

## Tax Rebates Set 11-Year Record

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that rebates to Texas cities of the local option one-percent sales tax set a record in the tax's 11-year history.

Bullock said more than 900 cities shared in \$124.2 million during July, August and September—passing the state's previous high three-month allocation in the final quarter of 1978 by more than \$6 million.

Bullock also announced that his office was sending September sales tax rebate checks totaling \$73.4 million.

"This month's allocations are just under the record payments of \$74.9 million made in December of 1978," Bullock said.

"I think the state's strong economy and our ability to rapidly process tax returns helped to produce these peak rebates," he said.

Dallas will receive a check for \$8.7 million, bringing that city's total for the year to \$40.4 million, an increase of 12 percent over last year's total to date.

The City of Houston will get a check for \$15.1 million, raising its yearly total to \$71.7 million, up 11 percent.

Silverton's tax rebate check is in the amount of \$3,527.86, slightly higher than the check for \$3,210.20 received for the same month last year. This brings the 1979 payments to date to a total of \$13,001.62, a little less than the \$13,349.69 that had been received at this same time last year.

Quitque's rebate check is for \$2,209.19, up from the \$2,132.45 received last year. This gives Quitque a total tax rebate to date in 1979 of \$8,516.08, which is 8% higher than the \$7,879.62 which had been received in 1978.

At Turkey, the rebate was in the amount of \$1,763.48, down from the \$2,356.12 received at this time last year. This gives Turkey a total for 1979 of \$8,223.37, which is up by 5% over the \$7,813.04 which had been received for the same period in 1978.

The tax rebates received by other area cities included Childress, \$26,347.54; Clarendon, \$9,834.78; Estolline, \$206.36; Floydada, \$11,394.29; Groom, \$3,331.28; Happy, \$1,496.71; Kress, \$1,581.38; Lockney, \$5,055.11; Plainview, \$127,906.86; Tulia, \$16,905.79.

