

## All Around the Town

We have Jesse A. Davis of San Bernardino, California, to thank for the following information from early days in Briscoe County.

The first barbecue picnic in Silverton was held east of the jailhouse about 40 or 50 steps in 1893 by a bunch of old timers like T. L. Anderson, Minor Stevenson, Minor Crawford, Mack Baker, Frank Davis, Mr. Fisher, Mr. Waters, Uncle Will Riddell, Jim Cowart, Grandma Nance Riddell, Uncle Harvey Leo Riddell and many more I can't remember.

In 1908, I think it was, we went to Tule Crossing to a picnic. A man by name of Bass from Lockney had a lemonade stand there. It had four posts in the ground and a bed tarp up for a shade and had a 50 gallon red cedar barrel with lemonade in it. He yelled, "Lemonade made in the shade stirred with a spade good enough for an old maid, a little sweet and a little sour make you feel good for half an hour, especially if spiked, a big glass full for a nickel."

Mr. Davis, who will be 93 in November, recounts how he went to Electra and helped drill oil wells in 1911. In 1914, he and Jeff Davis threshed 160,000 bushels of grain. In 1908, he took a horse and pack saddle and followed the old Spanish trails to Wagon Mountain where a wagon train was attacked and burned by Indians in New Mexico. He raked up a lot of old buttons and other things there.

In 1908 he heard a complete description of the encounters with the Indians by Colonel Randall S. Mackenzie from Grandpa Damerns, who was a Scout for Mackenzie. The account covered the Tule Canyon battles in 1874.

Mr. Davis recalls that some of the first settlers of this area lived south of the Quitaque River and North Pease River, just off the Plains. In 1928 he dug a well for some of these settlers and put up a windmill there. They sold his father an old Spencer Rimfire Rifle that he had when he was a Scout for \$10. The gun is presently on display at Knotts Berry Farm.

Mr. Davis concluded by recalling that there are three gravesites on the north and west side of Tule Canyon. The old wagon road was changed from the cottonwoods around the two little mountains in 1885 by a man by the name of Kent who cut the sheer bluff so a wagon could go up it. Kent also built a tank northeast of Quitaque that same year. When he came with his family to the Plains in 1892, Davis says, they crossed the dam at that tank.

With county celebration time drawing near, we thought you might enjoy these memories from yesteryear.

Early in July, we received a copy of "The Barbed Wire," which is published in Austin and bills itself as "Rural Texans Watchdog in Austin."

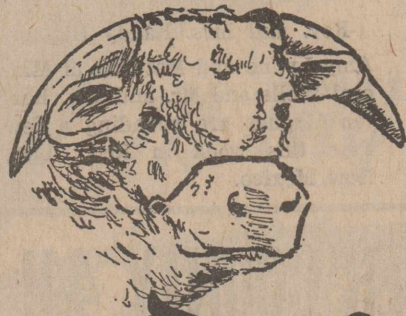
In this newsletter are a list of the legislators who best served the interests of rural Texas in the 66th session.

Foster Whaley of Pampa, who represents the people of Briscoe County in the House of Representatives, was listed as "probably the BEST (certainly the most effective) freshman member."

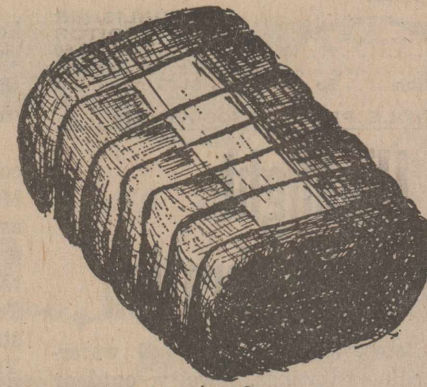
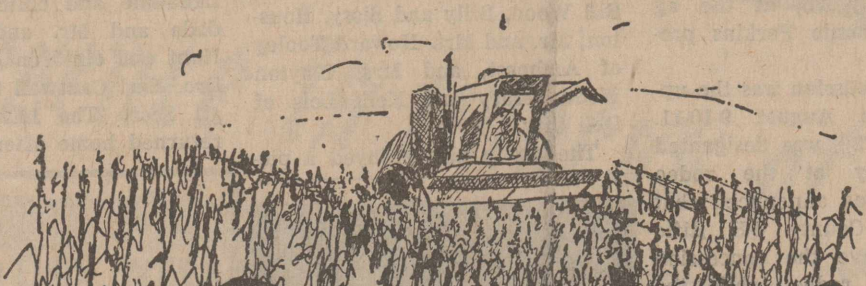
Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, who represents the people of Briscoe County in the Senate, was described as "bright, articulate, and effective. He continues to improve every session."

