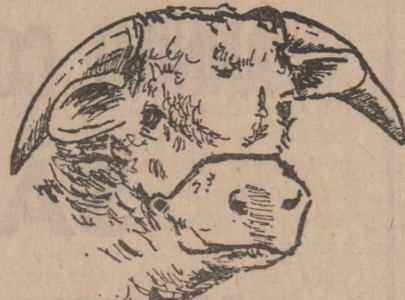

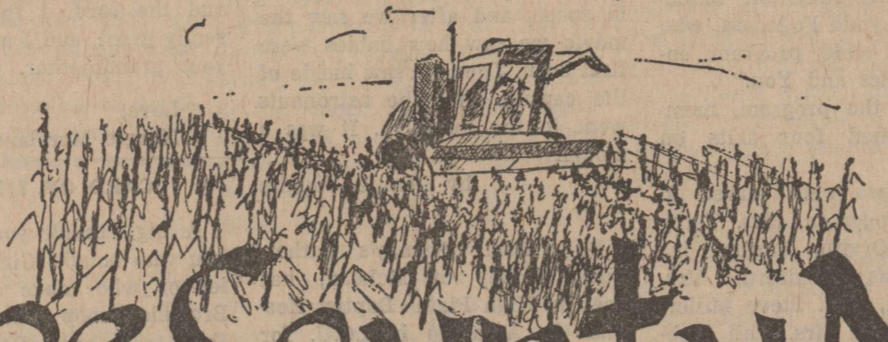

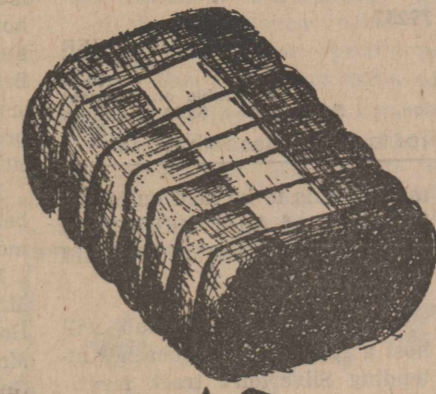
Silvertown: Home of Scenic Lake Mackenzie

Tax Rebates To Cities Up Whopping 36%

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has announced that rebates to Texas cities of the local option one percent sales tax are up a whopping 36% over the same period last year.

Bullock said Texas cities will receive a rebate of some \$25.5 million this month, compared to a net payment of about \$13.7 for February 1978.

The 1979 year-to-date payments for city sales tax rebates have climbed to \$43.7 million, compared to a two-month figure last year of \$32.2 million, an increase of \$11.5 million.

Over 900 Texas cities will receive rebates as their share of the city sales tax, which is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

The check received by the City of Silvertown this month is \$637.91, and this is all the city has received for the year to date. The city had received no rebate for this period last year.

Being rebated to the City of Quitaque this month is \$688.04, which is the city's total for the year to date. Last year for the same two-month period, Quitaque received \$888.16.

The City of Turkey is receiving \$933.00 this month, and this is the total for the year-to-date for that city. Last year Turkey had received no payment for this same period.

Other tax rebates to cities in this area are: Childress, \$7,267.40; Clarendon, \$3,407.88; Claude, \$1,893.06; Estelline, \$0; Floydada, \$5,352.90; Happy, \$651.42; Kress, \$601.55; Lakeview, \$0; Lockney, \$2,336.65; Matador, \$1,083.98; Memphis, \$5,429.55; Nazareth, \$1,138.40; Plainview, \$58,867.13; Tullia, \$9,034.60.

SBA Drought Disaster Deadline Nears

The U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA) today reminded farmers and ranchers who suffered financial hardship due to drought losses on 1978 crops that applications for SBA's Physical Disaster Loan Program must be returned before the March 6, 1979 deadline.

"The Small Business Administration's 1978 drought disaster declaration now includes 125 Texas counties," said Alicia Chacon, SBA Regional Director. "Because producers in counties adjacent to these 125 declared counties are also eligible, our disaster loan program covers almost the entire state."

