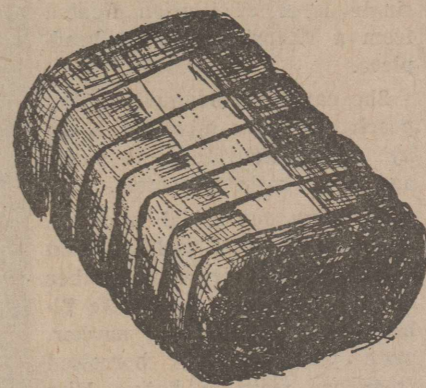
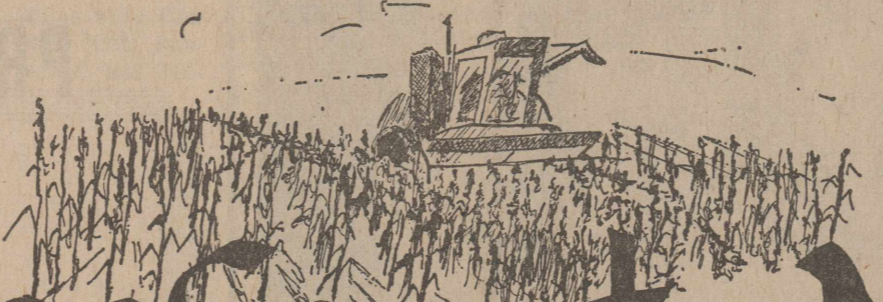
They are Kristy Fogerson, junior division, and Cynthia Edwards, senior division.

## Winners Named In 4-H Horse Show

Dana Boyer of Lamesa captured top individual honors during the annual District 2 4-H Horse Show which concluded Wednesday, June 27 in Lubbock. Kathleen O'Shea of Lubbock took second high individual honors. The two top competitors were among the 20 4-H'ers who qualified to represent the district in the State 4-H Horse Show July 25-27 in Odessa.

A total of 176 contestants from 20 South Plains counties which make up District 2 of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service competed in the two-day show at the Panhandle-South Plains Fairgrounds.

High point counties were Castro, with 51 points, first; Lubbock, 50 points, second, and Bailey, 39½ points, third.

Carol Bagwell of Castro County showed the grand champion mare, Two-eyed Pet. Reserve champion mare was Speckasalt, shown by Jerri Ka Clark, also of Castro County.

Grand champion gelding was Possum's Rusty, exhibited by Shea Floyd of Gaines County. Ronee Thornton of Floyd County had the reserve champion gelding, Afton Socks.

Other top honors went to Zane Reagan of Briscoe County, who had the top registered mare under five years old; Kim Farmer of Bailey County, first place grade mare; Kim Howell of Castro County, top registered gelding under five years old, and Jim Waller of Floyd County, first place grade gelding.

Carol Bagwell took top honors in showmanship; Perry Smith of Borden County won first in breakaway roping; Jym Rinehart of Borden County placed first in judged roping; Blaine Todd of Dawson County took first in team roping, and Kathleen O'Shea of Lubbock was first in hunter under saddle.

In performance classes, first place awards went to Todd Wilson, Lubbock, western pleasure; Dana Boyer, Dawson, western horsemanship; Brad Bradley, Swisher, reining; Lee Ann McMurtry, Briscoe, pole bending, and Jimmy Whitehead, Cochran, barrel racing.

Debbie Dennis of Castro County received a trophy for being selected by the other contestants as the most congenial entry in the show.

The contest was broken down into eight halter and five performance classes, plus showmanship, hunter under saddle and roping. Winners of showmanship, the five performance classes and those showing the four top halter horses go to the state contest. The other 10 district entries at the state event were selected on total points accumulated.

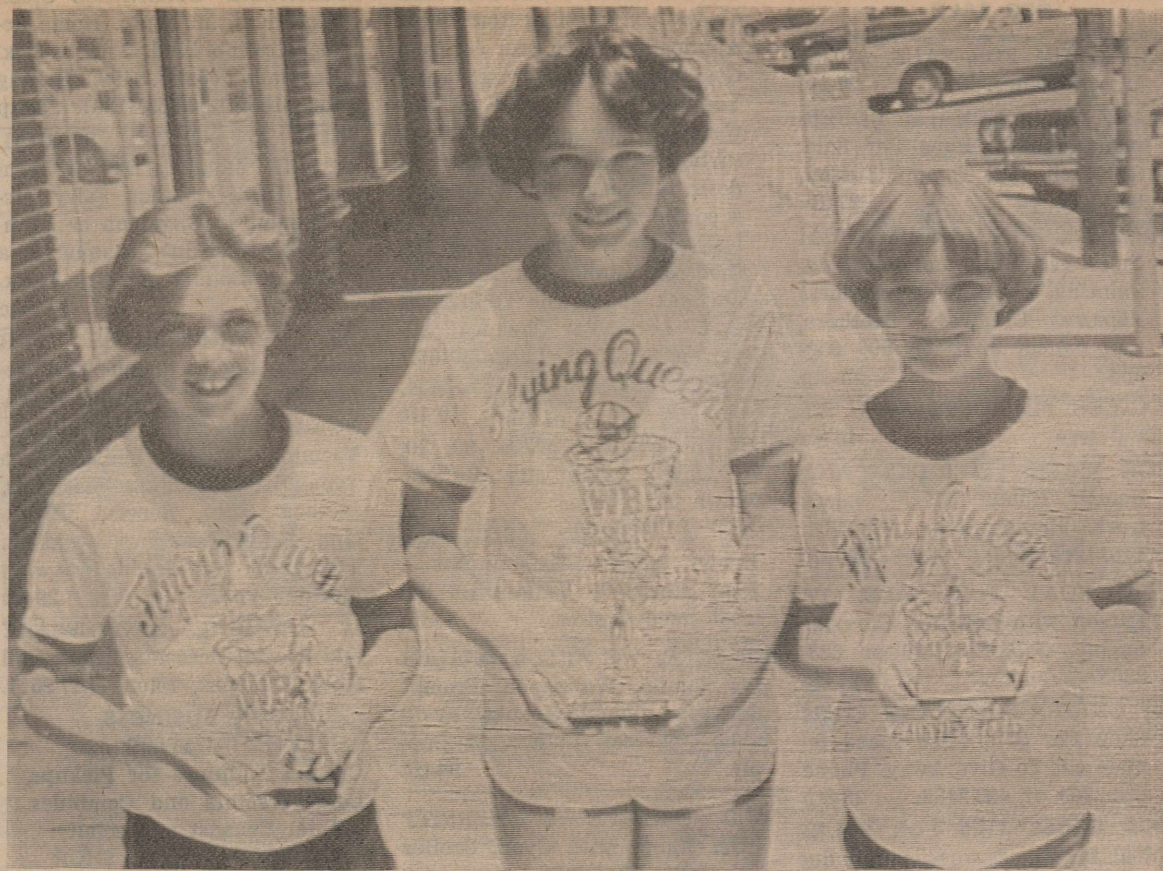

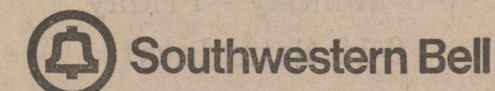