## Proposed Determinations Given For 1980 Agriculture Programs

The Secretary of Agriculture proposes to make the following determinations with respect to the 1980 crops of corn and grain sorghum: (a) The amount of the 1980 national program acreages; (b) the reduction from previous year's harvested acreage required, if any, to guarantee established (target) price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage; (c) whether there should be a set-aside requirement and, if so, the extent of such set-aside; (d) whether there should be a land diversion program and, if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment; (e) whether a limitation should be placed on planted acreage; and (f) the es-

established (target) prices.

In addition the following determinations will be made with respect to the 1980 crops of corn, grain sorghum and soybeans: (1) the loan and purchase levels, including county loan rates and premiums and discounts for grades, classes and other qualities; and (2) other related provisions. Most of the above determinations are required to be made by the Secretary on or before November 15, 1979, in accordance with provisions in section 105A of the Agricultural Act of 1949, as amended, and section 1001 of the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977, as amended. This notice invites written comments on the proposed determinations.

## Rainfall Continues Heavy In Area

Silverton was drenched with an additional .75 of an inch of rain in the early morning hours of Wednesday, August 1, to bring the total for 1979 to 25.24 inches, well above the normal yearly rainfall figure.

The rains have been very beneficial for lawns and gardens, and have eliminated the possible water shortage which had been facing the City of Silverton this summer.

Pastures have seldom looked better at the first of August, and the green grass at Lake Mackenzie provides a gorgeous backdrop for the lake.

Even though the rains have made local sights pleasant to the eye, they are probably not doing the crops much good. Cotton, which looks to be at least a month late, needs the hot days and nights rather than the rains which will likely make it grow a lot of rank foliage. The rains have reduced the need for irrigation, thus saving the farmers production money. A late first-freeze is desperately needed this year, even more so than other recent years.

Neil Taylor at Lake Mackenzie said Wednesday morning that 1.80 had fallen at the lake this week.

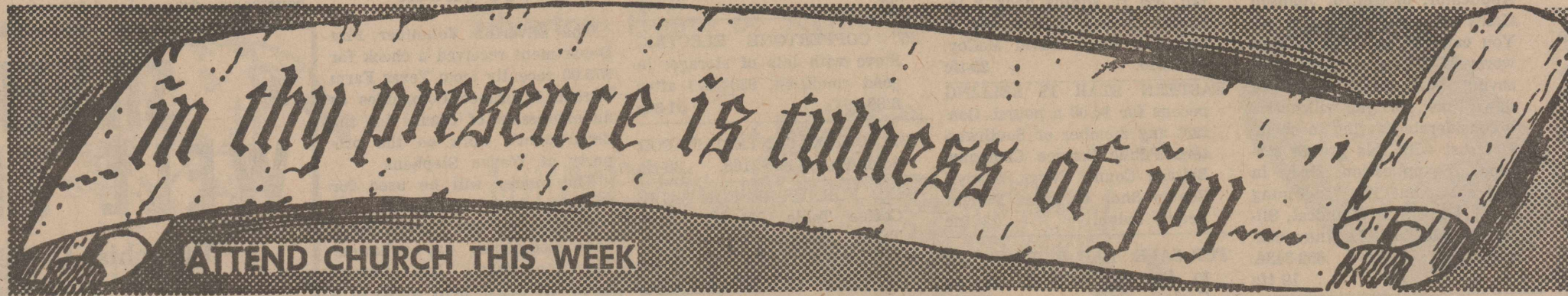

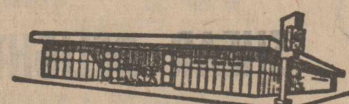