So far, 5159 Texas producers have been interviewed by SBA concerning 1978 crop losses caused by extreme drought conditions. Loan requests totalling nearly \$42 million have been received.

"These disaster loans may be used to pay outstanding obligations and operating expenses and for production costs in the new crop year," said Chacon. "However, they may not be used to refinance a Farmers Home Administration or other USDA loan."

Interest rates on SBA Physical Disaster Loans are three percent on the first \$250,000 and 6½ percent on remaining amounts. Maximum maturity of the loans is 30 years with terms based on repayment ability. The loans normally repaid in equal installments including principal and interest. A producer may borrow only the amount of his actual losses, and SBA loans cannot duplicate other disaster payments.

"Producers who are able to obtain credit from other sources are still eligible for an SBA disaster loan," Chacon said. "But we suggest that they check first with their local FmHA representative."

The Small Business Administration has ten offices which are serving Texas agricultural producers. Producers who suffered losses to 1978 crops because of drought conditions are encouraged to visit one of these offices and discuss SBA's disaster loan program with a loan officer. Completed applications must be returned to SBA by the March 6, 1979 deadline.

Eclipse Of Sun To Be Observed Feb. 26

Barring overcast skies, on Monday morning, February 26, panhandle residents will be able to observe the last eclipse of the sun in North America this century, according to Arthur Schneider, Director of the Don Harrington Discovery Center, Amarillo, Texas. Although partial for this area, the eclipse will be total in the northwestern section of the United States and central Canada.

The moon's shadow first strikes the earth in the North Pacific, about 1000 miles west of Vancouver, at sunrise. It then swiftly moves eastward, striking land at the mouth of the Columbia River, between Washington and Salem, Oregon near the path of total eclipse. The shadow continues to sweep eastward and then slightly northward, passing over Butte, Missoula, Helena, and Great Falls, Montana. At 10:40 a.m. CST, the shadow moves into Canada near Crosby, North Dakota. From there it is into the wilderness of northern Ontario, Hudson Bay, Baffin Island, and finally northern Greenland.

Astronomically, conditions for viewing the eclipse are similar along the path of totality. The sun will be positioned fairly low

Growers wanting to keep crop diseases and production costs under control need to take a serious

look at crop rotation. Rotation lowers populations of disease organisms affecting a certain crop. These organisms overwinter on crop residue and infect young plants the next growing season. When the host crop is withdrawn in a rotation program, the organisms do not increase and in some cases cannot survive past a certain period. Later, the crop can be grown in that field without disease loss. It may be advisable to bury crop residue before planting the next crop.

Of course, crop rotation will not solve all disease problems that occur. A combination of several approaches is beneficial. These include the constant use of resistant varieties and chemical seed treatments. Actual value received from crop rotation varies with the crop being grown. Estimates indicate it may be worth from \$10 to \$50 per acre depending on disease pressure. Most producers have found that crop rotation gives a boost to their net income. Crop rotation works best for producers who understand exactly what they are accomplishing with the practice. They know which diseases they need to control and how to use rotation to their advantage.

NAKED-EYE OBSERVING HINTS
For safety, one should never look directly at the partially eclipsed sun with the unprotected eye. One method of totally safe viewing is the pinhole projection method.

In a darkened room, facing south, a small hole in a window shade will cast a pinhole image of the solar crescent on the floor or opposite wall. In a similar manner this type of projected solar image can be produced inside a large box with one end having a small nail hole in it. The box acts as a shade allowing the image to be more easily seen inside the box. Remember, in each case the pinhole is utilized for projection and is not used to directly observe the sun.

A variation of the pinhole projection technique is to use a flat mirror and project the solar image on a shaded wall of a nearby house or other structure. In order to see the sun properly, this image should be projected 30 to 50 feet away. Again, do not reflect the light directly into anyone's eyes.

