Services Held For Former Co. Judge

Funeral services for former Briscoe County Judge, O. R. Tipps, 79, 4113 Emerson, a Wichita Falls attorney and rancher who died Sunday at his home, were conducted at 11:00 a.m. Wednesday at Hampton-Vaughan Funeral Home.

Dr. James Palmer, pastor of Floral Heights United Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, officiated. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery.

Tipps was born March 18, 1900 in Denton County, Texas, and was graduated from North Texas State Teachers' College. He was elected Briscoe County Judge in 1927 and moved to Wichita Falls in 1933.

Tipps was a veteran of World War I and served on the Wichita County ration board during World War II.

He retired from the law firm of Tipps, Sanders, Masters and Watson in 1956 to enter oil and ranching businesses. He owned and operated ranches in Dickens, Montague and Roberts counties.

Tipps was a member of Wichita Falls Masonic Lodge, Wichita County and American Bar Associations, Lions Club and Floral Heights Methodist Church. He married Ruth Owen in 1925 in Quitaque.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Mary Sue Mathys of Houston and Mrs. Martha McCarthy of Agoura, California; four sisters, Mrs. Ruby Hamilton of Tyler, Mrs. Hazel Hamilton of Pierre, South Dakota, and Mrs. Kate Graham and Mrs. Allie Mae Weatherwax, both of Amarillo; four brothers, Arthur of Wichita Falls, former 30th District Judge, Kelly C. of Watsonville, California, Robert N. of Denver City and Thomas O. of Arvada, Colorado; and five grandchildren.

Mr. Wesley died about 5:00 p.m. Wednesday at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo following a brief illness.

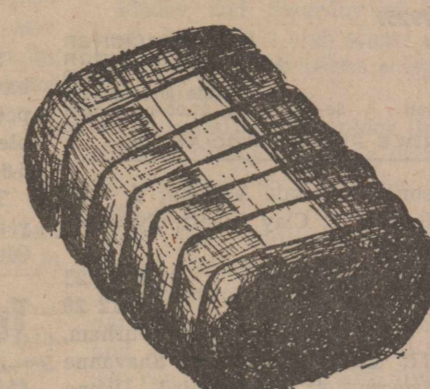
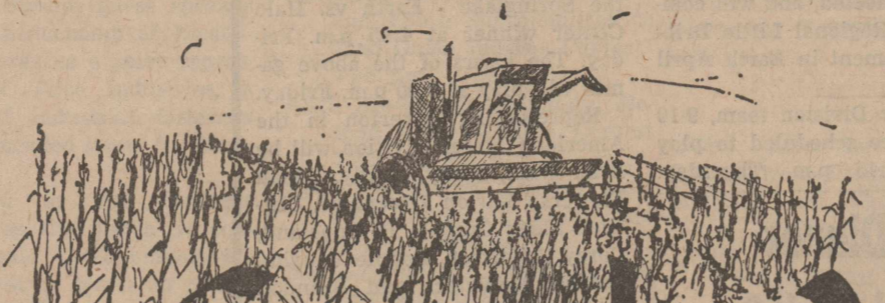
He was the owner and operator of Lonnie's Muffler and Brake Service in Tullia.

Missionary To Kenya To Speak Here

The Rev. Jimmy L. Beggs, an Assemblies of God missionary to Kenya, will be the guest speaker Thursday, March 29, at 7:30 p.m. at the Assembly of God Church in Silverton, the Rev. Lemy L. Pike, pastor, has announced.

During their last term of missionary service, Rev. Beggs and his wife, Mary, were active in Bible school teaching and in the Theological Education by Extension (TEE) program. TEE provides training by mail for pastors and Christian workers. Rev. Beggs also served as the general superintendent of the Assemblies of God in Kenya. Mrs. Beggs was the national director of the women's auxiliary groups.

Before their ministry in Kenya, the Beggses ministered for seven years in evangelism and teaching in Tanzania.

About their work in Kenya, Rev. Beggs says, "Kenya is the calm eye of the hurricane of war and trouble that is sweeping Africa. God is allowing Kenya's churches to experience growth. Their stability and maturity will be a basis for African missionary activities in the future."

Prior to their missionary ministry, Rev. and Mrs. Beggs pastored in Morton, Texas. To prepare for their ministerial careers the Beggses attended Southwestern Assemblies of God College in Waxahachie. Rev. Beggs earned a B.A. degree.

During this special missions rally, Rev. and Mrs. Beggs will

be emphasizing the importance of prayer support for missionaries from Christians and church groups in America. They will also present the need for missionary recruits.

