controlled

The European Corn Borer, found recently in 15 Texas Panhandle counties, is no more of a threat to corn crops than the Southwestern Corn Borer, which farmers have battled successfully for years.

That view is held by research entomologists who have studied both pests over the years.

"Given an equal infestation of the European Corn Borer and the Southwestern, the Southwestern is more damaging to crops," said Dr. John Campbell, a research entomologist with Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., the world's largest agri-genetics organization. "Since the same chemical applications can be used to control both insects, and since Texas farmers already keep a sharp eye out for the Southwestern borer, additional crop damage should be minimal."

Pioneer's research team has studied the European Corn Borer for 25 years, aiming toward developing hybrids strong enough to tolerate that insect as well as others. Dr. Campbell and Pioneer consultant Ferd Dicke have conducted research extensively in Des Moines, Iowa, which is in the heart of the nation's Midwest corn belt.

The Midwest has been plagued by the European Corn Borer for many years, but when infestation of crops in Moore County in the Panhandle was reported recently, it was the first indication of the insect in Texas since mid-1960s.

A subsequent investigation by the Texas Department of Agriculture in 30 Panhandle counties revealed the European Corn Borer has already reached crops in 15 counties, including Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Hutchinson, Roberts, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Deaf Smith and Randall along with the first known location in Moore County.

Because of the way it feeds on corn plants, the European Corn Borer is potentially less dangerous than the Southwestern variety, according to Dr. Campbell. The European is normally found throughout the stalk of the plant, while the Southwestern concentrates on the lower part of the plant near the base. Both insects cause some ear dropping and stalk breakage, but in the case of the European Corn Borer the breakage is usually above the ear and the corn is still harvestable.

The European borer also chews leaves, but while that action may inhibit plant function, it is generally not severe enough to kill the plant.

The best way to deal with the European Corn Borer is to try to control it chemically, Dr. Campbell said. "Any farmer accustomed to some degree of insect control should be able to control the European Corn Borer," he said.

"One way to avoid extensive damage is to plant as early as possible so the corn may mature before the second generation of European Corn Borers, the most dangerous, has a chance to do much damage," Dr. Campbell said. The damaging effects can also be reduced by planting faster maturing hybrids.

"Planting early and using chemicals to control the insects are the most successful ways of avoiding crop damage," he said. "You never get 100 percent control over an insect, but you try to minimize your losses. The farmer has

Panhandle farmers should not be afraid to plant corn because of the threat of possible European Corn Borer infestation. The insect also feeds on other hosts, including beans, peppers, grain sorghum and certain weeds, so the Panhandle would still have to fight recurrent infestation even if the insect could be eradicated from the corn crops.

The severity of infestation varies from year to year, depending on the weather and other conditions. "It seems like the first year or two after the insects infest an area are the worst," Dr. Campbell said. He added that hot temperatures, such as the conditions in the Panhandle last June, promote large populations of European Corn Borers just as they aid Southwestern Corn Borers.

TDA officials are currently discussing the possibility of a quarantine with Panhandle grain dealers, feedlot operators, mill operators and agents of the Texas Extension Service. A public hearing was held Wednesday at the Agricultural Research Center in Amarillo.

"I couldn't advocate a quarantine as an effective means to combat the spread of the insect on the High Plains of Texas, since the greatest danger of spread in that area is from moth flight," Dicke, a former research entomologist with the United States Department of Agriculture, said. Transmission of the European Corn Borer to other parts of Texas when corn is shipped out of the area could be reduced by a quarantine.

If the 15 affected Panhandle counties, which primarily provide corn for feedlots, were quarantined, crops would have to be either fumigated or screened before they were shipped out of the county.

Sifting the corn through one-half inch mesh screens would eliminate most of the inch-long borers. The corn could still be shipped, but it could be quite expensive to fulfill the requirements of the quarantine.

As part of its total research program, Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., has bred hybrids for stronger stalks to prevent diseases and insects from destroying plants. Potential parent lines are grown in nurseries and purposely infested with insects such as the European Corn Borer to test their strength. Weak hybrids are eliminated. The stronger hybrids are used to furnish seeds for the sturdiest plants possible in the farm industry.

# Five Injured In Collision Of Tulia Ambulance, Car

Five persons were injured when a car and the Tulia ambulance, which was rushing an expectant mother in labor to an Amarillo hospital, collided at the intersection of Bell and 45th Streets in Amarillo at 8:30 a.m. Thursday of last week.

Mrs. Esbarido Cruz, 19, of Tulia gave birth prematurely at 8:52 a.m. Thursday to a two pound, two ounce baby girl. Mrs. Cruz was not seriously injured in the accident. The baby was reported in critical condition because of her premature birth.

