Yung To Be Speaker At Sports Banquet

Bill Yung, Head Coach of the West Texas State University Buffalo football team, will be the guest speaker at the annual Silverton High School Sports Banquet to be held at 8:00 p.m. Saturday, May 19, in the school cafeteria.

Tickets are 3:00 each, and can be purchased from any member of the Booster Club.

Various awards will be presented to the outstanding boys and girls in high school athletics. Bill Yung proved in 1977 with a Missouri Valley Conference crown that he wants the West Texas State Buffaloes to be winners. His ideas for the 1979 season aren't any different.

It would be a safe bet that no one has had more impact in the sports community in the Texas Panhandle than the impression Bill Yung has made in two years. Anyone that hears him speak comes away convinced that he is the right man for WTSU.

And a lot of people have heard him speak. Since being named the university's 18th head football coach in January of 1977, Yung has spoken to hundreds of civic groups in the area.

Probably Yung's most noticeable trait is his infectious enthusiasm. After dropping their first four games in 1977, the Buffs finished the distance undefeated, winning the Conference championship in the process. It was the most remarkable comeback story in the history of West Texas State.

A chance at a college head job has been high on Yung's list of priorities since he joined Grant Teaff's staff at Baylor in 1972. The first two years on the Brazos he was the Bears' offensive line coach and added the responsibilities of offensive coordinator in 1974, in time for the Bears' first Southwest Conference championship and Cotton Bowl appearance.

At Baylor, Yung developed All-American center Aubrey Schulz in 1974 and was termed "the best line coach in the business" by Teaff, the national coach of the year that same season.

Yung, a native of Ranger in West Texas, was an all-district tackle for coach O. C. Warden. Yung was a member of TCU's Cotton Bowl team that dropped a 14-13 decision to Mississippi in 1956. He was a three-year letterman (1953-55) at TCU under coaches Dutch Meyer and Abe Martin.

He started his coaching career as an associate freshman coach at TCU in 1956 and was a player-coach in the service at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

In 1964-67, Yung was line coach at Garland under former TCU teammate Chuck Curtis. Under Curtis, the Owls won one state Class AAAA championship with stars such as Chuck Dieus, later the quarterback at Texas, and Gary Bartel, who is now a member of Yung's WTSU staff, as two of his top players.

Then it was on to Baylor for five successful seasons.

Yung blends his coaching abilities with a strong Christian faith. Very active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, he

Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c for students not participating in the program.

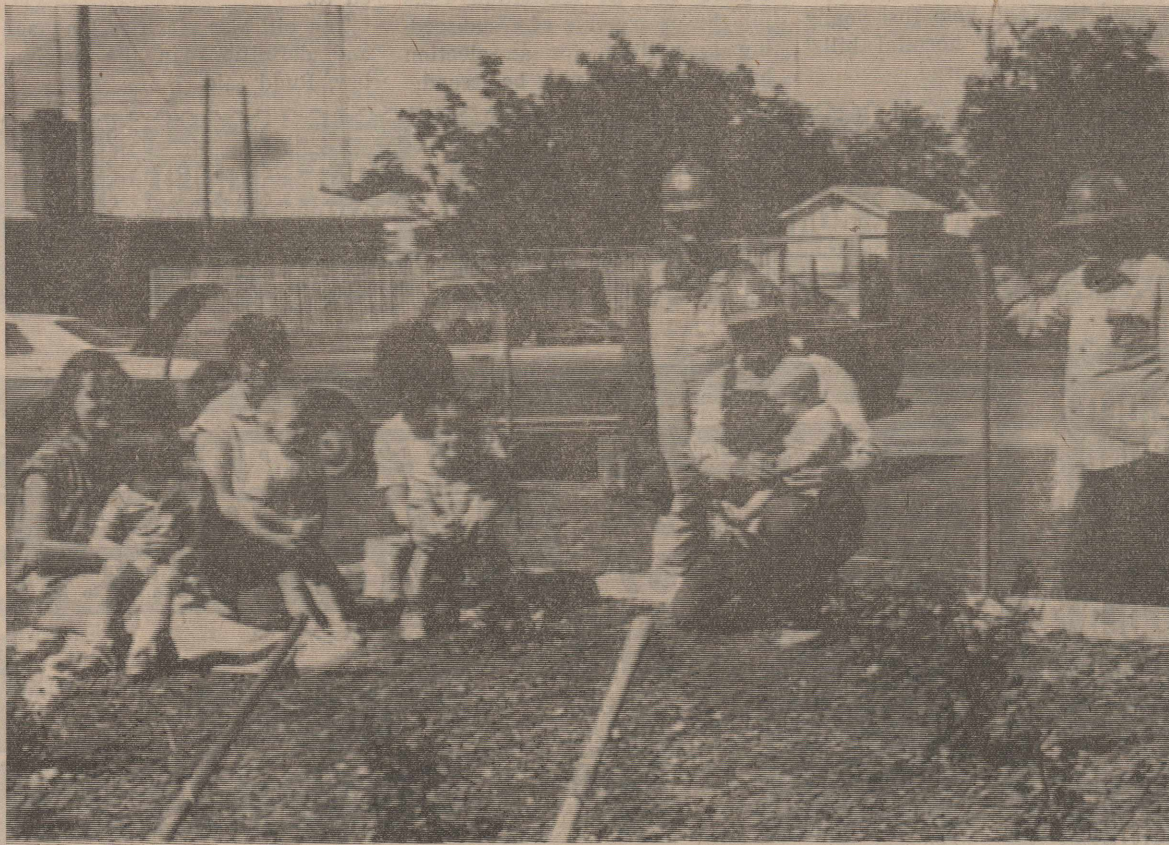

The regulatory bill and the amendments to it passed in Rudd's current legislation, is another development in a continuing controversy over cloud-seeding in an area west and north-east of Lubbock.

For these women, the chances are greater that they have high blood pressure—a dangerous disease because it can lead to heart failure, stroke, or kidney damage.

People with high blood pressure can control it.

They may need to take medication every day, perhaps for the rest of their lives—or they may need to lose weight, eat less salt and get more exercise.

First, find out if you have high blood pressure. Then follow the doctor's advice on controlling it. By controlling it, people can avoid some of its complications.

ORAL CONTRACEPTIVES

Women who take oral contraceptives should have blood pressure checks regularly because the pill can cause high blood pressure in some women.

That is more likely to happen if the woman has a tendency toward high blood pressure to begin with—such as having a family history of high blood pressure or having a mild kidney disease.

PREGNANT WOMEN

Pregnant women can develop high blood pressure rapidly toward the end of pregnancy, so it is important to keep a close watch on blood pressure during prenatal care.

Women who already had high blood pressure before pregnancy may find their condition more serious with pregnancy.

AFTER MENOPAUSE

As a woman grows older, her chances for high blood pressure are greater than a man's, so chances of having it after menopause increase.

BLACK WOMEN

Although medical science still does not know the reason, studies show that black women, even young women, are more susceptible to high blood pressure than white women.

Reports estimate that one of every four black Americans over the age of 18 has high blood