Fishing Improving at Lake Mackenzie

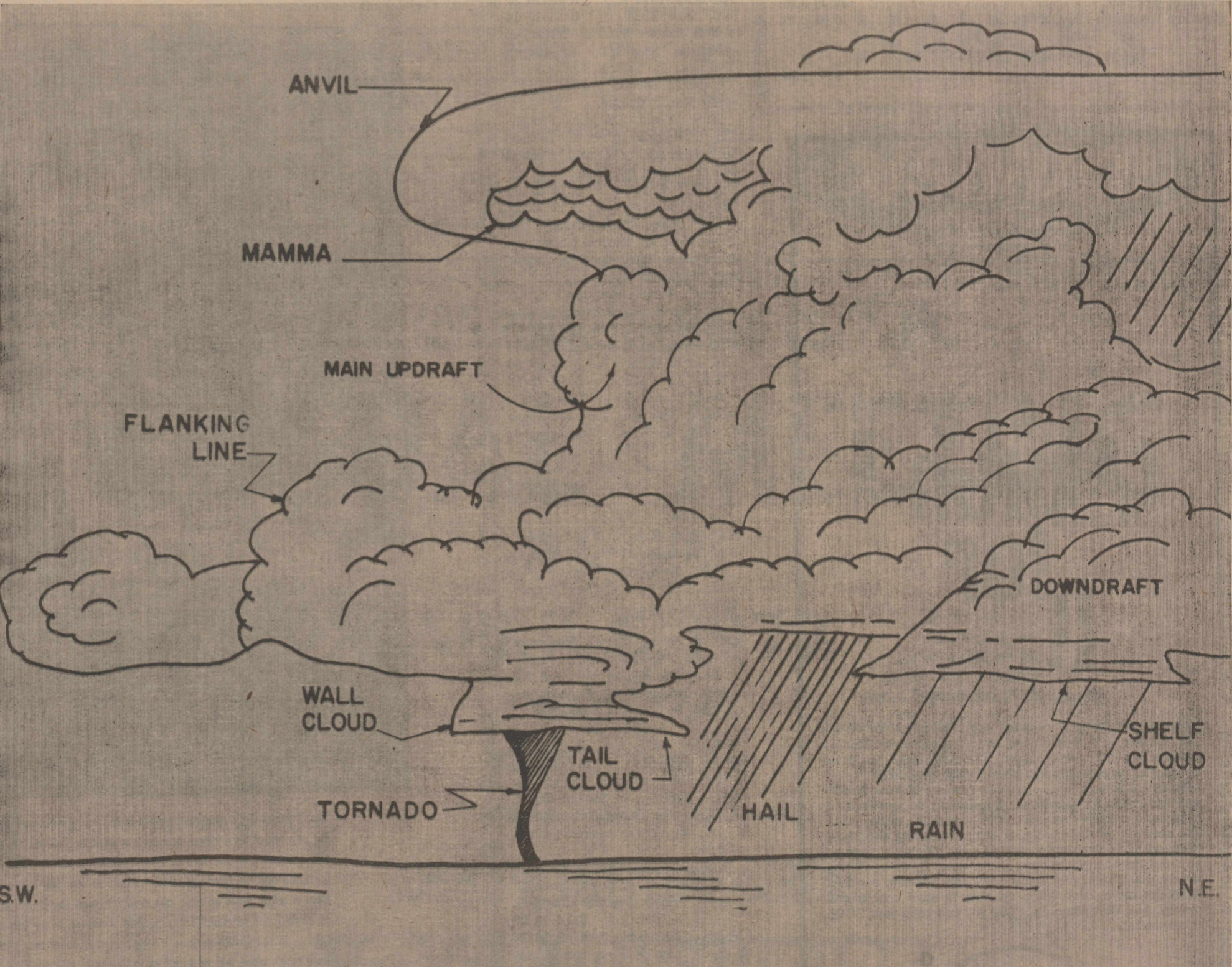
RAYMOND L. HUNT DIES IN CALIFORNIA

TYPICAL TORNADO-PRODUCING CLOUD—The form of the usual tornado-producing cloud is anvil-shaped at its crest with a rougher overshooting top at the

dome. Mamma, which appear to be balloon-shaped formations, may drop from the anvil shape. At ground-level the common appearance is rain falling from a

shelf cloud, usually in the northeastern portion of the parent cloud. Southwest of this there will be a wall cloud, sometimes with a horizontal tail cloud at

the forward or northeast lower portion of it. This tail cloud is not the tornado. The tornado itself forms typically at the southwest lower edge of this wall

cloud. Behind the tornado there is not likely to be rain, but, instead, a precipitation-free cloud base. (Drawing courtesy Texas Tech University Institute For Disaster Research)

