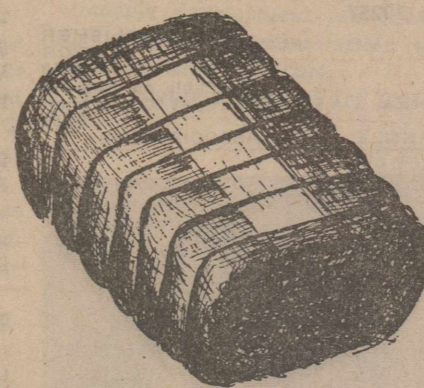
IMMUNIZATION CLINIC TO BE HELD MAY 11

Firemen Receive Storm Spotting Training

Larry Ebeling of the National Weather Service in Lubbock was guest speaker for a called meeting of the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department Tuesday night in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank. Guests from Quitaque, Memphis, Tulia and Silverton also attended the meeting.

Ebeling showed slides in the Storm Spotting Training Series and discussed the various cloud formations, pointing out the dangerous ones. He also showed a

film in which the movement of the clouds was accelerated to show rotation and direction.

He pointed out that lightning kills more people than tornadoes, hail, wind, or any other weather element. Flash flooding is a real problem, and because it usually accompanies severe weather it is sometimes overlooked. Spotters report the tornadic activity but usually don't report flooding. The Weather Service needs to know about heavy rains,

Ebeling said, and added that flash flooding is probably going to increase due to there being more concrete, asphalt, buildings, etc. all the time.

Large hail is not usually a killer, Ebeling said, but it often accompanies a tornado. Damaging hail, pea size and larger, should be reported to the National Weather Service.

Over half of the people who died in Vernon, he said, died in vehicles. If you are caught in a vehicle, you may escape a tornado by driving at right angles to the storm, but this isn't really very safe because tornadoes can "stop on a dime" and can quickly change directions. And most of our roads and highways run north and south or east and west. Get out of your vehicle and into any low place you can find, a ditch, ravine, culvert. Don't lie flat, but roll yourself into a ball as low to the ground as possible.

To protect yourself if you are at home, it is best to move to a tornado shelter, the southwest corner of a basement under a work bench or other heavy furniture, or get into a central closet or bathroom which is likely to be left standing. Researchers say

not to bother with opening or closing windows, but to concentrate on getting yourself to a safe place.

If you take shelter in a closet, get heavy items off shelves, then get on the floor, roll yourself into a ball and pull something over your head to protect it from falling objects.

To increase your chances, reinforce closet or bathroom ceiling with 2x4's, replace hollow-core doors with solid wood ones. You are fairly safe if you lie in a bathtub and pull a mattress over yourself. The main thing is to protect yourself, especially your head, from flying glass and falling objects.

In public buildings, avoid wide expanses of roof and windows. Get on the lowest floor of the building, in an interior hallway, or somewhere away from windows, maybe in a central area closet or bathroom.

Plan in advance where your family will go for shelter. Ebeling said the National Weather Service in Lubbock may be contacted by telephoning 762-4647 to report severe weather, large hail, flooding or other elements you have observed.

Highway Rehabilitation Work To Be Done In Briscoe County

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved a \$238 million program of highway rehabilitation and improvement in every part of the state.

The program includes rehabilitation work, safety improvements and general betterment of U.S. and State Highways and Farm-to-

Market Roads.

A total of 845 projects in 203 counties are involved with more than 72 percent of the work scheduled for U. S. and State numbered highways.

Altogether, the program will result in improvements on 5,253.5 miles of the 71,000-mile state maintained highway network.

District Engineer Lewis H. White of Childress said projects included in the program in this area are Seal Coat surfacing on S.H. 86 from S.H. 207 in Silverton to top of Caprock, 10.8 miles, at an estimated cost of \$187,000 and Seal Coat surfacing on S.H. 256 from S.H. 86 to top of Caprock, 7.5 miles, at an estimated cost of \$71,500.

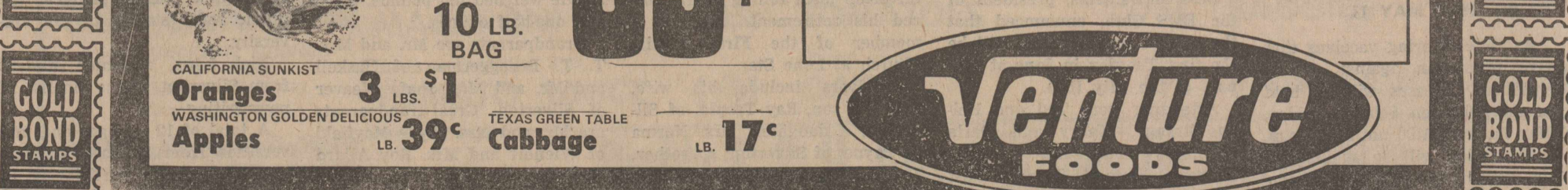

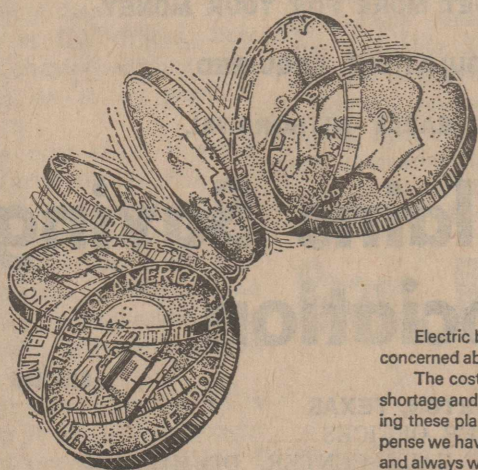

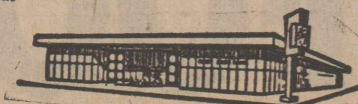
