





The judging of protein for potency and quality for human consumption has been one of controversy among nutritionists these past few years. 

Dr. Bruce Taylor, an animal nutritionist, says one of the most important aspects of judging protein is an evaluation of the amount of protein actually used by the body compare to the intake. Using a scale of 100 for egg protein, Dr. Taylor says beef would rate at 80 while corn would rate at 56.

With this in mind, feed grain could just as easily be used to feed out a steer for human consumption and from the steer gain the same amount of protein from the meat in usable protein as he would get from the same amount of grain it takes to feed a steer.
