Another son, Mike Brannon, who lives with his wife and baby in Wichita Falls, had their home completely demolished. The family had gone to the Dairy Queen, and returned to find their home had been destroyed. Brannon is a cousin of Seymour and Fred Brannon and of Opal Hill.

Pete and Dorothy Hale were still trying at presstime to receive word from his mother who resides at a nursing home in Wichita Falls which is located about 1 1/2 miles from a K-Mart store which was hit.

Mabel Tomlin, reportedly, has received word from some relatives in the areas hit but not from others.

Perry Thomas has been in touch with a HAM radio operator in Wichita Falls. His daughter, Becky Woods, was one of three registered nurses at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo who was selected to be airlifted to Wichita Falls, if needed, to help in the emergency.

The Thomases will do all they can to help residents get information about their relatives in the tornado areas, but they need for you to bring them the following information written on paper:

The full name of the person you are trying to locate.

His or her complete street address and city.

His or her telephone number and an alternate telephone number, if possible.

They are happy to assist you in any way they can, and writing this information will help simplify the job for them.

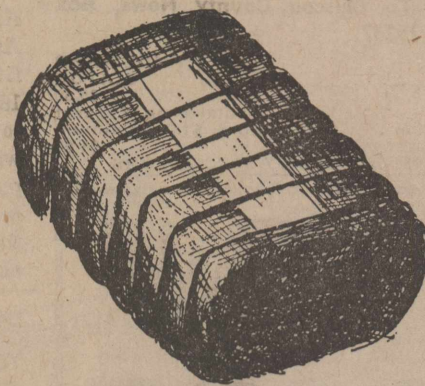
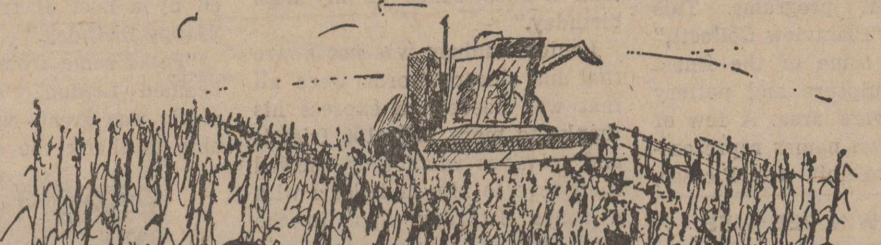

## Voting Light In City Election

There was a light turnout of voters for the officers' election in the City of Silvertown Saturday.

Incumbent councilman A. R. Martin polled 98 votes and Riley Harris was elected to a place on the council with 86 votes. Four write-in votes were cast for Fred Strange and one for Charlie Parker for councilman.

## "Fiber Optics" Discussed At Phone Cooperative's Meeting In Tulia

Someday, in the not too distant future, members of Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. were told at their annual meeting in Tulia April 6, telephone conversations will be carried on a beam of light guided over a slender thread of glass. "Fiber Optics," as this process is known in the telephone industry, has long since passed the drawing board and field trial stages. It is now being installed in large, high volume areas, primarily in large cities.

Somewhere in between the conventional copper wire cables now in use and the exotic fiber optics is co-axial cable. This is the cable used extensively by the cable television industry, but is becoming attractive as a means of providing broad band communications services in the telecommunications business.

In a look over the shoulder, members were told that the Cooperative which began in the early 1950's with hardly a promise of a future was now a mature, sound organization. The old, unreliable, wire lines have given way to new buried cables, and the 10 party rural lines are now history. No more party line service is offered by the Cooperative.

Gross revenues have risen

from \$53,000.00 in 1954 to over \$1 million in 1978. Calling rates by members has increased over 600%. In 1954, there were 3.9 toll calls per telephone per month and in 1978 there were 26.5.

As a result of the growth in business volumes and the additional equipment needed to handle the growth, the number of employees has grown from nine in 1954 to 20 in 1979. The headquarters building, built in 1961 to accommodate five employees, now is called on to provide space for ten employees. To relieve the squeeze the Cooperative has developed plans to build a new headquarters building in the near future.

