Mr. Hall died at 10:30 a.m. Saturday at the Tulia Care Center following a lengthy illness.

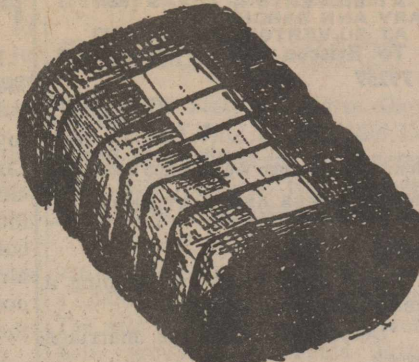
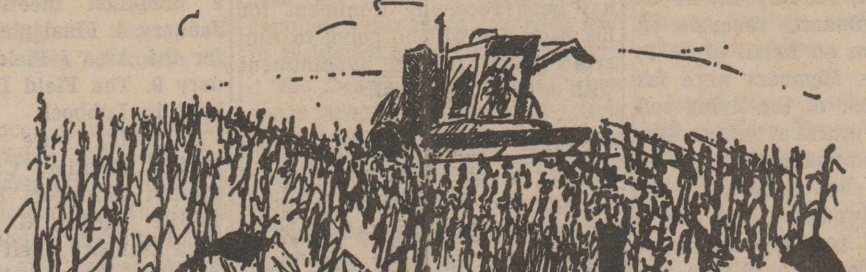
The Missouri native married Olive Fisher December 29, 1921 in Springfield, Missouri. She died July 13, 1963.