Lloyd Holland, 64, of Tulia, operator of the ambulance service and driver of the ambulance, was reported in satisfactory condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo after receiving head and chest injuries.

The others, who were all treated and released, were Esbarido Cruz, 19; Pat Kisner, 43, ambulance attendant, and Charlotte Clements, 36, of Amarillo, a passenger in the car.

Officers said the ambulance had lights and siren on at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Emilio Cruz, grandmother of the newborn infant, told the Briscoe County News early this week that the baby is still in intensive care at Northwest Texas Hospital and is still not doing very well. She said that her daughter-in-law was not injured and that her son's injuries were mostly bumps and bruises.

### Whaley Addresses Silverton Lions

Foster Whaley of Pampa, democratic nominee for State Representative, spoke to members of the Silverton Lions Club on Thursday, October 5.

Whaley reviewed legislation that was passed during the special session of the State Legislature this summer.

"In addition to repealing the sales tax on utility bills, the inheritance tax was amended and the exemption raised to a substantially higher level," Whaley said. An amendment was passed that will be on the ballot on November

7 which will make a host of changes in the state constitution, according to Whaley.

Among them are:  
1. Removal of intangibles (stock, bonds and savings accounts) from the property tax base

2. Exemption of household goods

3. Mandate that farm and ranch land be taxed on productive value

4. Mandate a \$5,000 homestead exemption by school districts for all residential property owners, and permit the legislature to give from zero to \$10,000 additional dollars to those over age 65

5. Impose a limit on the growth of state government to that of the state's economy as determined by law

6. Prohibit any statewide appraisal of property.

The Legislature passed a bill that would set up a \$450 million state fund to reimburse school districts for losses created by the mandated reduction in taxes.

The Legislature would have the power to reinstate intangibles on the tax rolls, but Whaley did not anticipate this being done if the amendment passes.

Before the special session the State Comptroller estimated there would be a \$3 billion dollar surplus in the state treasury by January 1, 1979.

The passage of the utility tax and the amendment, should it pass, would reduce local taxes by \$1 billion.

### Junior Varsity Owls Take Big Win At Hart

Silverton's junior varsity Owls took a big 16-0 victory over the Hart Longhorn JV last Thursday night. The Owls played a very good game against the much-larger Longhorn squad, and in addition, after Michael Greenhaw was injured only 11 players remained to finish the game.

The first touchdown was scored as quarterback Casey Bean scrambled to pass. The 35-yard pass was completed to Brandon Jarrett. The two-point conversion was scored on a pass from Bean to Russell Couch, and at halftime the Owls held an 8-0 lead.

Hart penetrated inside the Silverton 10-yard line with less than two minutes remaining to be played in the game. Mark Patton intercepted a Hart pass and ran it back 95 yards for another score for the Owls. The conversion was another Bean to Couch pass, resulting in the 16-0 final score.

The junior varsity Owls will play their first home game of the season against Claude tonight (Thursday) at 7:00 o'clock. They need your help and support, so plan now to fill the stands tonight to make a lot of noise for the Owls.

The junior high Owls are idle today.

### BRISCOE AUTHORIZED FOR EMERGENCY LOANS

Briscoe is included among counties which are authorized to make emergency loans, this being due to drought conditions June 1, 1978 through September 20, 1978, and hail damage May 27-28, 1978.

Emergency loan applications will not be received after June 27, 1979 for physical losses and October 1, 1979 for production losses. Applications pending on that date may be completed and approved. Emergency loans may be made in this county under Farmers Home Administration Instruction 1980-B and 1945-A.

This authorization will be coded 0091. County Supervisors are instructed to notify other lenders in the county of this authorization. Annual production losses to a borrower indebted under this disaster cannot be made after December 31, 1984.