In other business, members elected three directors for three year terms. They are Bruce Fields from the Arney Community, Victor Harman from Kaffir Switch, and J. L. Whitmore from southeast of Tulia.

Members at the meeting were entertained by a fine group of string musicians from the Silvertown area. Billed as "The Country Sounds," the group is made up of musicians John Francis, Clifton and Joy Stodghill, Jimmy Burson, Jack Sutton and Bennie Brown.

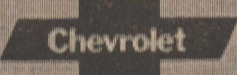

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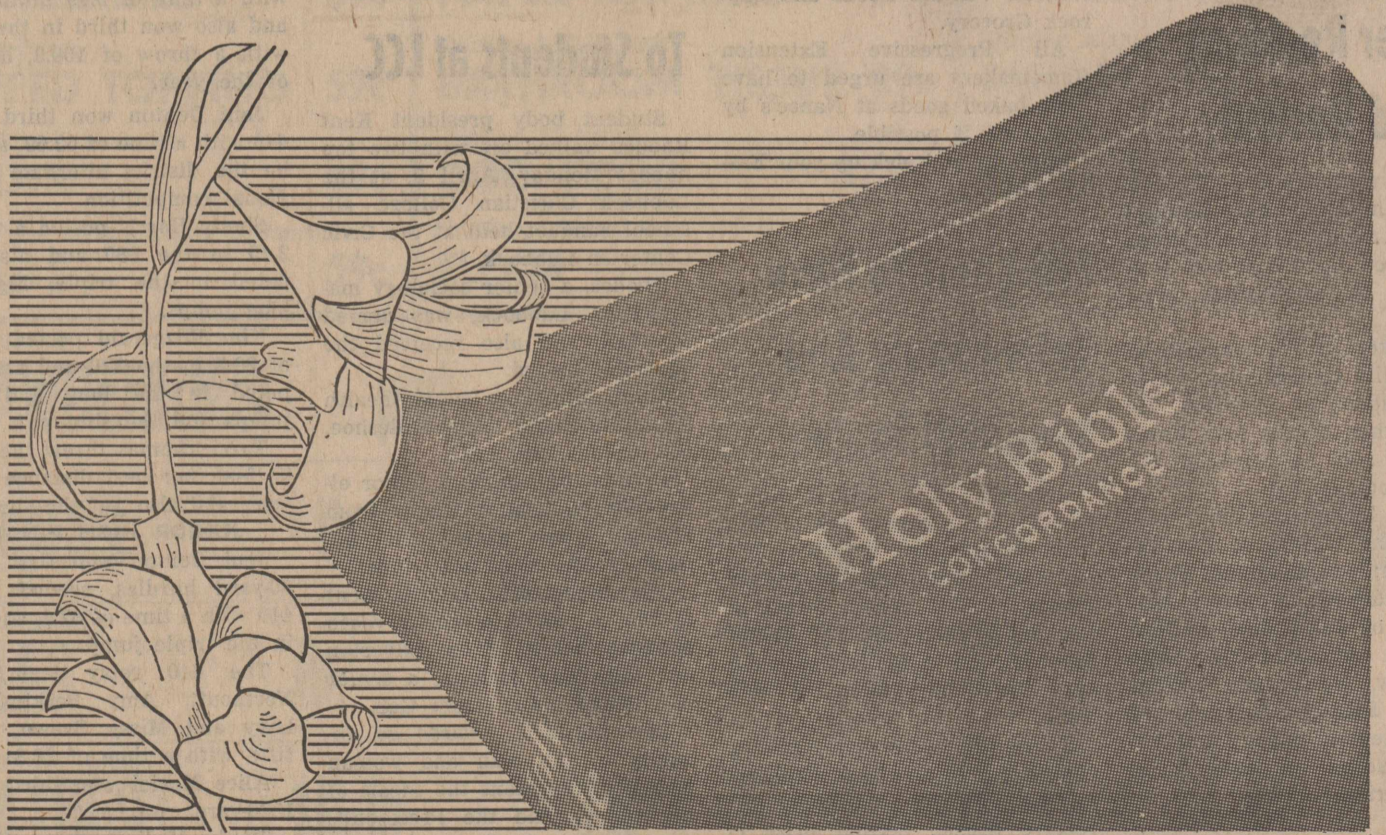
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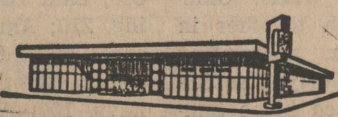