## HUNTER SAFETY COURSE TO BE TAUGHT HERE

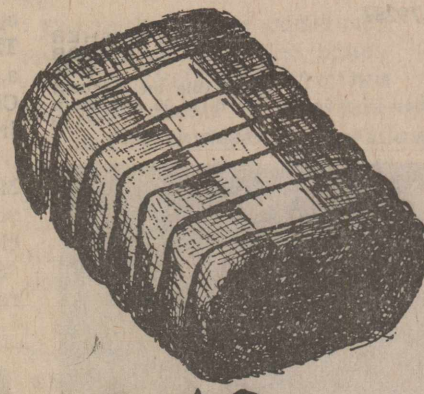

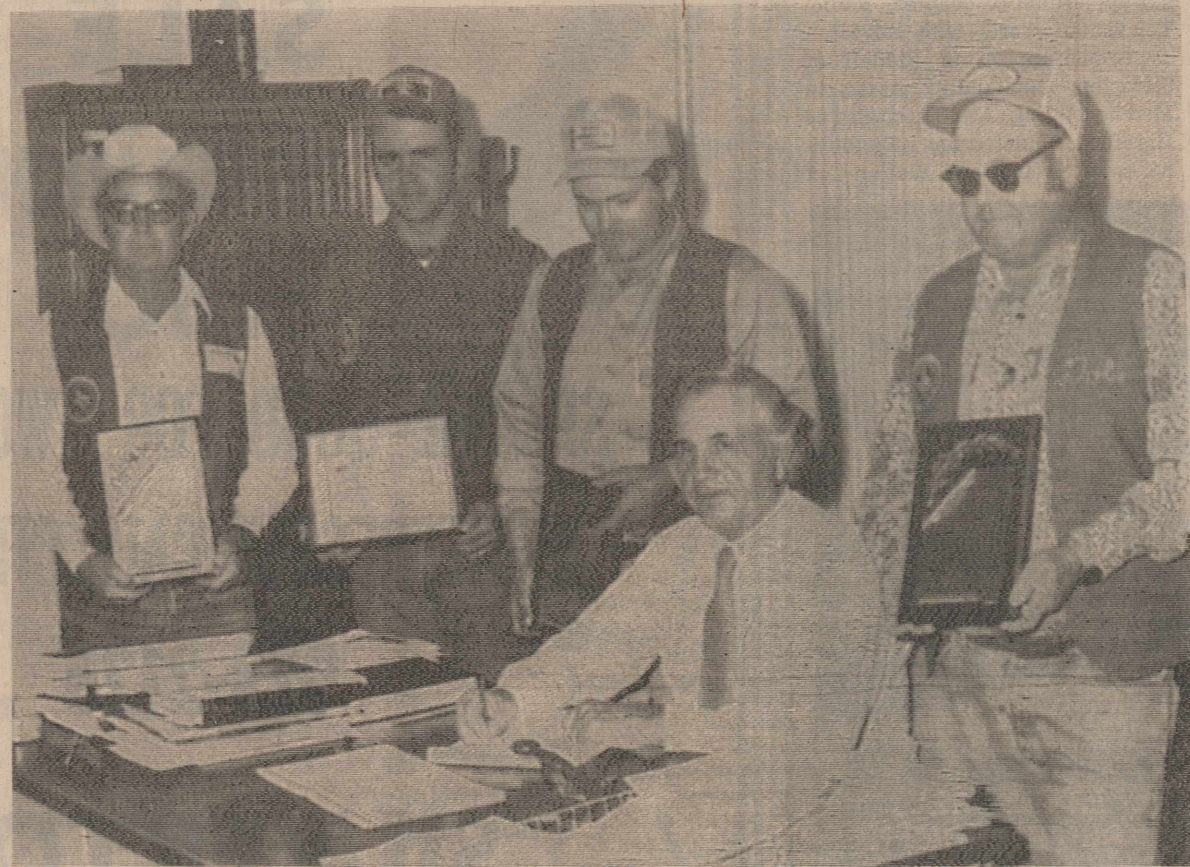

A Trail Boss Breakfast and Worship Service Sunday will signal the start of a Pony Express Run at the First United Methodist Church. The Rev. Jesse Dea, pastor, said he expects 12 members filling the role of Trail Boss will be on hand for the breakfast meeting.

Church families on the Pony Express Run will be relaying stewardship saddlebags to gather Estimate of Giving cards.

Doug Forbes, General Manager of the stewardship campaign, will hand out the saddlebags and run route lists at the breakfast.

A relay of the saddlebags among church members will begin immediately after the morning worship, he said.

Silverton's Owls traveled to Lubbock Friday night to play the Lubbock Christian High School Eagles, and came away with an 18-7 victory which seems to have surprised everyone who was not at the game to see the enthusiasm with which the Owls played.

The Warbirds needed 12 yards for a first down after their first three plays, and punted short to the Owls who made their first first down on the Lubbock one yard line on a pass completion from Paul Brannon to Cam Forbes. Bobby McPherson scored the touchdown with 7:09 showing on the first quarter clock, the running conversion failed, and the Owls were ahead 6-0.

The Owls allowed the Eagles to make three first downs before tightening their defensive wall and forcing the ball to come back to them on downs on the Silverton 10. Brannon passed complete to Nick McJimsey for a first down before the Owls faced a punting situation. Tackle Jim Estes gave the Owls another chance by recovering an Eagle fumble on the Silverton 32.

Brannon ran for a first down on the Owl 43 before the offense stalled and the team was forced to punt.

Lubbock made a couple of first downs before the defense held, and after an incomplete pass on fourth down, the Owls got the ball back. With 3:19 remaining in the first half, the Owls punted and Lubbock made a first down on their own 47 before Brannon broke up an Eagle pass.

Two more incomplete passes gave the Owls the ball at midfield. Runs by McPherson and Tommy Potter failed to net enough yardage, and with 24 seconds showing on the clock, the Owls punted. The Eagles scored on first down, kicked the extra point, and took a 7-6 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Tackle Kelly Comer recovered a Lubbock fumble on an Owl punt early in the second half, but the Owls were unable to gain enough for a first down.

The ball changed hands several times in the third period, but Comer gave the Owls new life when he recovered a Lubbock fumble on the Eagle 20. The Owls made a first down on runs by McPherson and Forbes, and McPherson carried the touchdown from the one with 1:44 remaining in the third period. The conversion pass was incomplete, and the Owls were back on top, 12-7.

Lubbock made a couple of first downs before punting to near the Owl goal. The ball changed hands several times, with both defenses playing hard. With 2:47 remaining in the game, Lubbock gambled and lost on fourth down, and the Owls were in business at the Lubbock 47. McPherson gained to the 35 on first down, Forbes picked up four yards, and McPherson carried the touchdown with 1:45 showing on the clock. Potter attempted but failed on the conversion kick, and the final 18-7 score was made.

Seconds later, Tim Dea intercepted a Lubbock pass and carried it to the 25, but time ran out before Silverton could capitalize on the Eagle miscue.

The Owls made 11 first downs in the game, as compared with 13 for the Warbirds.

Leading tacklers in the game were Comer and Mike Cornett with 16 each. McPherson carried

the ball 32 times for a gain of 185 yards.

"We were just ecstatic after the game," said Coach Jerry Watson.

McPherson has now carried the ball 62 times for 295 yards in two games, to be the second best of all Class B rushers on the South Plains. He has scored four touchdowns, also the second best for Class B athletes. He received a nice write-up in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Tuesday morning, and was mentioned as a runnerup for Class B Player of the Week in the Amarillo Daily News.

The A-J now rates as the top five Class B teams on the South Plains 1. Klondike; 2. Wilson; 3. Silverton; 4. Amherst; 5. Lazbudie.

