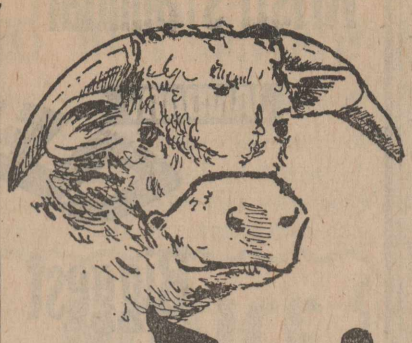
Mrs. Wells has visited here and at Earth with her sister and brother-in-law during the holidays.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Strange are moving to Dumas, where they will be at home at 219 Bailey.

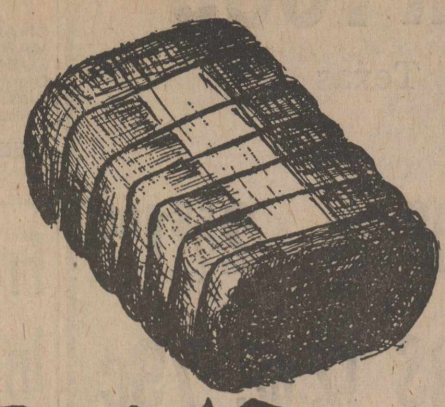
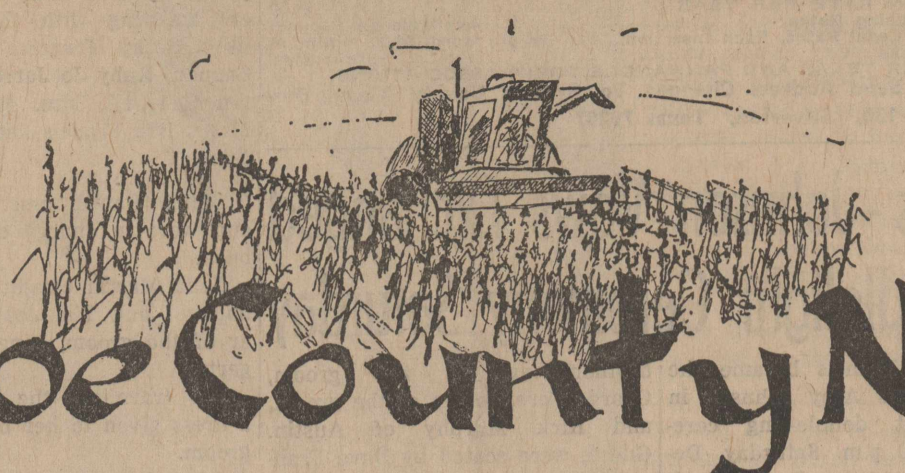

**CROP RESIDUE IS HELPFUL TOOL IN REDUCING EROSION**  
 During a time when increasingly more cotton is being planted in Briscoe County, thought should be given to the importance of crop residue uses. Crop residues are one of the most helpful tools in reducing or controlling wind and water erosion. They also increase infiltration and water holding capabilities of soil and reduce evaporation.

Generally speaking, about 750 pounds of drilled residue and 1000 pounds of row residue per acre should be left on the soil surface of clay soils until the land is prepared for the next crop. Moderately coarse textured soils such as fine sandy loams need 1250 pounds and 1750 pounds respectively. Coarse textured soils such as loamy fine sands and fine sands require about 1750 pounds and 2500 pounds of residue per acre on the surface to be adequately protected. If residues can be left on the soil surface after planting, it will provide added protection against erosion and for the newly emerging crop.

Wheat and other small stemmed plants provide the most protection per pound of residue because they cover the ground most uniformly. Sorghum and corn provide the next best protection with soybeans, sunflowers and cotton providing the least amount of protection.

With the cost of fuel and equipment for emergency tillage increasing, crop residue use should be carefully considered when planning cropping systems. Also as irrigation water decreases, residues that will increase infiltration and water holding and reduce evaporation will become more valuable to the farmer.