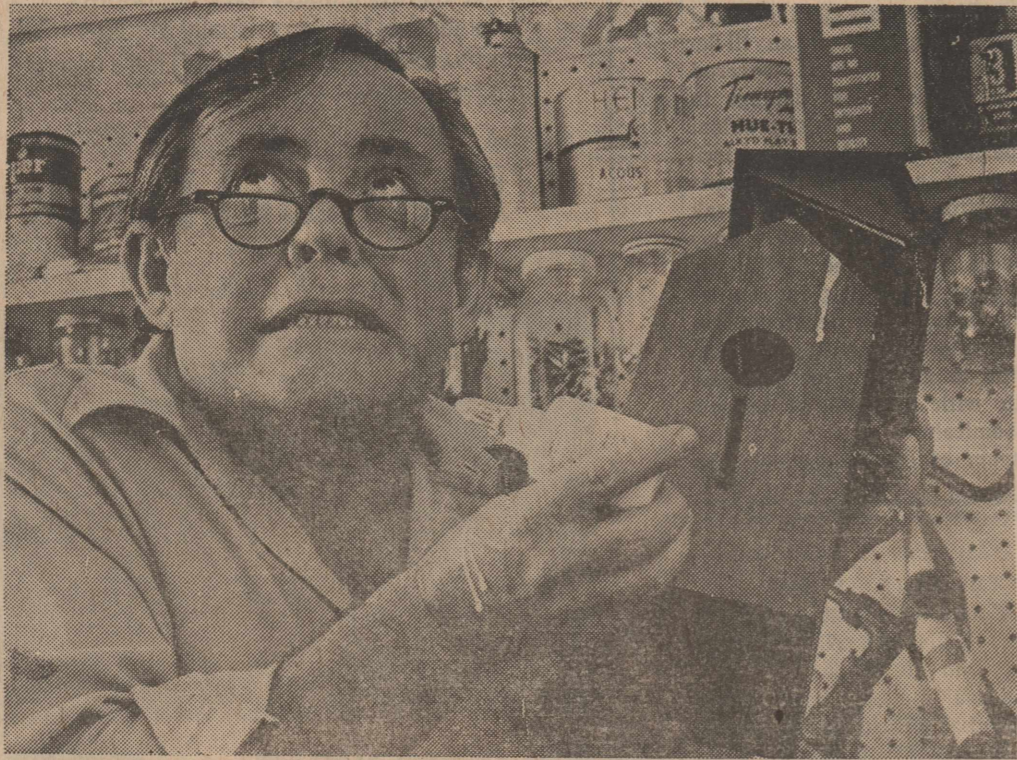

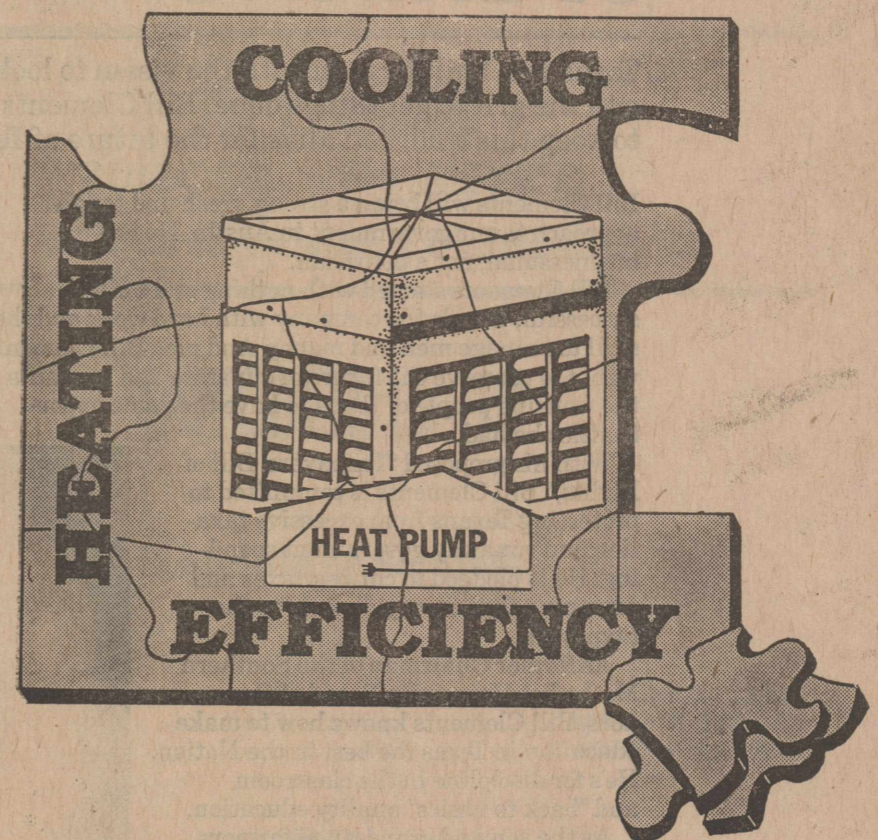

**4-H Allows 'Freedom To Be'**

There are a lot of ways to participate in 4-H, points out Earnest C. Kiker, Briscoe County Extension Agent. In Texas, many youth enroll in a 4-H club at school, where they receive a monthly educational program and select a project for independent study.

Some youngsters are in special interest groups that study one special subject, such as horsemanship, livestock, electricity or leadership.