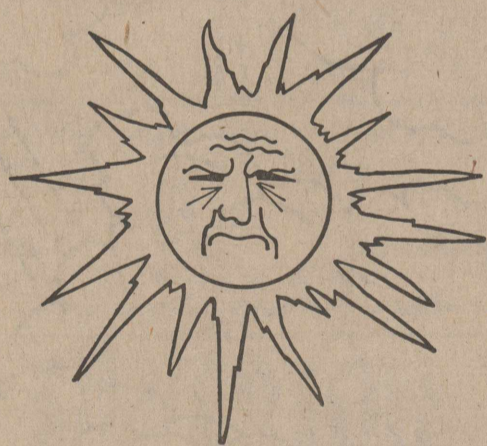

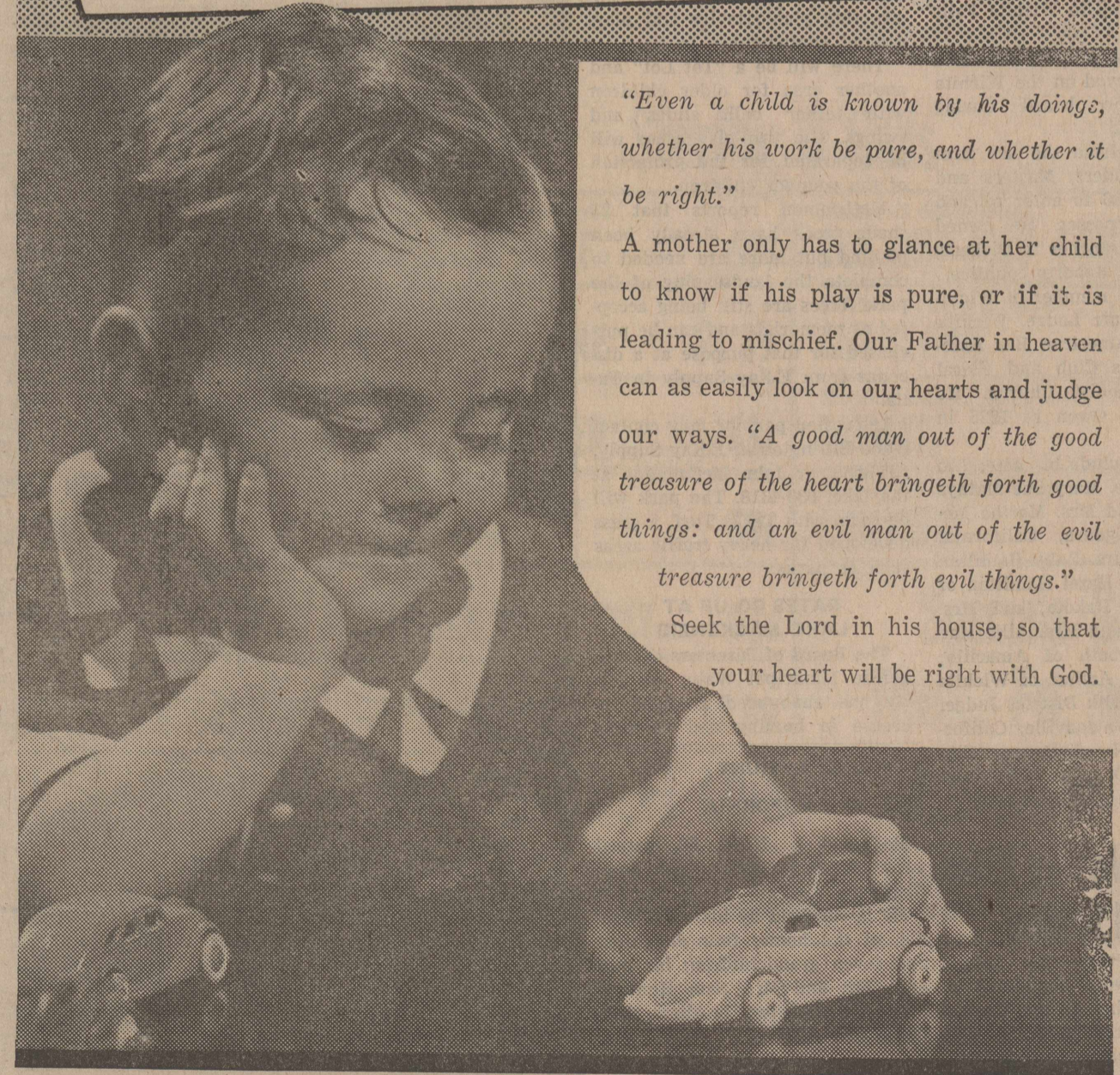

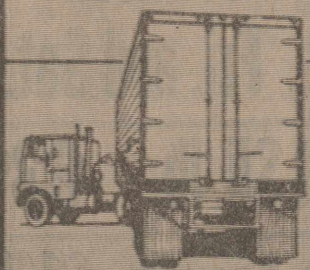
