The form of Japanese beetle (Ingraving Beetle) has been identified as the new insect that is killing the mesquites and locust trees in the Lake Mackenzie area. The beetles are new in this area and lay their eggs in the tree bark where they will re-infest next year. A good insect spray such as Malathion will control them, but I am informed in Plainview that the trees should be sprayed at least twice a week. Other insect sprays are also on the market that will control them.

Several Silvertown area women organized a weighing club at the end of May. The name they chose for the club is Pounds Off. It meets at 6:30 p.m. every Tuesday at the City Hall.

Anyone who is interested in group therapy to help lose or keep off weight is invited to attend these weigh-ins. The members try to help one another by telling things that have helped them, exchanging recipes and encouraging one another. The meetings are very informal.

All of those attending regularly have lost weight, and one has now lost 33 pounds.

Fashion Revue participation is an optional part of the 4-H clothing project. More than 10,000 youth across Texas were involved in the program last year.

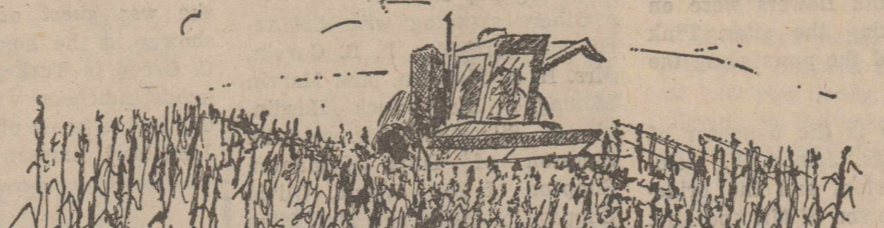

## Owls Lose Opener, Travel To Lubbock Friday Night

Silvertown's varsity Owls saw their fullback, Mark Brown, fall on the opening kickoff last Friday night against Kress, and after he had been carried away to the hospital in the ambulance with a shoulder dislocation, they had a hard time getting it back together to play football.

"Brown says he is coming back to play for us before the season is over," said Coach Jerry Watson. "He will be out at least six

weeks. The injury is to the same shoulder he injured last season, but isn't as bad this time."

Bobby McPherson carried for a first down before the Owls were forced to punt. Then the Owls just watched without making a move to defend against it as the Kangaroos floated a pass completion out to their own 45, and went on to score with 8:26 still remaining to be played in the first quarter. The conversion

kick failed, and the 'Roos led 6-0.

The Owls came back with a first down on their own 38 by Bobby McPherson before having their punt blocked and taken by Kress on the Silvertown 10. The Owls threw Kress for a loss on first down, and the Kangaroos were penalized five yards on second down. On their next play, they scored, but this was called back due to a clipping penalty.

They completed a pass to the nine, which was nullified by penalty, and finally the ball went over on downs to Silvertown.

On Silvertown's next punt attempt, punter Greg Hill was roughed, and the Owls moved ahead with a first down on their own 25. On the next play, an Owl aerial was intercepted and carried to the Silvertown 36. Kress made a first down on the Silvertown seven, and the Owls received a penalty. Kress scored on the first play of the second quarter, failed to get off their conversion kick, and the 'Roos led 12-0 with 11:56 remaining in the second period.

The Owls mounted their best and only successful drive of the game after taking the kickoff on their own 28. McPherson ran for eight yards, then the Owls got a first down on a Kress penalty. McPherson, Cam Forbes and Mark Patton carried the ball for two first downs, and McPherson carried the touchdown from about six yards out. Quarterback Paul Brannon carried the conversion, and suddenly, with 6:52 remaining in the first half, the score had been narrowed to 12-8.

Kress fumbled on the kickoff and Zane Reagan recovered for Silvertown, but Kress intercepted an Owl pass on first down, and was back in business again. They drove to the Silvertown 36 before the ball went over on downs to the Owls with 4:24 remaining in the quarter. The Owls made a first down on a run by McPherson to the Kress 47, and Patton ran to the 40 (this play was nullified by a five-yard penalty against the Owls) and McPherson carried another first down. Kress was penalized 15 yards to their own 20, and at this point the Red Blitz Machine stalled and the ball went over to Kress on their 24.

The Owl defense held, and the ball came back to the Owls on downs at the Kress 31, but only seven seconds remained and the Owls got off only one more play.

Silvertown opened the second half by kicking off to the Kangaroos, and on first down Brandon Jarrett recovered a Kress fumble on the Owl 43. Silvertown made about eight yards before punting to the Kress 24. The 'Roos went all the way for a touchdown on their next play, the Owls stopped the running conversion, and with 9:17 on the third quarter clock, the Kangaroos led 18-8.

The ball changed hands several times before Kress took an Owl punt on the 35 and passed complete for a touchdown on third down. Kress led 24-8 with 2:03 remaining in the third period.

The Owls countered with first downs on their own 15 and 37 before punting to the Kress 26. The 'Roos picked up a series of first downs, and scored with 7:22 remaining in the game from the Silvertown four-yard line. The passing conversion failed, and Kress led 30-8.

On first down, Silvertown's pass was intercepted and carried to the Owl-5. Kress scored on first down, there was no conversion, and at 6:57 Kress led 36-8.