Too much space causes unnecessary steps and wastes energy—so, plan ahead to side-step any excess space. The total distance in the work triangle—stove to refrigerator to sink and back should not exceed 22 feet for the most efficiency.

Like a well-fitted jigsaw puzzle, the pieces must fit properly to insure personal satisfaction and to meet functional requirements. A well-planned kitchen includes centers designed for specific food preparation or cleanup tasks. Besides its appliances, each center needs counter surface and storage space. Effective centers allow work to move continuously in one direction.

Too much space causes unnecessary steps and wastes energy—so, plan ahead to side-step any excess space. The total distance in the work triangle—stove to refrigerator to sink and back should not exceed 22 feet for the most efficiency.

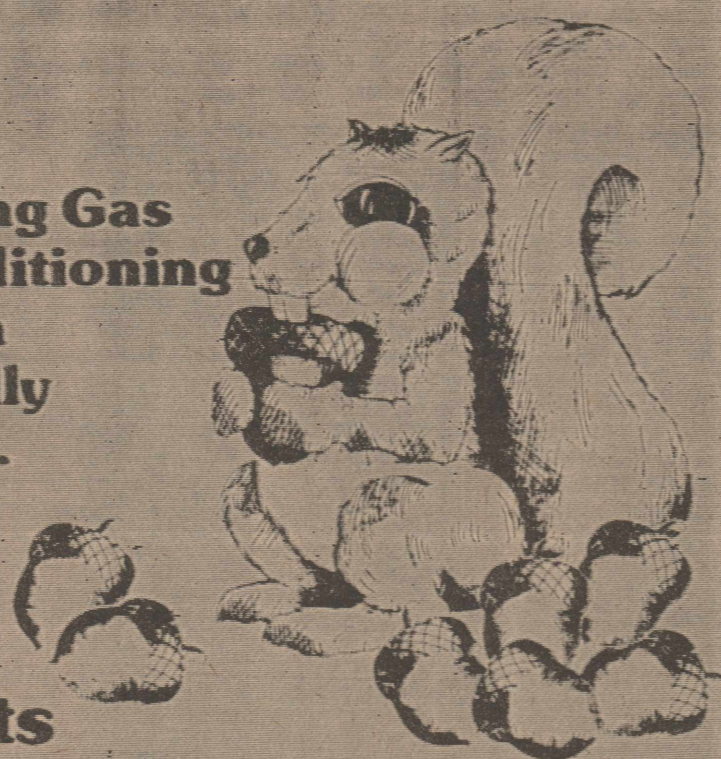

This past year a group of independent researchers who were working on methods of saving pennies on the farm were stunned when they ran across a big dollar saving item that many farms were not taking advantage of. More than 80% of the farms in the midwest have livestock. The stunning part of this is that 32% of these farms had enough livestock (in numbers) to produce a quantity of manure that properly handled to sufficiently fertilize 80% of the land they were farming. The overall savings to the average farm researched could be more than \$1000 per year and have the same soil fertility. 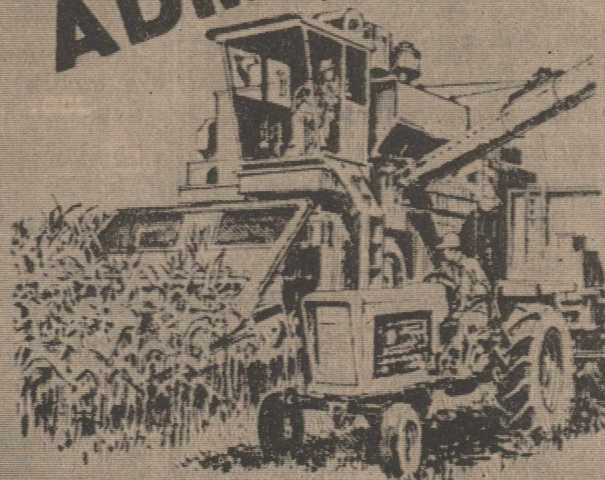