Elsewhere around District 2-B North Zone last week, game results included Claude 0, Miami 0; Rochester 22, Motley County 6; Valley 12, Ralls 0; Hereford Sophomores 6, Nazareth 0.

The Owls had Mark Brown injured on the kickoff of the first game of the season, and he is recuperating with a separated shoulder and a hairline fracture of the shoulder blade. Greg Hill also was injured in that first game, but he is expected to be back in the lineup this week.

Other teams in 2-B North Zone have also suffered injuries, with Valley losing fullback James McNary and Nazareth losing quarterback Chris Hatla and wingback Dewayne Heck.

The Owls will be traveling to McLean Friday night to play a former district rival at 8:00 p.m. They need your support and encouragement as they try to make it two in a row.

"McLean will be the first Class B team we've played this season," Coach Watson said, "and that makes us feel that we are at least starting on even terms with them. If we play like we did in the fourth quarter last Friday night, we will win."

He added that both the team and coaching staff appreciated the support of the fans.

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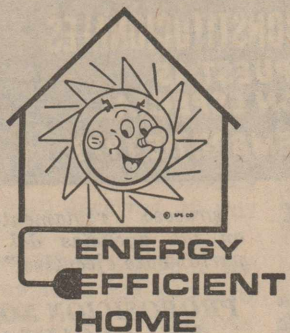

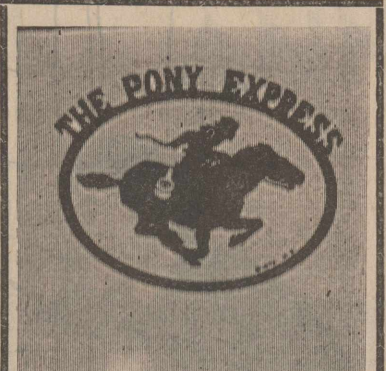

**PUBLIC NOTICE** BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)** House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)** House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws: —To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department; —To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect; —To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules; —To prescribe procedures; and —To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)** Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

**PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 108)**

La Resolución Conjunta #108 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas referente al nombramiento y a los plazos de los notarios públicos.

La enmienda propuesta: —Requerirá que el Secretario de Estado nombre a un número conveniente de notarios públicos para el estado; y —autorizará para que los plazos oficiales para notarios públicos sean por no menos de dos años y por no más de cuatro años. La provisión temporal de la enmienda constitucional propuesta declara que la enmienda entrará en vigor el 1° de enero de 1980; que cada persona que haya sido nombrada como notario público antes del 1° de enero de 1980 continuará ejerciendo como notario público hasta vencerse el plazo por el que fue nombrado; y que esta provisión temporal se vencerá el 1° de enero de 1982. La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional para el nombramiento de notarios públicos para el estado para un plazo de no menos de dos años ni de más de cuatro años, según lo provisto por la ley."

**PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 133)**

La Resolución Conjunta #133 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas para proveer una revisión del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo. Esta enmienda propuesta permitirá a la Legislatura el decretar leyes: —Para proveer una revisión legislativa del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo; —Para prescribir condiciones para que las leyes sean puestas en vigor; —Para suspender, revocar o expirar las reglas; —Para prescribir procedimientos; y —Para delegar autoridad a cualquiera o a ambas cámaras, o a los comités de cualquiera o de ambas cámaras. **PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 13)**

La Resolución Conjunta Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos, a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. De esta manera, la enmienda propuesta podría permitir a la Legislatura el proveer, emitir y vender bonos de obligación general llamados "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" (Bonos de Seguridad Para Préstamos Agrícolas y Ganaderos) del Estado de Tejas, sin exceder la cantidad de \$10 millones de dólares. Todo dinero recibido de la venta de estos bonos sería depositado en un fondo diferente en la Tesorería Estatal y sería administrado por el comisionado de agricultura, sin más apropiaciones. Estos fondos garantizarían préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. El comisionado de agricultura usaría estos fondos bajo las provisiones prescritas por la Legislatura, con el propósito de garantizar préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas; para adquirir hipotecas de bienes raíces o escrituras de bienes raíces compradas con préstamos garantizados. Estos fondos serían usados también para adelantar un porcentaje del principal y del interés debido en esos préstamos, a la persona que califique para el préstamo. La Legislatura también podría autorizar al comisionado de agricultura para que venda cualquier terreno adquirido mediante esta enmienda. El comisionado de agricultura requeriría al menos un 6 por ciento de interés en dichos préstamos. La enmienda propuesta apropiaría la cantidad suficiente para pagar el principal y el interés de los bonos que van adquiriendo más valor, o que se venzan durante el año fiscal, menos la cantidad del fondo de interés y amortización al final del año anterior. La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional para autorizar a la Legislatura para que por medio de la venta de bonos de obligación general del Estado de Tejas, provea una garantía para que las personas calificadas puedan obtener préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas."
