Mrs. Burk gave an interesting and informative program on Christmas Crafts.

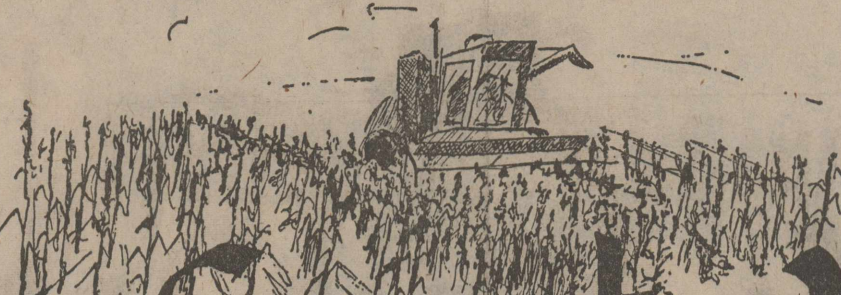
At the business meeting, the Family Christmas Supper, Senior Citizens Tea and Santa were discussed.

Silvertown's Owls and Owlettes lost their games at Hedley last Friday night, but Coach David Horner and most of the fans were optimistic about the season's prospects for the Owls after the game due to their good showing against Hedley, a perennial Class B power, and the fact that it was the first game for Silvertown since the end of football season. Since Hedley does not play football, they get a bit of a head start.

Silvertown's offense was led by Paul Brannon who caged 18 points. Kirk Durham was the leading rebounder with seven. The team hit 34% of their field goal attempts, 21 of 61, and a big 70%, 12 of 17, from the line.

Also scoring in the double figures were Kirk Durham and Earl Jarrett, who tossed in 12 points each. James Alan Patton and Bill Denton rang up four points each, and Kyle Bean and Bobby McPher-

son contributed two points each.

green begin as "Greenhands." After at least one semester of vocational agriculture, members may be advanced by the local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer." The third degree, that of "State Farmer," is presented by the State FFA Association. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree.

In addition to having earned the State Farmer Degree, candidates for the American Farmer Degree must have been active members of the FFA for at least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities and they must have completed all of the vocational agriculture instruction offered in their high school. American Farmer applicants must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts and they must have demonstrated leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities.

The National FFA Convention is an annual event of the Future Farmers of America and is carried out in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education, of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. This year over 20,000 FFA members, vocational agriculture teachers, parents and guests took part in the Golden Anniversary National FFA Convention.

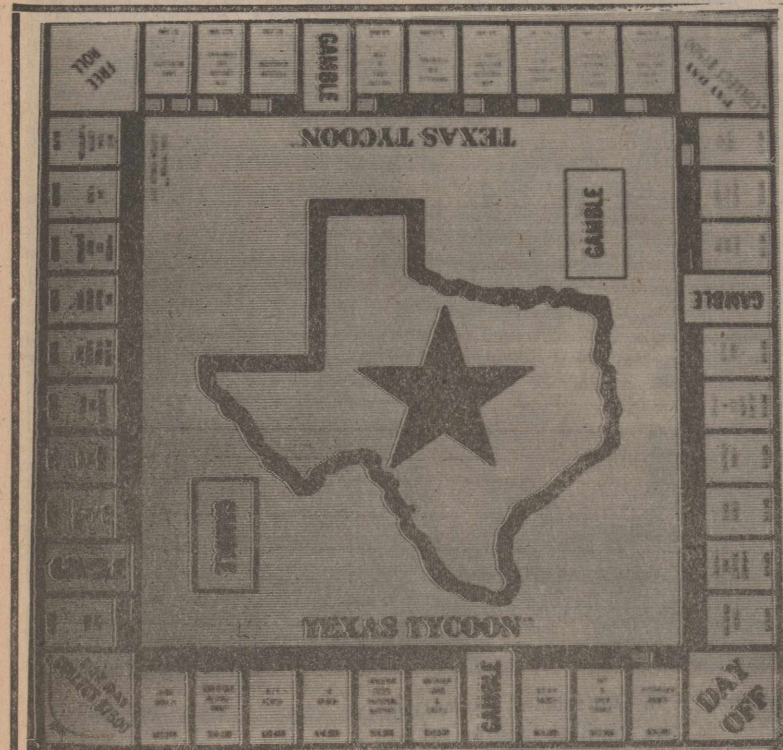

THE AG SIDE
Maximum return on every gallon of irrigation water has been the topic of many hours of research by agricultural agencies the past 2 years. As fuels grow higher in cost and equipment and its repair grows higher again the farmer and rancher must change procedures and habits. To explain a few, just 5 years ago it was economically feasible to irrigate grasses to run cattle on. Then the price of cattle broke making it impossible to make money even pasturing cattle on dry grass and of course a big loss if you watered grass for pasture. For cash crop irrigation the farmer has had to use almost perfect timing and the water very conservative to make grain crops pay. The agricultural experiment stations over the area have spent many hours these last two years developing the best methods to make irrigation pay. They have worked on everything from skip row planting to the use of smaller amounts of water at the right time. It would be wise for irrigation farmers to go spend a little time with the fellows at the experiment station if you haven't already before you set up your watering program this year.

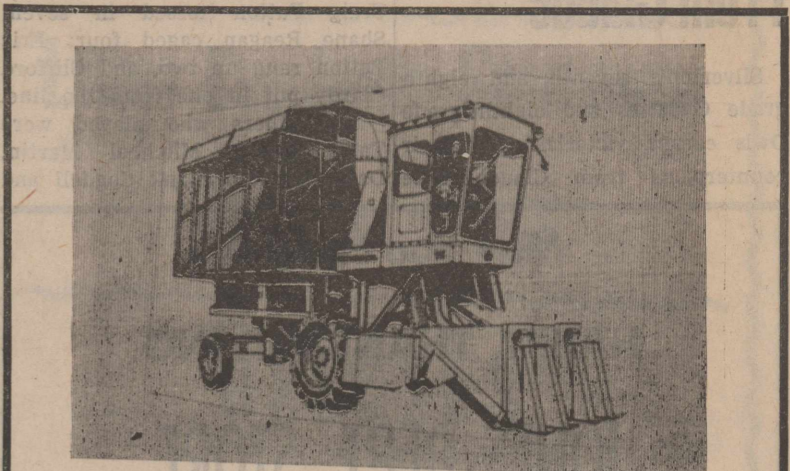
