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be matured for early setting season. When the chicks are removed from the nest or incubator, they should be put in a dry ventilated place. If permitted to run with the hens she should not have more than 15 in unmber. The first feed for baby chicks is a boiled egg mixed with finely crumbled out meal. Some grain such as millet, seed wheat and corn finely cracked is good after about one week old. They should not be feed at all before 36 hours old. When the chicks are about 12 months planks about two inches wide. They should be separated when about three months old and culled at the same time then again at maturity. 