Kress carried the next Owl punt deep into Owl territory, and after a penalty against the Owls, the ball rested on the Silvertown 12. The Kangaroos scored

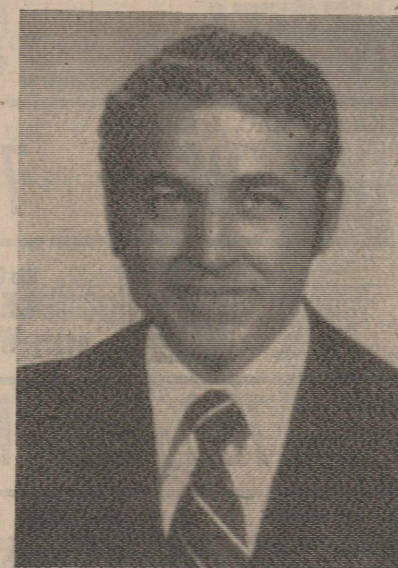

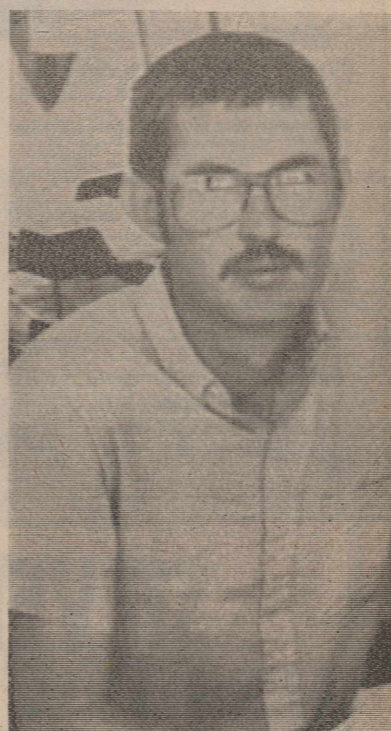

## Junior Varsity Owls To Host LCHS This Week

Silverton's junior varsity Owls will host Lubbock Christian High at 7:00 p.m. today. They will be playing in the second half of a double header following the junior high Owls, who will play their first game of the season at 5:30 p.m.

The junior varsity team opened its season last Thursday by hosting Kress due to the field at Kress having had some repairs made which kept it from being ready to play on. The visitors gave Silverton fans little to cheer about as they defeated the Owls 40-6.

Silverton's junior varsity team is made up mostly of freshmen, with only three sophomores, Robert Davis, Eber Gill and Scotty Roberts. The other players are Kyle Couch, Shane Reagan, Clifford Clardy, Mitcheal Martin, Eric Patton, Tad Cornett, Craig Patton, Roland Asebedo, Bob Arnold and Terry Green.

Kress opened the game with an onside kick that didn't go 10 yards, so the Owls started with good field position on the Kress 47. On third down, quarterback Shane Reagan hit end Bob Arnold with a picture-perfect pass that gave the Owls a first down on the Kress 16. The Owls made another eight yards before seeing the ball go over on downs to Kress.

The Kangaroos came back with a drive that resulted in a 21-yard touchdown run with 51 seconds remaining in the first quarter. The conversion pass was incomplete, and the Kangaroos held a 6-0 lead.

The Owls failed to move the ball on their next possession, and the Kangaroos mounted another drive that resulted in a touchdown on a four-yard pass play. Clifford Clardy batted down the conversion pass, and Kress was ahead 12-0.

After a nice run by Kyle Couch, the Owls fumbled, and Kress recovered on the Silverton 20. One of the Owls tipped a Kress pass into the hands of a Kangaroo receiver for another touchdown for the visitors, their conversion run netted two additional points, and the Owls trailed 20-0 with 4:27 still showing on the second-quarter clock.

 a la Legislatura el proveer,  
 emitir y vender bonos de  
 obligación general llama-  
 dos "Farm and Ranch  
 Loan Security Bonds"  
 (Bonos de Seguridad Para  
 Préstamos Agrícolas y  
 Ganaderos) del Estado de  
 Tejas, sin exceder la canti-  
 dad de \$10 millones de  
 dólares. Todo dinero reci-  
 bido de la venta de estos  
 bonos sería depositado en  
 un fondo diferente en la  
 Tesorería Estatal y sería  
 administrado por el comi-  
 sionado de agricultura,  
 sin más apropiaciones.  
 Estos fondos garanti-  
 zarían préstamos para la  
 compra de bienes raíces  
 agrícolas y ganaderas. El  
 comisionado de agricultura  
 usaría estos fondos bajo  
 las provisiones prescritas  
 por la Legislatura, con el  
 propósito de garantizar  
 préstamos para la compra  
 de bienes raíces agrícolas  
 y ganaderas; para adquirir  
 hipotecas de bienes raíces o  
 escrituras de bienes raíces  
 compradas con préstamos  
 garantizados. Estos fondos  
 serían usados también  
 para adelantar un porcen-  
 taje del principal y del  
 interés debido en esos  
 préstamos, a la persona  
 que califique para el préstamo.  
 La Legislatura tambié-  
 n, podría autorizar al  
 comisionado de agricultura  
 para que venda cualquier  
 terreno adquirido mediante  
 esta enmienda. El comi-  
 sionado de agricultura re-  
 queriría al menos un 6 por  
 ciento de interés en dichos  
 préstamos. La enmienda  
 propuesta apropiaría la  
 cantidad suficiente para  
 pagar el principal y el  
 interés de los bonos que  
 vayan adquiriendo más  
 valor, o que se venzan  
 durante el año fiscal,  
 menos la cantidad del fon-  
 do de interés y amortiza-  
 ción al final del año an-  
 terior.

La enmienda propuesta  
 aparecerá en la boleta  
 como sigue:  
 "La enmienda constitu-  
 cional para autorizar a la  
 Legislatura para que  
 por medio de la venta de  
 bonos de obligación gen-  
 eral del Estado de Tejas,  
 provea una garantía  
 para que las personas  
 calificadas puedan ob-  
 tener préstamos para la  
 compra de bienes raíces  
 agrícolas y ganaderas."

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