"He is not here: for he is risen, as he said."

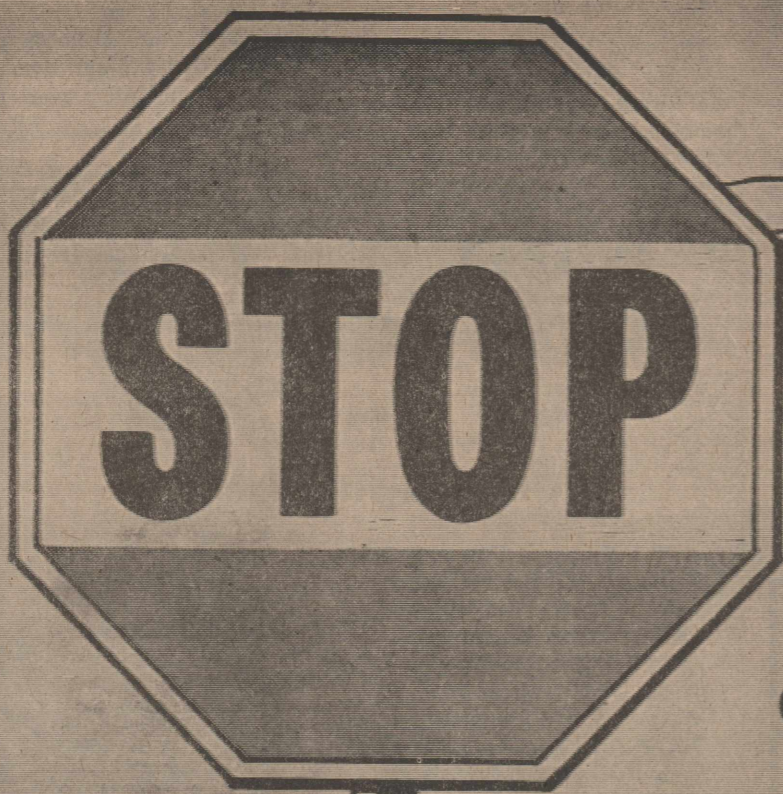

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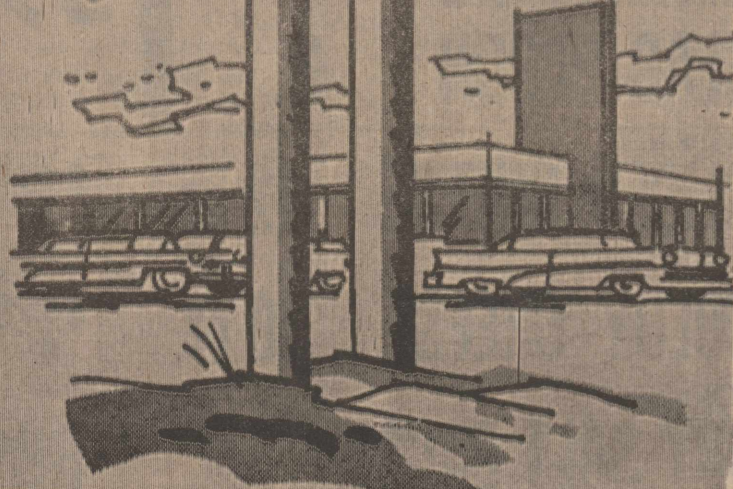
