Fire Damages The Wayne Stephens Home

Fire which broke out in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Stephens south of Silverton shortly before midnight Tuesday damaged the basement of the home before it was brought under control. The rest of the home sustained smoke damage.

Cause of the fire was not immediately known, but one fireman said the family was alerted by a smoke detector, and young Stephen Stephens called the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department.

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Stephens were away from home at the time of the fire, and his parents, the Elbert Stephens, were staying with their grandchildren. Larry Stephens and Brent Grabbe had been involved in a pickup rollover while hunting about 10:00 p.m. that same night, and after receiving first aid at the office of Dr. James Chua Tuan in Silverton, the Stephens youth was transferred by Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview. He suffered a dislocated shoulder and fracture in the accident, and was hospitalized for treatment.

About 6:00 a.m. Wednesday, firemen were called to Harris Gin where a fire had erupted on top of the bur catcher.

Twila Baldwin led the rebounding.

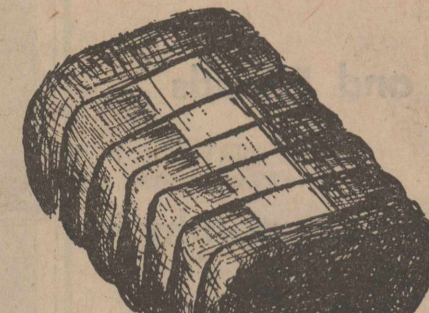
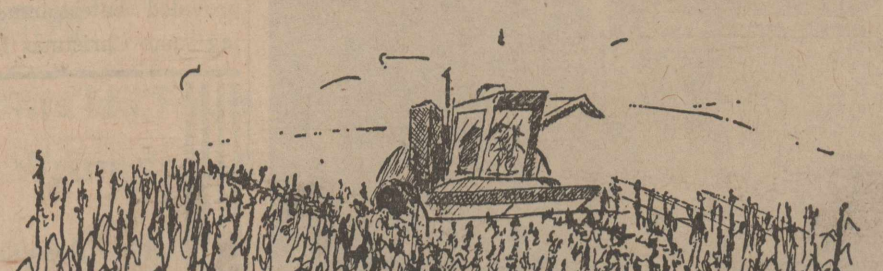

Solid Waste Problems Discussed At Meeting Monday Night

Representatives of Briscoe County, the City of Quitaque and the City of Silverton met Monday night at the City Hall in Silverton with Texas Department of Health representatives, L. B. Griffith of Austin and Ron Freeman of Canyon, to discuss solid waste problems.

Briscoe County was represented

by Judge Fred Mercer and Commissioners Jack Chandler, Bryant Eddleman and Glen Lindsey. The City of Quitaque representatives were Mayor Jake Merrell, Councilman O. R. Stark, jr., and City Secretary James Brunson.

City of Silverton officers attending were Mayor Charles Sarchet, Councilmen Fred Edwards,

A. R. Martin, Donnie Martin, David Tipton and City Secretary Jerry Patton.

Patton welcomed the guests and informed the group that Mr. Griffith and Mr. Freeman had been taken for an inspection of the Silverton dumpground and had viewed four suggested sites for the location of a sanitary landfill.

Freeman pointed out to the group that due to State and Federal regulations, the existing dumpground is in violation of laws regarding open burning of solid waste, the inability to compact and cover monthly, the inability to control rodents and water drainage, access and dumping of unauthorized materials and not having an attendant on duty. Freeman went on to say that the present site would never be able to pass as a Type III landfill and the City should be looking into the operation of a county-wide project to serve the two cities.

Freeman outlined a Type III landfill as a two to five acre tract of land, fenced as needed to control livestock, windblown materials and unauthorized dumping, a

pit approximately 15 feet deep and of a length sufficient to furnish adequate space. All waste should be burned before hauling to the landfill, which should be locked at all times with a set day and time for the public to dispose of waste not hauled by the city. The site would have to be 300 yards from any public road and have an adequate drainage system to control runoff water. The soil at the site would have to meet percolation requirements and the State would help conduct the percolation study.

Griffith stated that the continued of the existing site for a long period of time was out of the question, and to continue using the site for a short period of time

would involve some improvements at the site. One of the important steps would be to get permits from the State Water Quality Board and Texas Air Control Board. The City would also have to stop permitting old tires to be dumped at the site. Griffith also stated that due to the Federal regulations, all dumpgrounds, such as Silverton is now using, will have to be discontinued in the next five years.

After a question and answer session, the group agreed that a cooperative effort should be made to acquire a countywide landfill site. Jerry Patton was instructed to begin looking for such a site and to work up a cost study for the completed project.

USDA Issues Final Rules For School Lunch Food Service Contracts

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has issued new regulations which will help schools that contract for food services hold down costs and maintain food quality.

A growing number of schools that participate in the national school lunch program receive food and services under contract from food service management

companies. The regulations announced today are intended to protect such schools by setting new controls over the terms and performance of contracts.

In addition, the rules require such contracts, as well as all local food service procurement, to comply with federal standards now in effect for state agencies. Because local school boards expressed a strong desire to continue to write and approve their own contracts, the regulations are in the form of minimum standards which they are to meet.

Under the new rules, bids are to be based on a 21-day menu cycle. Payment will be made only for food that meets specifications listed in the contract. Other contract provisions will spell out record keeping and health certification requirements.

The new rules also limit the duration of food service contracts to one year. Because of concern expressed after the regulations were proposed in January, the final version permits two yearly renewals and cancellation upon notice by either party.

States are responsible for assuring that local contracts comply with the new regulations and for providing assistance on request to local schools.

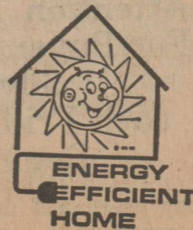

 The judging of protein for potency and quality for human consumption has been one of controversy among nutritionists these past few years. The cattle producer and his allies have claimed for many years that animal protein has many advantages over plant protein and have impressive to support this argument. Dr. Bruce Taylor, an animal nutritionist, says one of the most important aspects of judging protein is an evaluation of the amount of protein actually used by the body compare to the intake. Using a scale of 100 for egg protein, Dr. Taylor says beef would rate at 80 while corn would rate at 56.
