


## Special Grazing And Hay Program Proposed For 1979 Crop Wheat

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has proposed to allow wheat farmers special grazing and hay privileges on their 1979 crop. Comments on the proposal must be received by March 8, he said.

Under the proposal, farmers would be allowed to graze cattle or cut hay on wheat acreage equal to a maximum of 40 percent of their total intended planting of wheat, feed grain and upland cotton or 50 acres, whichever is larger. Wheat that was grazed or cut for hay would qualify for the same deficiency payment rate as wheat harvested as grain.

The deficiency payment rate for 1978 crop wheat was 52 cents per bushel. The 1979 deficiency payment rate will be computed in December.

The proposal does not provide for an advance payment or minimum payment guarantee this

year as was provided to 1978 special wheat grazing and hay program participants. The deficiency payment rate is the difference between the established target price and the higher of either the national average market price during the first five months of the marketing year or the national loan rate.

For 1979 the target price is \$3.40 per bushel, the national loan rate is \$2.35 per bushel and the first five months of the marketing year are June through November.

Comments on the proposal should be sent to Acting Director, Production Adjustment Division, Room 3630 South, USDA, ASCS P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. The February wheat situation report issued for the Department predicted 1979 wheat production would exceed last year's 1.8 billion bushel harvest.

**PLANNING HOME INSULATION?**

Always compare and buy insulation by R-value.

"R-value" stands for the resistance of heat moving through insulation.

**WHY R-VALUE?**

Heat always moves to cold.

During cold weather, insulation keeps warm air inside the house, and in hot weather insulation keeps warm air outside.

R-value actually measures the number of hours it takes one BTU of heat to travel through a certain thickness of insulation.

So for insulation with an R-11 rating, it takes 11 hours.

The higher the R-value, the longer it takes for heat loss or gain to occur through the insulation.

**COMPARE R-VALUE, NOT INCHES**

It is important to compare and

buy insulation by R-value—not inches.

All products do not have the same R-value per inch.

Different composition and density of materials result in different R-value per inch.

In addition, remember that installing double thickness of insulation does not mean an exact double resistance to heat loss or gain.

However, it does increase resistance to some extent.

Before adding another thickness of insulation—to the ceiling, for example—carefully consider the expense versus the energy savings.

Make sure the addition is really worth the money it will cost.



**NOTICE OF INTENT TO INTRODUCE A BILL IN THE 66th LEGISLATURE, STATE OF TEXAS**

NOTICE is hereby given that the undersigned intends to request introduction of a bill in the Sixty-sixth Legislature of the State of Texas, the general purpose, nature, and substance of which is as follows:

The entries will be judged on construction as it affects the overall appearance, compatibility of fabric and design, quality of work, creativity, overall appearance, accessories, becomingness, fit, poise, and representation of current fashion trends.

A panel of judges will determine first, second and third place winners in each of the three divisions.