Other youth are in community clubs that meet in neighborhoods with a local 4-H volunteer leader. They study projects and carry out group activities in community service.

Around 50,000 Texas youth viewed the TV series "Mulligan Stew" last year. The program emphasized good nutrition as a means to good health.

School enrichment programs on entomology, embryology, dairy science and bicycle safety reaches other children. The expanded food and nutrition education program also serves thousands of youth.

This problem is especially critical in the irrigated areas of the South Plains where cotton was still in the peak fiber development period. Many producers are now faced with the problem of evaluating the extent of this damage and deciding whether to allow the cotton crop to continue to grow or to terminate growth with the use of harvest aid chemicals.

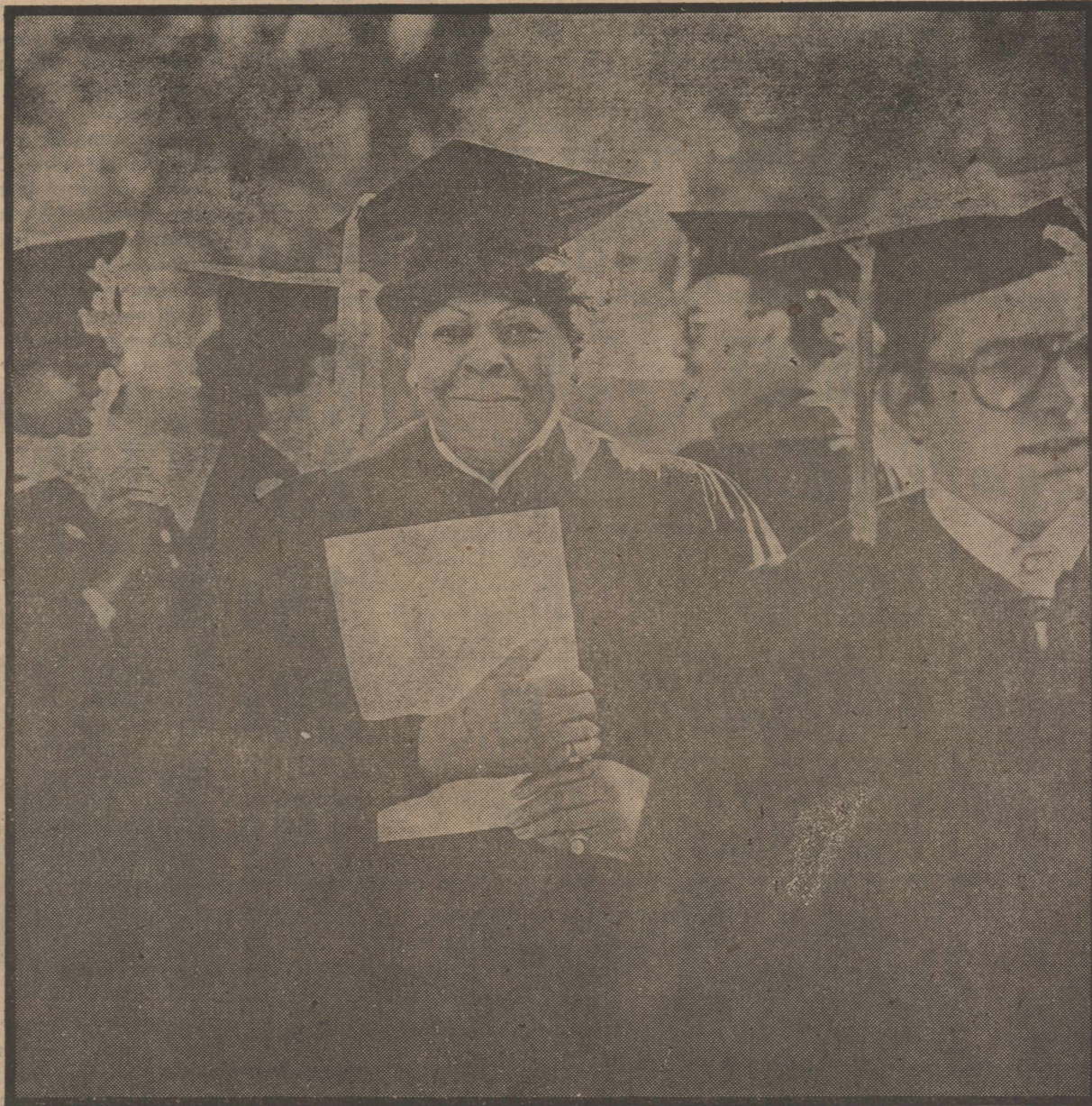
